

Course Description: Emphasizes the development of perceptual and technical skills needed to describe 3-D objects on 2-D surfaces. Exposes students to conceptual and technical art references and encourages students to think critically about art and expression as an integral part of learning to draw.

Course Objectives: The class will provide individualized instruction in practical drawing skills designed for the beginner. We will cover fundamental gesture, contour, and value approaches to drawing from observation. Analytical techniques for spatial organization will be stressed. Progress will be made through exercises, slide lectures, demonstrations, and assignments. We will use different media including pencil and ink. Drawings will be shared for group and individual assessment (critique) as part of the learning-evaluating process.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Apply appropriate vocabulary in written and oral critiques of artistic works.
- · Demonstrate competency in applying a range of values with black and white drawing media.
- Construct a drawing showing spatial depth using the principles of linear perspective.
- Illustrate basic forms with black and white drawing media.

Etiquette & Time Management:

Each week we will draw, critique, and produce verbal/written reflections on art. Your participation enhances our diversity of perspective and being engaged will allow you to reflect on the contributions of others. Please strive to arrive on time and engage fully in class by bringing your drawings and materials to every session. If you drive, consider carpooling or arriving early because parking can be challenging.

Our class platform is Moodle. We will meet face to face each Monday and Wednesday from 1:30- 4:20 to learn and create together in the studio. For record keeping and grading your assignments should be photographed and submitted via moodle by the deadline each week. Your growth as an artist will be assisted by lectures, demos,

critiques and readings but only you can invest the daily time to practice these skills in your drawings.

Attendance:

If you are sick please do not attend class. <u>Email me</u> to let me know you need to stay home and I will help you continue the course as you recover.

While every student is different, during my years as an instructor, I have noticed that if students miss three or more classes it can be very difficult to successfully complete the missed assignments. If you miss three or more classes we will need to discuss a plan so that you are able to pass the class. If you miss four or more classes, I will recommend you withdraw from the class. I understand that each student and circumstance is different so please talk with me about what is happening in your life and I will work with you to create the best possible plan.

Late Work will be marked down one letter grade. For example a late homework earning a B will become a C. As college students, life does happen. If you communicate with me via email or office hours I will do my best to help you.
