Course Description: Topics covered will include relations and functions; including linear, quadratic, polynomial, rational, exponential and logarithmic functions. Functions and solving of equations will be emphasized. The use of matrices to solve systems will be introduced.

Course Outcomes:

1. Interpret graphical information, such as identifying types of functions, translations, inverses, intercepts, and asymptotes.

2. Solve a variety of symbolic equations and inequalities, such as rational, absolute value, exponential, radical, logarithmic, and linear systems.

3. Construct appropriate models for real world problems, such as fitting an algebraic function model to a set of data, and system of linear equations.

Prerequisites: MTH 95 (or equivalent) with a grade of "C" or higher

Required Materials:

- We will use a free online textbook and online homework (MyOpenMath)
- Scientific Calculator (not on your phone)
- Regular access to the internet to complete homework

Class Attendance:

Daily Check ups:

At each Mon & Wed class session (except when there is a test), you will be given one/two short problems to be done independently and without notes or text. It will be a problem using skills you learned in the previous class. I will count your 10 highest check ups in your grade.

ICA: We will have occasional in-class activities that you will do with classmates. They will be on an overall topic and only be for 20-30 minutes in class time.

Tests:

There are three (3) 45-minutes in class tests.

• You may use calculators on tests, including graphing and programmable ones, but you may not operate any device that has internet or wireless capability, including computers, pads, or phones. Tests are closed book, but you may bring a 3"x5" index card (hand written on both sides) to help organize your thoughts. No worked out examples.

• Tests will take place in our classroom (please see the calendar for dates and times).

• If you miss one test, that score will automatically be replaced by your Final Exam score up to 75%, so there should be no make-up tests.

Final:

There is a comprehensive final. This will be in class on Monday, June 6 from 5:30 - 7:20 pm. You should make every effort to contact me **before** the scheduled test time if there is any possibility that you may miss the final for an unavoidable reason. There are <u>no make-ups</u> for the final exam. You should not have more than two tests scheduled on a particular day. Let me know if you do.

HELP: If you have questions, PLEASE <u>come to office hours or message me</u> and ask! I have scheduled office hours but you're welcome to schedule other times with me too. Additionally, the <u>Learning Center</u> provides a <u>Math Help Desk</u>—a place you can "drop in" and receive assistance with your math questions. <u>Study groups</u> are encouraged! Many students find that working with classmates is the best way to learn and understand the material. I will do my best to keep all these resources updated on my moodle page.

Expectations: I expect that my students will be involved in class. This includes being present, asking questions and participating in discussions. You should be prepared for class.
