Course Description

This course explores and analyzes violence and aggression from biological, psychological and sociological perspectives. Includes topics such as homicide, suicide, rape, assault, mob violence, terrorism, violence within the family and related phenomenon, which are presented from a human relations perspective.

For Spring 2020, this course is being offered 100% online for 10 weeks. There will be no face-to-face class meetings.

- Have an understanding of the root causes of many types of violence and aggression.
- Have an understanding of the multiple theories of aggression.
- Understand the prevention strategies and theories associated with violence and aggression.

Instructor Responsibilities:

As the Instructor, I will have an online presence in the Moodle classroom daily, prepared and ready to teach. I will be available to support student learning when requested by students. I will hold students accountable by following through with course objectives and syllabus content. I will strive to maintain an online classroom environment that encourages respectful discussion and behavior that enhances the learning of a diverse student population both online and in a physical classroom. I will grade assignments in a timely manner and give appropriate feedback.

Attendance

Attendance is mandatory. In an online class, the only way to take attendance is by participation in the weekly discussion forums. These are required.

Grading

- There are ten short **Online Lecture quizzes**. These quizzes are a means of accountability to ensure that you are reading all of the assigned online lectures. These are worth 5 points each.
- There are **three exams** during this course; one covering weeks 1-3, one covering weeks 4-7, and one covering weeks 8-10. Exams are on material covered in the textbook *as well as the weekly online lectures*. Each test is worth 100 points. These will be administered in the Moodle classroom.
- **Weekly online discussion** posts are *required*. A discussion question will be provided. You must post one answer to the question that meets a minimum of 250 words and uses the week's reading as a way to backup or support your answer. References must be listed at the end of this post when used. The title of this post must be your surname, so if your last name is Stevens, you would name it "Stevens" in the "subject" field. This first post is due no later than Wednesday at Moodle midnight. **These original posts are worth 10 points.**
- You also must respond to at least two of your classmates' posts. If your last name is Stevens, you would name these posts "Stevens Response 1" or "Stevens Response 2." These responses do not need to have citations and just need to be one or two paragraphs. Quality response posts are those that further discussion by presenting opposite viewpoints, adding to the viewpoint presented, or asking further questions. Your response posts must be posted by Friday at Moodle midnight. These response posts are worth 5 points each. Online discussion is worth a total of 200 points (10 total discussion points per week for 10 weeks).
- **Weekly reflection assignments**: Each week you will be *required* to write a short reflection paper on the material we have covered for the week. See below for details.
 - **Internet Research Project:** See Moodle for more details on this required project. This is due FRIDAY of Week 9, but can be turned in earlier if you get it finished before then.

Reflection Papers:

Each week there will be a required documentary on Moodle that is somehow relatable to the topic covered in that week's chapter. It is up to you to write a minimum of 500 words about your opinion of the documentary and how it relates to the week's topic. You **must** use information from the text when describing your thoughts in the paper. The purpose of this assignment is to get you thinking critically about the material and relating it to the real world. You **must** cite the textbook (and any other original source) in APA style at the end of your paper for full credit. Each reflection paper is worth 10 points for a total of 100 points. (1 per week for 10 weeks) **Your Reflection Paper is due by Sunday at Moodle midnight.** *Late papers can only receive 60% at most.*

Reflection Papers will be graded with the following rubric:

**Reflection Paper assignment submissions that are just a summary of the documentary will receive a ZERO (0) because that is *not* the assignment. What I need from you is a paper expressing your opinion of the case as well as how it relates to the reading for that week. A sample Reflection Paper is available in the Moodle classroom.
