<u>Course Description:</u> Music Appreciation studies music through the elements or language of music, musical forms and the history of music. This includes the identification and analysis of a variety of different culturally and historically defined practices related to the development of music, its composition and performance.

Course Outcomes:

In this course we will:

- 1. Identify the elements of music in standard repertoire from Western and Non-western musical traditions.
- 2. Describe a musical work using analytical and critical listening skills.
- 3. Match key composers and musical style traits to historical and cultural determinants of Western and Non-Western music.
- 4. Explain the technical and expressive aspects of selected music and performances, demonstrating understanding of the elements of music and form.
- 5. Develop and support interpretations of varied works, citing the use of the elements of music (including form), and the context of each work.

Prerequisite(s): None.

How to Succeed in Music Appreciation!

<u>Classroom Interaction/Communication</u>: This course will require you to do a significant amount of reading and writing both in and out of class. There will be many visual and online aides used in and out of class. In addition, listening will be of the utmost importance during lecture and listening drills as both require open, attentive ears. Please understand that lectures will not simply be a summary of what you have read, but are additionally meant to complement/augment the material presented in the text. Falling behind in the reading will also make it more difficult for you to be interactive during class lectures and discussions about the material and listening. This course is an interactive process that will require us all to work together. The more involved you are in class, the more you will reap the benefits available to you. Notes and reminders for this course:

- 1) Classical music, while one of the focuses of this course, will not be the only genre explored. Always keep an open mind and open ears!
- 2) Remember "Classical" music is still composed today and is ever changing.
- 3) Music has many purposes and audiences, and our current mode of musical saturation and overwhelming personal choice is very new.
- 4) Pay attention to details. Unfamiliar and complex music requires repeated listening. Learning music terminology can help you focus on details. Reserve judgment of unfamiliar music until you take the opportunity to understand and learn from it.
