COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course in an introduction to theory and studio practice in using the elements and principles of design to articulate visual ideas. Focus will be on developing a familiarity with basic two-dimensional design techniques. These design concepts and techniques will be practiced through a series of exploratory assignments investigating both formal and conceptual aspects of design. This entry level course is designed for students with no experience in two-dimensional design. Students will be exposed to art historical references as they relate to concepts as well as being encouraged to write and think critically about art and design. Emphasis will be on instilling sound foundational information in the traditional aspects of design as well as encouraging thoughtful exploration of contemporary design potential.

This course will require a *significant* investment of your time and energy. A commitment to critical thinking, experimentation and risk-taking will play an important role. This makes attendance, a strong work ethic, accountability, and a positive engagement with the material important.

Class time will involve 'hands on learning', technical demonstrations, presentations, critiques/group discussions, as well as open studio work time provided for art production. You are required to work on your projects outside of class time for a minimum of 3-6 hours per week. This course will be split between instructor supervised work time, technical demonstrations, presentations, homework assignments and responses, participation in critiques, and the maintenance of a shared studio work environment. **Throughout this course, you will receive technical and conceptual instruction, but you are ultimately responsible for the quality of your work.** 

#### Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

Articulate verbally, visually, and in writing an understanding of the Elements and Principles of Design. Articulate visually, verbally, and in writing, creative problem solving through guided completion of assignments relative to understanding visual design concepts. Articulate verbally, visually and in writing appropriate vocabulary.

ATTENDANCE is critical in this studio art course. During this quarter, you are allowed 3 absences ONLY. If you obtain 3 absences, this will not impact your overall final grade in the course. In class critique days will be designed for peer to peer reviews that as the instructor I will facilitate with a variety of conversational prompting methods. If you wish further feedback, please see me during office hours so that you may receive undivided attention

**PARTICIPATION IN CRITIQUES** Part of learning how to create critically compelling work is learning how to talk about it. Your participation and feedback in group critiques and class discussion is a very important part of your development as an artist (it is also assessed in your individual project grades). For each major project, there will be a formal evaluation. Giving constructive feedback and criticism is an incredibly useful skill, as is being able to receive it.
