Course Description

This course discusses the biological, social and psychological aspects of human sexual functioning, within a scientific context. Topics include sexual anatomy, sexual response, gender identity, gender roles, sexual orientation, love, contraception, sexually transmitted infections and sexual coercion.

Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, you should be able to meet the following outcomes:

- Articulate the interplay between social and/or natural forces and individuals.
- Use analytical skills to explain, evaluate, and/or predict behavior
- Analyze historical and/or contemporary inequities in society as related to human sexuality.
- Discuss strategies that would facilitate a more equitable society.
- Understand and respect cultural differences as they relate to human sexuality.

Course Requirements

The final grade in this class will be determined by your performance on 3 exams, 1 project, and 5 class activities. The specifics involved in each of these are discussed below:

<u>Tests</u>: There will be 3 tests worth 100 points each over the course of the term. The tests will consist of 50 multiple-choice questions worth 2 points apiece. They will be taken on-line at the Moodle site for this course and you will have 50 minutes to complete them. To allow for instances in which you are unable to take the test, the final exam (see below) will be used as a makeup exam. If you take all 3 tests and the final exam, you will be allowed to drop your lowest score. You will usually have 2-3 days to take each test and may do so from any computer both on and off campus, which should eliminate timing problems and the possibility of missing a deadline. If something happens to your connection or computer during the test, please notify me **immediately** via e-mail and I will reset it (as soon as I can) and you may start over. If I am unable to reset your test before the deadline, you will have extended time to complete the test.

<u>Final Exam</u>: There will be one final exam worth 100 points. The final will be taken online during finals week and be similar in format to the 3 regular tests except it will be comprehensive. You may use the final to replace one of your low test scores, replace a missing test, or you may opt out of the final if you have taken all three regular tests and are satisfied with your grade.

Project: There will be 1 project worth 50 points assigned during the term. The first part of the project (25 points) involves writing an annotated bibliography on an assigned contraceptive device (see Moodle site for details). Bibliographies will be written **individually** and are due by the end of the day (11:55 p.m.) on the date indicated on the course outline. Summaries must be at least 100 words per source. All bibliographies must be submitted through the Moodle site. Please see the Annotated Bibliography assignment for a step-by-step guide in how to do this. Also, if you do not have Microsoft Word or WordPerfect, please save your file as an rtf (rich text format) file before submitting it via the digital dropbox (instructions for this are also found in the bibliography guideline). Bibliographies will be graded on content, organization and grammar/punctuation and must be typed and double-spaced. If you cannot complete your bibliography by the due date, you can turn it in anytime after that (until the last day to take the final exam) for up to 80% of total points possible. The second part of the project (25 points) involves a group presentation on the same topic (see Moodle site for details). Group members should try and meet outside of class as their schedule permits. In addition, there will be one class day set aside for groups to meet (see course outline). We will not meet for official class during this day. Group presentations will take place over two class days (see course outline). In order to get full credit for this part of the project, you need to participate in both creating and presenting the project (you need to be in class the day your group presents). Activities: We will also be conducting 6 activities worth 10 points each over the course of the term. All activities will consist of completing assigned work on the CourseMate site for this textbook. To allow for unforeseen circumstances when you cannot complete an activity by the

due date, only 5 of the 6 activities count toward the determination of your final grade (allowing you to miss one activity without it affecting your grade in class).

<u>Grades</u>: Final grades will be assigned based on the total number of points earned during the course. You will be assigned to the letter grade corresponding to your percentage according to the table below:

90% and above = A 80% - 89% = B 70% - 79% = C 60% - 69% = D 59% and below = F

<u>Moodle</u>: All students who are on the class roster will be enrolled in the Moddle site for this course during the 1st week of classes. You will take all your tests on Moodle in addition to accessing your grades, topic outlines, study guides, internet links, handouts and class activities. There will also be some group discussion that may occur on the Moodle site.

<u>CourseMate</u>: All activities will be completed at the CourseMate website for the textbook required for this course. All students are required to have an access code for this website (textbooks purchased at the bookstore come with the access code for no additional price). The access code comes with access to the e-book, so those students who do not wish to have a paper version of the textbook can purchase the access code only directly from the publisher.

<u>Preparedness</u>: Please come to class prepared to discuss the reading assignments. In addition, if you have missed class, you should check the Moodle site for handouts or class activities that may be due.
