My experience record started with the U.S. Air Force in which I served four years, 60-64. Though enjoyable work came to me as an OFT instructor and




JIM HAYNES, CANDIDATE FOR FIRST VICE-PRES.

I am seeking office at LBCC to reach some goals I have in mind:


 Increased student interest in Student Government.



ASLBCC Constitution:

Duties and Responsibilities of Officers

ARTICLE I. Student Body Officers

Section 1.

The elected student government officers for Linn-Benton Community College shall be the president, first vice-president, second vice-president, secretary, and treasurer. The term of the student government officers shall be from May through April for a period not to exceed one year.

Section 2.

The duties of the Executive Council of the student government shall include: (a) President

(1) Shall serve as chairman of the Executive Council.

(2) Shall carry out the provisions of the constitution and bylaws of the AS-LBCC.
(3) Shall represent the AS-

LBCC at all official functions. (4) Shall be an ex-officio member of all committees.

(5) Shall appoint, subject to the approval of the Executive Council, all special committee chairmen.

(6) Shall have one vote in the Executive Council.

(7) Shall have one vote in the Student Senate.

(b) First Vice-President

(1) Shall perform the duties of the Executive Council president in the absence or inability to act of that officer.

Shall act as chairman of the Student Senate.

(3) Shall act as chairman of the Inter-Club Council. (4) Shall have one vote in the

Executive Council. (5) Shall have no vote in the

Senate except in the event of a

(c) Second Vice-President

(1) Shall perform the duties of the Executive Council president in the absence of, or inability to act of, the duly elected president and or first vicepresident.

(2) Shall act as chairman of

the Program Board. (3) Shall act as chairman of the Inter-Council of Clubs in the absence of or inability to act of the first vice-president.

(4) Shall carry out all duties assigned by the president.

(5) Shall be in charge of AS-LBCC elections and campaigns.

(6) Shall act as public relations representative for the AS-LBCC

(7) Shall have one vote in the Executive Council.

(8) Shall have one vote in the Student Senate.

(d) Secretary
(l) Shall be the official recorder of the Executive Council meetings.

(2) Shall keep an official record of the functions and important highlights of the AS-LBCC.

(3) Shall preserve all records, reports, and documents

of the AS-LBCC.

(4) Shall keep an attendance record of the members of the Executive Council.

(5) Shall be fourth in the Executive Council chain of com-

(6) Shall prepare a list of unfinished business for the Executive Council president before each meeting of the Executive Council.

(7) Shall have one vote in the Executive Council. (8) Shall have one vote in

the Student Senate.

(9) Take care of all correspondence on behalf of the AS-

(10) Shall keep a file of all correspondence sent and received on behalf of the AS-LBCC.

(e) Treasurer

(1) Shall work with the college Business Manager for the accounting of all student body monies.

(2) Shall act as chairman of the Finance Committee.

(3) Shall be fifth in the Executive Council chain of command.

(4) Shall receive all monies from student body activities or other functions, and deposit the same in official depositories.

(5) Shall have accounts and books open at all times for the Administrative Council, the Board of Directors, and any authorized auditors.

(6) Shall have one vote in

the Executive Council. (7) Shall have one vote in the Student Senate.

(8) Shall prepare a recom-

ARTICLE II. Student Senate. Section 1.

The duties of the six (6) senators elected by the general voting members of the AS-LBCC: (3 sophomore senators who will be sophomores next Fall term)

(a) Shall insure that all matters brought before the Student Senate are beneficial to the AS-LBCC.

(b) Shall keep in close contact with the general membership of AS-LBCC and act in their best

(c) Each representative shall have one vote each in the Senate.

The duties of the four (4) Directors appointed by Executive Council

(a) Shall serve as student advisors to the Executive Council and Student Senate.

(b) Shall insure that all matters brought before the Student Senate are beneficial for all the members of the AS-LBCC.

(c) Shall keep in touch with student goals and ambitions, and introduce legislation that pertains to the above matters.
