### **Course Description**

The second course in the calculus sequence for students majoring in mathematics, science and engineering. Topics include techniques of integration, numerical integration, improper integrals, applications of integration, and an introduction to differential equations.

#### Homework

Homework will be done using MyMathLab. Homework will generally be due one week after the topic has been introduced.

## **Group Activities & Participation**

We will be doing a lot of active learning in the class; however, there will often be a day specifically for group activities (usually on Thursday, see Calendar). No makeups, you must come to class to earn up to full credit on the group activities. Participation is a factor. At the end of each week, I will give you points for your participation in class. If you do not come to class on group activity days, you miss the points for the activity and the points for participation. Each day is worth points! (I will talk more about this in class on the first day of class) For participation only, I will excuse 2 days.

## **Quizzes**

There will be 6 quizzes this term (on Fridays), there are no make-ups for quizzes, but I will drop your lowest score. The Quizzes will cover in class material from the prior week. Each quiz will roughly be about five minutes and will typically be one to two questions.

#### **Presentations**

Almost every week, your group will present some mathematical content that I will assign. You will present as a group, and each person will be graded on how much they participate in the presentation. Expect each group to present for roughly 6 to 8 minutes.

#### **Tests:**

There will be 2 tests (50 minutes) during the term (in class during week 4 and week 7, respectively) and a cumulative final exam (1 hour and 50 minutes). There will also be an integral proficiency test. The proficiency test must be passed at a 95% or higher to receive any credit. You may retake the proficiency test up to 2 times. Please speak to me **BEFOREHAND** if you have to miss a test (only extreme circumstances will be excused). (See the Course Calendar for dates)
