Course Description

Surveys the cultural, social, economic, and political development of Latin America from ancient America to the present.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to: Articulate an understanding of the regions' prehistoric and colonial antecedents. Describe variation among European colonies in the region in regards to economic and social structure as well as labor systems. Demonstrate an understanding of how the region's history changed over time. Articulate an understanding of the global context within which Latin American Colonization unfolded. Demonstrate an

understanding of casualty in regards to 20th century political developments in Latin America and of U.S. military and economic interventions in the region. Draw conclusions about the contingency of current events based on the historical events that preceded them.

<u>**Research Paper**</u> – You will write a 4-5 page research paper on an approved topic of your choosing within the sphere of Latin American history. This will be a well written paper specifically describing and analyzing the background and impact that <u>one</u> of the following had on Latin American history: <u>influential historical figures</u>, key events, or a significant issue that <u>has affected a section of Latin American history</u>.

The idea for the topic of your paper needs to be presented within a one page written proposal submitted for approval several weeks prior to the research paper due date. The due dates for both the proposal and finished paper are indicated below in order to provide time for your research and writing.

You will need to use footnotes to cite your evidence within the paper, and do need to include a <u>bibliography</u>. You will need a minimum of 3 sources, but a maximum of 5 sources to use within the paper. Please use double spacing, 12 point font, one inch margins, and one side written pages. Chicago-style rather than MLA writing format is preferred in this class within the text and the bibliography. Here is a quick reference link to assist with your bibliography using Chicago-style:

Source requirements: You will need to use one primary source, while the remainder list of sources should be secondary sources, <u>if you use a total of 3 sources</u> for the paper. At the same time, you need a minimum of 2, and up to 3, primary sources, with the remainder being secondary sources <u>if you use 5 total sources</u>.

Topic proposal due date : October 22, 2019.

- The topic proposal should be a one page description of your selected topic submitted at the beginning of class. This can include any possible, but not necessarily confirmed, sources to be used, along with a potential thesis statement.

- **Finished research paper due**: <u>Tuesday, December 3, 2019</u> at the beginning of class, one week before the final exam.
