# HDFS 229: SCHOOL-AGE ADOLESCENT DEVELOPMENT Location: ONLINE Winter 2015

## **Course Description:**

This course focuses on the development of children ages 8–18 years. All domains of development are covered: cognitive, emotional, language, moral, physical, social, spiritual and volitional. The course also includes topics for persons interested in working with children in this age range, e.g. curriculum design, school-age care, building relationships and effective guidance.

#### **Course Outcomes:**

Utilize knowledge of developmental theories to adjust for the needs of individuals aged 5 to 18-years-old in a variety of contexts.
