Prerequisites:

MTH 095 Intermediate Algebra, BA 101A, and BA 101B with a grade of C or better.

Purpose of Course:

Lower Division Transfer (LDT) Course: Principles of Accounting is the first of the two-course accounting sequence designed for students seeking a four-year degree in Business Administration or Accounting.

Outcomes:

Upon completing this course, students will be able to:

Use the accounting cycle to develop financial statements from business transactions. Analyze basic business economic events to determine their effect on accounts and financial statements. Interpret and analyze financial statements to aid in decision-making. Demonstrate a basic understanding of the principles of internal control and apply them to relatively straightforward situations to identify strengths and weaknesses. Interpret and analyze accrual and cash flow information presented in accounts. Analyze issues relating to inventory, receivables, long-lived assets, liabilities, and stockholder's equity and recommend appropriate accounting treatment. Describe basic generally accepted accounting principles.
