SUBJECT: Paper & Xerox Copying

We are asking that everyone on the staff please help us with usage of paper and Xerox copying. Our paper usage is just about double what it was last year at this time.

Due to the rise in paper costs of about 30%, our budget for this year is totally expended, and it does not look good for next year either. We are trying to do as much as we can to conserve on paper by printing both sides whenever possible. If you have a job that for some reason you do not want printed on both sides, please tell us. Only order what you are sure you will use.

Our Xerox copying is also getting out of hand. We have jumped from 8000 to approximately 17,000 copies per month on each of our model 4000 Xerox machines. We are asking that all staff members please slow down on the copying. Unless you really need a copy, don't make one. If you need six copies of something, don't make ten just in case you might need them. Please do not make personal copies on these machines. There is a 5¢ coin-operated machine in the library for personal copies. Because of the increased Xerox copies our budgeted funds are already expended for this year. Unless additional money is found somewhere, we may have to discontinue using some of the Xerox machines.

Please do what you can to reduce our copying and paper costs. Thank you very much for your cooperation.
