Course Description:

COMM 218Z increases the knowledge and use of competent communication skills to better understand oneself, others, and the role of communication in interpersonal relationships.

Assignment Details: This list provides an overview of assignments. Due dates and points may be adjusted if need be. More information for each assignment will be discussed throughout the term and be made available on Moodle.

- Journals (80 points; 10 points each)- Each week you will need to respond to journal prompts on Moodle. An excellent journal should be <u>at least 250 words in length</u> (excluding the question prompt) AND show quality in your post (i.e. show me that you have read and spent time reflecting). Many of the journal prompts will be used to guide in-class discussion and must be completed prior to our Thursday class meetings. Therefore, journals are due <u>every</u> Thursday by 10:00am (class time).
- Exit Tickets (30 points; 3 points each): The purpose of the exit ticket is to reflect and apply what you learned in class that day, share insights with me that may not have been shared aloud in class, and allow me to see what additional information may need to be covered during future class periods. This may be in-class assignments, an activity, or a final question at the end of class. Exit tickets will happen during 11 random class sessions and cannot be made up. If you are not in class, you do not receive those points for the day. What this means is that you can miss one exit ticket with zero consequence. If you are present every time there is an exit ticket, the last 3 points count as extra credit.
- Exams (110 points; 55 points each)- This course has two exams throughout the term.
 Material covered will come both from your textbook and class discussions/activities. HINT: If you do not read the text, do not come to class, and do not take notes, you will not do well

during the exams. The final exam IS NOT cumulative. Meaning, it only covers content from midterm to finals.

- "What do you carry with you?" Assignment & Presentation (20 points)- This assignment is designed to help you examine and explore the many dimensions of yourself. Select five objects that are representative of how you view yourself. Objects should illustrate major life events, personal goals, challenges you've faced, successes you've achieved, and/or individual values that have impacted your life and your communication. You will present three of these objects in class. All five objects will have a typed reflection that is submitted on Moodle.
- "Dear Abby" Final Application Assignment (60 points): The purpose of this assignment is to explore "real-life" challenges in interpersonal communication and provide solutions to these challenges by applying concepts and theories from the course.

Grading:

After I return your assignment, you have one week to discuss a grade with me. I will not discuss grades after the one week deadline.

Extra Credit: You can receive extra credit by turning in your final "Dear Abby" Assignment early (1 pt. for each day it is early for up to 5 pts) and/or by being on the winning team for the exam prep sessions. Additionally, by completing all 11 exit tickets, you will receive 3 points extra credit.

COURSE POLICIES & PROCEDURES

Attendance: While we have no formal attendance policy, "Exit Tickets" are assigned on 11 random class days. If you are not in class to complete the exit ticket, you will not receive the points. Exit tickets CANNOT be made-up. However, if you are extremely ill, please stay home out of an abundance of caution to those that are at higher risk. There will be small opportunities for extra credit throughout the term to make-up missed exit tickets. Additionally, missing one will not impact your grade. In other words, don't stress over a missed class or two, but make sure the absences are for good reasons.

Tardiness: Being on time to class is incredibly important as we go over important announcements in the first few minutes of class as well as start discussions and activities. Arriving late is very disruptive to other students' learning. **Please try to arrive on-time.**

Assignment and Class Participation Expectations: Reflection and discussion are imperative in this course in order to have a better understanding of ourselves and others, and as a result, become better communicators. In order to do this, sharing information about yourself and personal interactions/experiences as it relates to course content, adds to the learning of others. While I encourage you to stretch yourself, I never want you to be in a situation or share information

where you feel <u>extremely</u> uncomfortable or threatened. If an assignment is making you feel particularly anxious, please come talk to me and we will find a way to ease your concerns.

Assignment Submissions: All assignments must be submitted via Moodle. Email submissions will not be accepted.

Late Work: Due to me laying out all assignment deadlines on the first day of class, late assignments will not be accepted and will receive an automatic zero (not partial credit). Please pay attention to assignment due dates listed on the course schedule (below) as well as on Moodle. That being said, I understand life happens. If you know you will have difficulties meeting a deadline due to an illness, childcare issues, or other extenuating circumstances (vacations don't count), please contact me as soon as possible so we can develop a plan to aid in your success of this course. In general, the more frequent and open communication with me, the better.

About My Teaching Style: This is not a traditional lecture course and may feel very different than other courses you have taken. Self-reflection, discussion, and class activities are a central component of this class. You will be asked to interact with one another rather than simply take notes from a PowerPoint. In addition, I give many examples in order to help you understand how the theories and concepts can apply to "real-life" situations. Many of these examples come from my own personal relationships and experiences. This may be uncomfortable for some of you that have not heard an instructor share personal information before. I do this in order to create an atmosphere where dialogue, community, and vulnerability are encouraged and supported, as well as make course content more applicable and tangible. If at any point you have any questions or concerns about what is being shared, please come talk to me. If I feel what is being discussed that day could be "triggers" for people, I will prompt students ahead of time.

Classroom Culture: In order to explore interpersonal communication concepts, it is crucial to be open to sharing your experiences and listening to the experiences of others. The only way we can grow in our communication skills is by expanding our understanding of others. That being said, I expect us to form a community of respect and support within our classroom. This is a space to be SAFE and BRAVE. What is shared here, stays here. Healthy disagreement and discussion are a central component of this class and are encouraged, but must be done on a professional and constructive basis. While I have never experienced this in all my years of teaching, if you are disrespectful to your class members, you will be given a warning and then asked to leave. If you've gotten this far in the syllabus and are still reading, I want to reward you. Please send me an email BEFORE our first day of class (Tuesday, Sept. 26th by 10:00am) with your name and picture of a llama to receive +2 extra credit.

Note Taking: As this is a college course, note taking is expected. While lecture slides are available on Moodle, content on my slides is minimal and examples are often given orally and not listed on the slides. In order to do well in this course, and on exams, it is imperative you take notes and write down examples I give throughout the term.

Communication and office hours: The best way to reach me is via email. I do not use the Moodle chat feature for communication. While I check email often, after 5:00pm M-F and during weekends are times I set aside for my family (and sleeping). If you email me after 5:00pm M-F or on the weekends, do not expect a response until the next business day.

I will hold office hours on campus Tuesdays and Thursdays from 12:30-1:30pm. If those days/times don't work for you and you would still like to chat, please email me and we can schedule a time to virtually meet and chat about assignments, course content, or life in general.

Writing Guidelines: While this is not a writing course, proofreading/editing for grammatical and spelling errors is imperative in effective communication. Excessive spelling or grammatical errors will result in point deductions on assignments. Any information from another source that is included in written papers should be appropriately cited using APA format. If you have any questions about how to do this properly, please see me. It is highly recommended to take WRI 121 before taking this course.

Cell Phone Policy: While technology is a regular part of our life, please try to keep cell phones communication to a minimum while in class. If you need to take a call or send an urgent message, please excuse yourself from class and return once you are able to give your full attention.

Pronouns & Names: In order to provide an optimal learning environment for all students, creating a safe space is imperative. - 1. Log on to Moodle at least 2-3 times a week.
- Allow enough time to focus on coursework. This course is worth four credits. A credit is
 equivalent to an hour of in-class time. For each credit, you should also allow at least an hour
 of course work. This means you should allow at least four hours of out-of-class work a
 week for this class.
- 3. Schedule time into your week where you will work specifically on this class. Stick to this schedule. The more you adjust your schedule, the more likely you are to fall behind.
- 4. All the assignment deadlines are listed out in the syllabus and on Moodle. Set reminders on your phone calendar NOW for when assignments are due.
- 5. Use the resources available on Moodle, in-class, **and** read your textbook. I know it is easy to attend class but not read the textbook. However, this course is designed in a way where ALL resources are required. I suggest the following schedule for completing coursework:
 - a. **Friday Monday:** read the weekly journal prompt and read the assigned chapter due Tuesday (paying attention to material related to the journal prompt).
 - b. Tuesday: Attend class and begin reading the chapter assigned for Thursday.
 - c. **Wednesday Thursday:** Finish reading all assigned material and complete the journal prompt by 10:00am on Thursday.
- 6. Reach out to me with questions and find time to connect during my office hours. If you start struggling, TALK TO ME. Don't wait until the end of the term. Let's figure out a plan for you to be successful together.

Moodle Layout: Our course page is divided into 10 weeks for the term. Each week is organized by what you need to read, assignments that are due, YouTube videos, and virtual lectures (if needed). Weeks begin on Mondays and new weeks will populate at least the Friday before. This allows you to work slightly ahead if you feel inclined to do so.
