HE220 Introduction to Health Data Analysis

Course Description:

This is an introductory course to health data analysis and biostatistics that covers both descriptive and inferential statistics designed to provide a preparatory background for taking a subsequent course in epidemiology and biostatistics in a four-year degree program. This course will introduce probability and sampling distributions as the foundation for statistical inference; hypothesis testing, confidence intervals, chi-square distribution, and linear regression and correlation.

Course Outcomes:

Upon successfully completing this course with a C or better, students will have completed the following measurable outcomes:

- 1. Examine the importance of biostatistics in public health and medical research.
- 2. Differentiate between observational and experimental studies and recognize the strengths and weaknesses of each type of study.
- 3. Recognize the basic limitations of statistical procedures and know when and how to use them appropriately.
- 4. Interpret statistical results, tables, and figures from public health and medical literature.
- 5. Distinguish and defend the use of appropriate statistical methods in current published public health research.

Course Materials:

- Online access to text and presentations (Moodle)
- Computer access to Excel or another spreadsheet program
- A calculator with square root and exponential notations for this class. *No cell phone calculators allowed*.

Course Comments:
