After successfully completing this course you will be able to:

- 1. Distinguish types and breeds.
- 2. Safely handle and restrain a horse.
- 3. Understand the skeletal and muscle anatomy, physiology and behavior of the horse.
- 4. Age a horse using wear patterns on teeth.
- 5. Explain basic equine reproductive physiology, and breeding methods.
- 6. Select and balance a quality feed ration.
- 7. Practice good equine husbandry and management.
- 8. Write a formal scientific laboratory report.

Attendance Policy:

Good attendance is essential to ensure academic success in this course. Come to class, come to the lab, it's that simple. If you absolutely have to miss a day, grab me and I'll try and help you get caught up. I will not release my personal notes to students however, so it is a good idea to get notes from a class peer.

Labs and Lab Write Ups:

You will be required to formally write up 4 of the laboratories throughout the quarter. You can choose which labs you would like to write-up. These write-ups will be due the following laboratory period. Please refer to the lab write-up handout.

Each lab will have a lab worksheet that will be due the following Thursday, submitted via Moodle.
