As a result of completing WR 122, students should be able to

- 1. Demonstrate awareness of audience, purpose, and genre in reading and writing.
- 2. Analyze and compose a variety of argumentative texts.
- 3. Use appropriate argumentative elements and strategies in written texts, such as persuasive appeals, counterarguments, and Toulmin and Rogerian methods.
- 4. Practice foundational and advanced research methods by finding, evaluating, incorporating, and citing appropriate sources.
- 5. Write in clear, effective language.

In order to achieve these goals, students will be involved in a variety of tasks. We will pace the work so that one activity builds on the one before, and the readings and projects will complement one another. Communication is key. Attend class; do the work; submit it on time. If you need help, ASK.

Evaluation for the course will be based on

- 1) essays to be worked on independently (or with a group option) and peer or writing center reviewed as needed;
- 2) chapter reflections; and
- 3) attention to videos or other resources posted on Moodle.

WR122 writing is held to at least WR121 proficiency standards. If you have not yet taken WR121 and plan to do so, you may experience difficulties if you have taken WR122 first.

Students may seek extra help with me via Moodle, email, Zoom, or through the writing center.

CLASSROOM REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL STUDENTS AND FACULTY DUE TO COVID-19
