<u>Course Description</u>: This course is applicable for the beginning music student as well as those with some previous training. You will study the fundamentals of music through exploration of rhythm, melody, harmony, form, and timbre in western music, through active individual and ensemble music-making including singing and body percussion, listening exercises, and reading and writing standard music notation. You are encouraged to apply both in-class and homework activities to your overall musical experience within and outside of class.

Prerequisite(s): This course is meant for students from all musical backgrounds, from the beginner to the person with prior musical training. There are no formal prerequisites for this course except for an open mind and a willingness to learn and participate in the music making process.

Course Objectives:

In this course we will:

- a) correctly identify elements of musical staff notation: clefs, pitches, intervals, rhythmic values up to 32nd notes, time signatures, key signatures, triads and triad inversions (students with previous musical training may substitute more advanced rhythmic values and chord types)
- b) demonstrate understanding of basic musical patterns by writing short phrases using correct notation, sight reading and playing short works
- c) collaborate with others by reading and making music together both in and outside of class
- d) understand and appreciate creative works through exploration and participation in the creative process

<u>Classroom Interaction/Course Delivery</u>: This course will require you to do a significant amount of reading and writing both in and out of class. There will be many visual and online aides used in and out of class. In addition, listening will be of the utmost importance during lecture and aural skill drills as both require open, attentive ears. This course is an interactive process that will require us all to work together. <u>The more involved you are in class, the more you will reap the benefits available to you.</u>

Attendance Policy: For students to get the most out of this course, it is expected that you will attend class on a regular basis. While I am aware that life does throw unexpected events our way, learning can only take place through active engagement and participation in the educational process. Repeated absences or late arrivals are a disruption to this process and will cause you to fall behind quickly. Please arrive to class on time with an open mind, open ears, and ready to participate. This is your education which requires your active involvement in the process.

Homework/Out-of-class Assignments: Assignments will be given for you to complete between class meetings at home and on your own. These are essential to your mastery of the material and participation in the following class meeting. Not completing an assignment may cause you to fall behind or be lost during the next class meeting. Please keep up with all assignments. Please make sure that all assignments are neat and legible.

Late Assignment Policy: Part of the college experience is learning how to manage your time accordingly including personal, educational, and employment requirements. Late assignments will be accepted with a penalty of 10% (1 letter grade) per day (not per class meeting) late. Late work will not be accepted if it is more than four (4) days late.
