



Adams named Acting President



DR. ROBERT ADAMS, new acting President of LBCC

Dr. Robert Adams has assumed the acting presidency of LBCC following the departure of former president Eldon Schafer to the head post at neighboring Lane Community College. Since LBCC's first year of operation in 1967, Dr. Adams has been dean of instruction.

A graduate of Oregon State University in 1950 with a B.S. in Industrial Arts and of the University of Oregon with an M.A., Dr. Adams completed his doctoral oral examinations at U of O in August of this year.

He brings with him to his new post a varied background which includes employment as an electrician's helper, laborer in a plywood mill, maintenance worker for the City of San Francisco. He has been a private businessman, bank teller, teacher, and Director of Guidance at Reedsport, Oregon.

Dr. Adams was elected to the first Board of Directors of Southwestern Oregon Community College and served two terms, including one year as president, before entering the University of Oregon to complete his graduate program at the master's level.

The LBCC board is now accepting applications for the presidency of the college.

It is anticipated that a permanent president will be named early in the fall quarter.

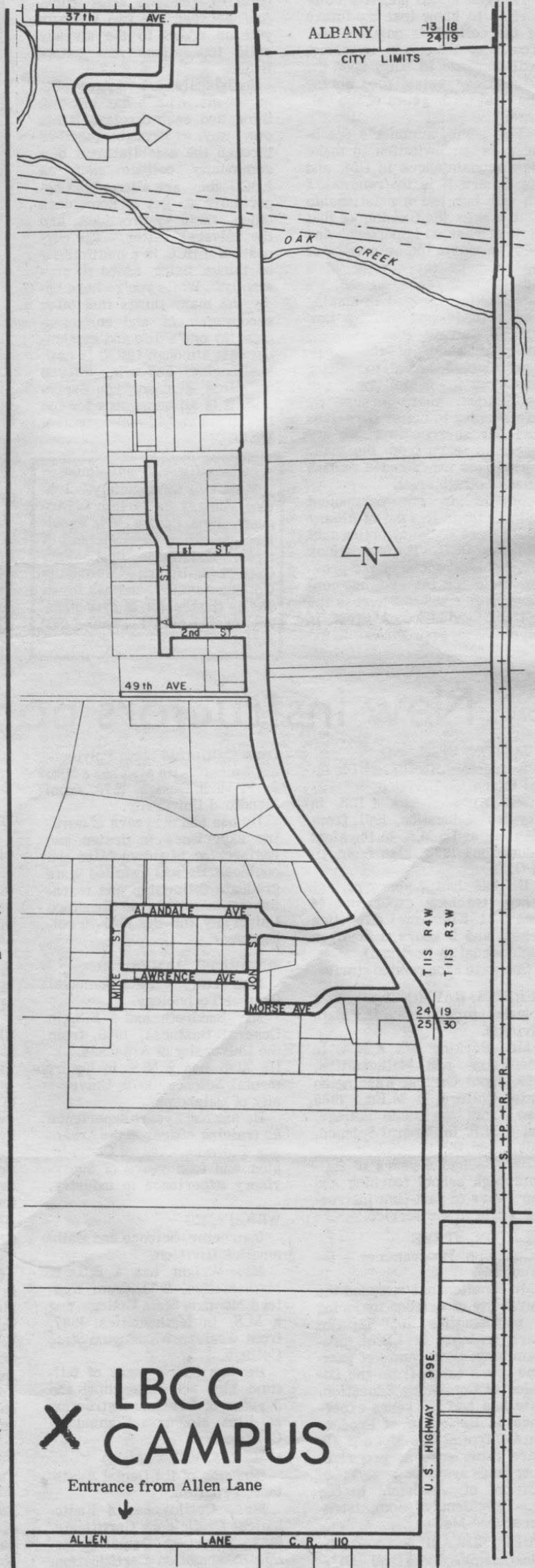
need student involvement and cooperation. We are here to serve you so feel free to let us know what you want.

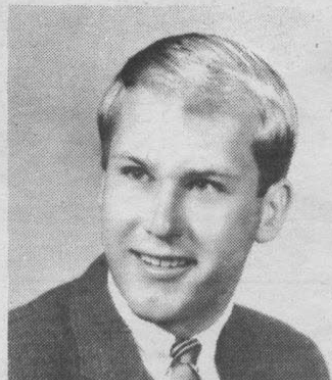

Upon entering the book store for the first time, you may have some problem locating your books, or find yourself overwhelmed by the cost, size or number of books required for your course.

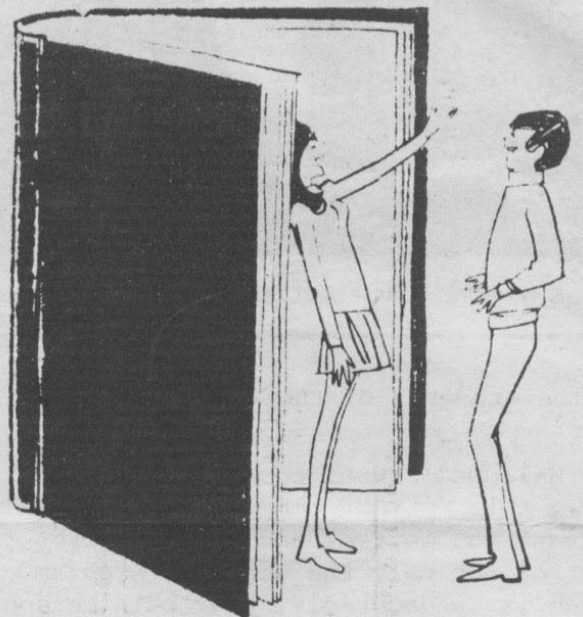
For the eager beavers who want to buy their books early to get a head start, or the cautious students, who want to look the book over before signing up for a course, here are some helpful hints to make it a more pleasant experience:

Students concerned with the cost of books will find that there are often used books available at a 25 percent discount, if you buy early.

Eight percent of the gross sales goes into the student fund every quarter. This allows the students who have made current purchases in the book store the immediate use of these profits. Last year the book store transferred over \$5,500.00 into the student fund.

To help you locate your books, a book list is printed each term listing scheduled courses and the required books for each course. Several copies of the fall term book list are available for use in the book store.

Department headings are posted above each book section and the shelves are tagged under each book according to the course title. If you have any problems locating a book, Mrs. Scheffler, the book store manager, will be glad to help you.

LBCC is starting a new Dental Assistant program this fall term 1970. The classes will run from 8 am to 5 pm 5 days a week.

We have expanded our Data Processing curriculum and our Environmental Control Technology.

Two courses in data processing this fall are Operating Systems Concept and Macro Language I. Under Environmental Control Technology, we have Principles of Ecology.

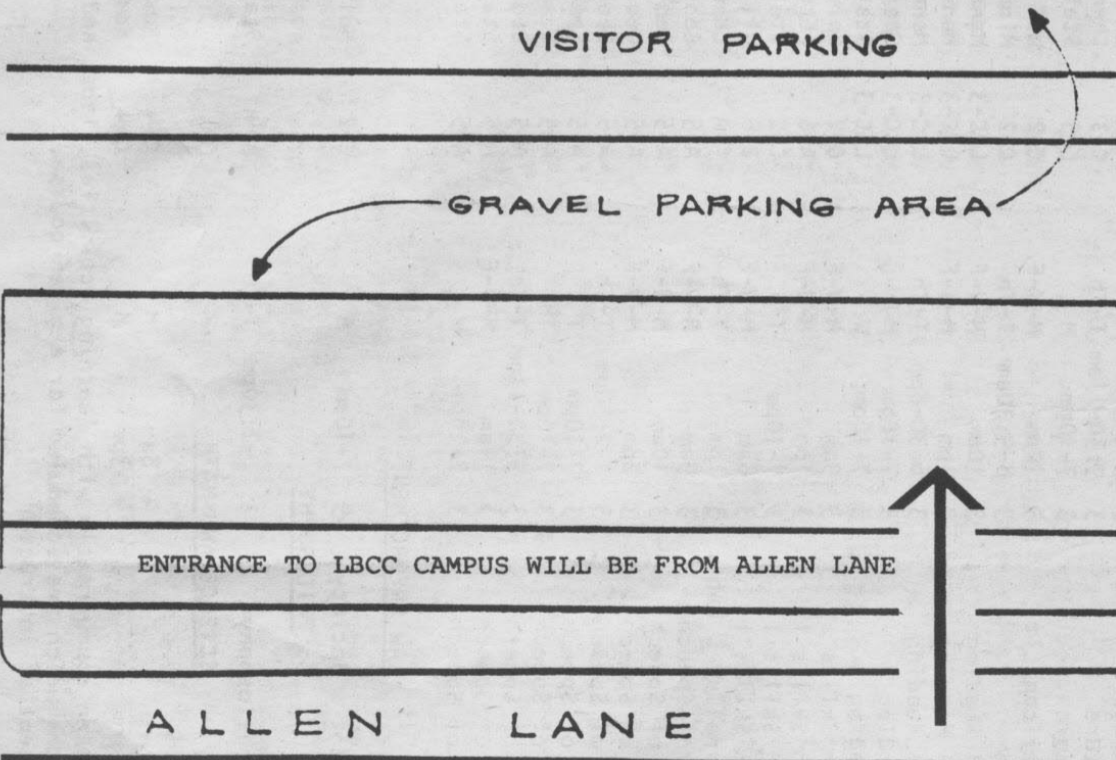
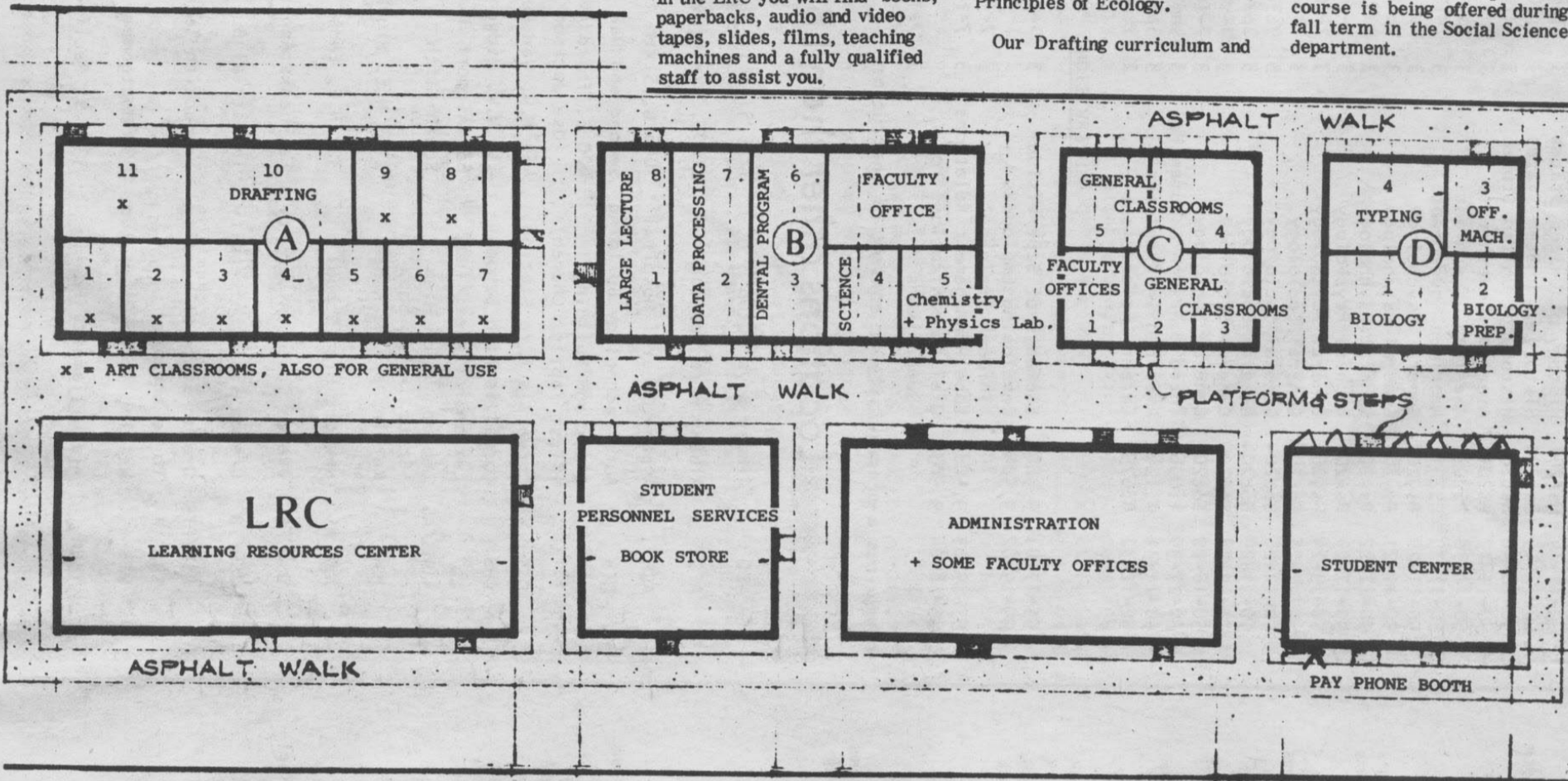
Our Drafting curriculum and

Faculty column

To the students of Linn-Benton Community College:

If Linn-Benton Community College should last for one-hundred years, the opening of the school year 1970-71 will mark one of the three most significant openings in the school's history. The first significant opening was, of course, with the beginning of full-time operations in 1968-69. The third will be with the opening of the permanent campus facilities.

At times during the past year, there was a certain feeling of disconnectedness in the college because of our multiple locations and our over-worked channels of communication. 1. The period during which the student can withdraw from a class and receive an automatic

W will be extended to the last day of classes each term.

2. The grade of Technical Withdrawal (TW) has been eliminated, and the student will receive a W where he would have received a TW in the past.

3. The grade of Incomplete (I) will be changed to W if it is not made up within one term.

Ramos Classic Guitar Concert Scheduled

First this fall will be Manuel Lopez Ramos, October 16th at 8 p.m., and tickets will be available at the College Center starting October 1st. Critics all over the world have raved over the talent of this classical guitarist, so it should be a unique experience

Born in Buenos-Aires, Argentina in 1929, he studied with the most famous teacher of his country: Miguel Michelone. In 1948 he received the award of the Argentinian Chamber Music Association. Since then, he is constantly touring all America and Europe.

In 1963 he was invited to give 14 recitals in the Soviet Union.

He is also a brilliant teacher and has given advanced courses in the University of Arizona, the National University of Mexico and in the Conservatory of Guatemala. Besides this, he teaches an annual summer Master Class, for foreign students, in the "Estudio de Arte Guitarristico" school of which he is

It is the desire of the athletic program at Linn-Benton to provide the finest opportunity available to the athletes of the district. From the interest shown by students it appears that the establishment of athletics will create better school spirit and give the students a common interest with which to identify.

Competition for the three programs will be provided by the other community colleges in the state. Linn-Benton will be entered in the Oregon Community College Athletics Association and will compete for the league's championships in all sports.

Competition promotes school spirit

This year's students will have the privilege of watching LBCC's first team of Roadrunners make tracks in the Oregon Community College Athletic Association. Intercollegiate sports will provide competition for the student supported teams that will be organized this year.

As Linn-Benton has previously operated from as many as 28 locations it has been difficult to co-ordinate any student activities or organizations. The athletic program will be an important unifying step for the school.

The Roadrunners' race for the state championship will give the students something to identify with, and provide the opportunity to display good sportsmanship and school spirit.

Butch Kimpton to coach basketball

Butch Kimpton, the new men's Physical Education instructor and Basketball coach comes to Linn-Benton with a variety of experience in both teaching and coaching. He graduated from Klamath Falls high school in 1957 where he earned four varsity letters in Baseball, three letters in Basketball and two Varsity monograms in both Football and Track. He was also named to the All-State Basketball team.

After high school Mr. Kimpton attended the University of Oregon where he played on two regional playoff basketball teams and earned three varsity Basketball letters. In June of 1961 he graduated from the University of Oregon with a Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education.

Mr. Kimpton began his teaching and coaching experience in Klamath Falls where he taught Freshman Biology and Physical Education. At Klamath Falls his sophomore basketball team compiled a 53 win

and 7 loss record.

The Fall of 1966 Mr. Kimpton joined the Madison High school staff as the junior varsity Basketball coach and physical education teacher. He was promoted to Varsity Basketball coach the next year and in his three years as varsity coach comprised an enviable 52 win and 22 loss record. His 1969 team finished second in the state tournament. He was also the coach of the state championship golf team this past spring.

Mr. Kimpton displayed excellent leadership, both athletically and academically as is exemplified by his being named Division Chairman of Health and Physical Education at Madison High for the past year.

Mr. Kimpton will move to Albany the first of September after he has completed his obligations with Madison High School. Accompanying him will be his wife Jan. The Kimptons have three boys, Stan 8, Kevin 7, and Dan 6.

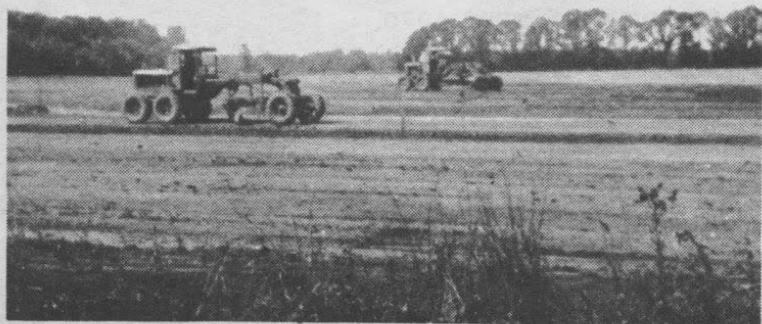
