Overview and Introduction

This course covers seven basic religions originating in India, China, and Japan. They represent distinctive perspectives that have grown to characterize an Asian philosophical view which differs significantly from western philosophies. It is good, then, to keep an open mind in this survey as we wrestle with age old religious questions and their impact in shaping these important and ancient cultures.

Surveys cultures and religions of the eastern world with a focus on the importance of inner spiritual development, compassion, tolerance, and commitment to balance in the social order. Includes understandings of Hinduism, Buddhism, Taoism, and Sikhism.

Course Requirements

The final grade in this class will be determined by performances on assignments and activities shown below.

Exams: There will be 4 major exams worth 50 points each given over the course of the term which are all required. Questions will be written and comprehensive so Essay Blue Books are required. These may be purchased at the book store or café. In most cases make-ups for missed exams will be penalized one letter grade.

Re-Take Option: For those who complete the exams on schedule there will be an opportunity to repeat an One of the first 3 exams of you're your choice to receive a higher score. Sorry, but due to time restrictions in Week 10 Re-Taking Exam 4 is not an option. All repeats and make-ups will be given during the Final Exam period. Only one Make Up or Re-Take may be allowed with this option.

Reflection Paper: There will be a 3-5 page paper worth 25 points relating the topics of the course to personal self exploration.

Research Paper: Toward the end of the course a 3-5 page paper worth 25 points will be required examining one of the topics presented during the term. Hand outs describing the assignment will be distributed

<u>Class Activities</u>: There will be in-class activities worth 5 points each given randomly throughout the quarter. Students will need to complete 5 of these for full credit. Those successfully completing all 6 will receive 5 points extra credit. <u>No make ups or late activities will be accepted. Please, don't even ask!</u>

<u>Small Group Exam:</u> A comprehensive group overview worth 25 points comprised of objective and essay questions will be given in the last week of class. There will be no study guide for this exam. Scores will be based on the performance of the groups overall.
