Course Description:

Writing 121 is meant to provide you with ample experience with brainstorming, developing, crafting, organizing, reviewing, revising, and editing your own written work. It is not the final documents which make the grade—but the process by which you develop them.


Writing is power. What can you say with writing, and how can you say it? How many different ways can you say something, and what is the best way to portray your meaning? Being able to effectively use writing for the purpose you want is essential to good communication. Understanding how to use the conventions of writing gives you an edge, and power, that will support you in every academic and professional venture. In this course, you will have opportunities to explore and utilize writing in order to understand the writing process and to better your own academic writing skills.

Required Texts:

Course Goals:

- Be able to effectively communicate through writing in a variety of styles, forms, purposes, etc.
- Be able to articulate, understand, and implement methods of the writing process.
- Be able to revise, edit, and identify common issues in your own work in order to improve your writing.
- Be able to identify and utilize proper MLA format.



Course Outcomes:

The main objective of WR121 is to strengthen student proficiency in expository writing. Students will write three or more essays over the term. At least one essay must include outside research in MLA, APA, or CMS documentation. At the completion of WR121, successful students should be able to write

thoughtful expository prose, demonstrating competence in organization, mechanics, and the writing process.

Assignments:

There will be informal in-class writing, course discussion, and minimal assignments which will support the development of your thought and learning toward the completion of your individual papers. Individual papers will all have a separate assignment sheet with expectations outlined as the project approaches. As a general rule, all papers should be double spaced, 12 pt. font and will have an opportunity to be revised for the final portfolio.

Turning in Assignments:

To turn in assignments, including papers and the final portfolio— send your documents (either in .doc .x or .rtf format) via attachment in an e-mail. Please use ONLY your LBCC e-mail address and send directly ONLY to my LBCC e-mail account: leana.dickerson@linnbenton.edu. I will send you a confirmation that I received your attachments. If you do not hear from me within 4 hours of the assigned deadline, assume I have not received your paper.

Paper 1: Informative Essay

You will be writing a 3-5 page essay in an area that you know a lot about. Using details, personal examples, and your own explaination, you will inform your reader about your topic. Paper Assignment with more detail will be provided in class.

Paper 2: Compare/Contrast Opinion Essay

In this paper, which will be 3-5 pages, you will use at least one outside source such as a book, an article, a movie, or some other kind of media, to discuss your opinion in the form of a thesis, and provide at least one example of documenting and citing summarization, and at least one example of direct quotation and proper MLA citation. You will be using this paper as a way to respond and create a conversation with yourself and another writer. Paper Assignment with more detail will be provided in class.

Paper 3: Research Essay which must include a Works Cited page using correct MLA format. You will write a 5-7 page research essay which explores a question which you pose, and the research of at least four credible sources to explain and/or support your findings. Paper Assignment with more detail will be provided in class.

Portfolio: Begin your portfolio with a 1-2 page reflection on this course. For examples, discuss what you have learned, what you have focused on, what has stood out to you, what you were surprised by, and please include reflection of how this course has developed your skills as a writer. In your portfolio you must include this reflection and final copies of each of your three essays, including all drafts, freewriting, notes, peer reviews, or other additional materials which supported you along the development of your essays. Please do not simply turn in previous copies of your work; the point of the portfolio is to reflect on the process and improve your work in order to present it in portfolio form.

You will meet with me during week eight to conference about the progression of your portfolio; from that point you can further develop and complete your portfolio to turn in March 6th. Paper Assignment with more detail will be provided in class.


