#### **Course Description:**

NUR 201A - Advanced Medical-Surgical Care is the fourth course in the lecture series focusing on advanced medical-surgical care and concepts. Content includes adult and pediatric neurology, complex fluid management, chronic illness, advanced mental health, cardiovascular disorders, oncology II, genetics, and hematology. Prepares students for Advanced Medical Surgical Practice (NUR 201B)

Within this course **1.25 hrs are dedicated to pain theory** to assist in complying with OSBN educational requirements.

#### As a result of this course, the student will achieve the following outcomes:

- 1. **Management of Care:** Identify and apply the legal and ethical parameters of the nursing profession in relation to chronic illness and dying.
- 2. **Safety and Infection Control:** Apply principles of safety and infection control with clients with a variety of chronic health problems.
- 3. Health Promotion and Maintenance: Identify protocols to reinforce health promotion and self-care education to clients and care-providers.

- 4. **Psychosocial Integrity:** Identify appropriate nursing care and education for clients in relation to chronic illness and dying.
- 5. **Basic Care and Comfort:** Identify pain management issues and intake/output needs for clients.
- 6. **Pharmacological and Parenteral Therapies:** Identify appropriate nursing responsibilities for delivery of medications, blood products and/or infusions.
- 7. **Reduction of Risk Potential:** Identify trends and changes in client conditions and intervene as needed.
- 8. **Physiological Adaptation:** Identify appropriate nursing care for clients with an alteration in hemodynamic, tissue perfusion and/or hemostasis.
- 9. **Professional Engagement:** Demonstrate collaboration with peers to create health promotion information tools.

**Learning Activities (including but not limited to):** Lecture, group activities, written work, discussion, case studies, zoom breakout rooms, Kahoot!, and Socrative.

The grading scale that follows is in compliance with the LBCC Associate Degree Nursing Program Policies and Procedures. For this course, grades are determined by a percentage of all available points (percentages are rounded to the nearest hundredth) as follows:

A = 92.00-100% B = 83.00 - 91.99% C = 75.00 - 82.99% D = 67.00 - 74.99% F = less than 66.99% Students MUST pass NUR201 A, NUR201 B, and NUR268D components of the term curriculum in order to progress to the next sequence of the program. Nursing courses must be taken in sequence. Nursing students must complete courses (with the exception of NUR 203, 222, & 268) with a test point average (all post tests and final) of 75% (without rounding). A minimum grade of "C" must be achieved in all nursing courses. Students who have a testing average (using available points) less than 75% will receive no higher than a "D" grade in the course regardless of the number of total points they have earned during the course. Students must also have a clinical evaluation that is "Acceptable" in order to proceed to NUR202.
