DEAN OF STUDENTS: CC105 (x420)

The Dean of Students is responsible for the administration and supervision of all student services. Student service programs include the College Center, Campus Programs, Guidance Services, Financial Aids, Admissions and Records, Placement, Athletics, and Developmental Center. In addition, the Dean of Students is the administrator responsible for coordinating due process procedures for student grievances. The goal of the office is to provide services which are responsive to student needs. If you have suggestions or criticisms concerning any of the services, contact the Dean of Students office.

STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS OFFICE: CC213 (x226)

The new Student Organizations Office is the central location for all LBCC clubs and organizations and is where students should go if they want to join a particular interest club or form one of their own. It is also the main office for the LBCC Student Association.

If you would like to become involved in a leadership program, join or form a club or organization, voice a complaint or suggestion, or obtain academic credit for leadership involvement, then go to the Student Organizations Office and talk to the Coordinator of Student Development. You won't be sorry you did.

STUDENT PROGRAMS: CC213 (x226)

Each year, funds are allocated for a well-balanced activities program that will be both educational and entertaining. Student programs include:

Music—Chautauquas (Coffee Houses) every Wednesday and Jam Sessions (Open Mikes) every Friday (where you're always invited to perform) both are held in the Alsea/Calapooia Room from 11:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. There are also several noon and/or evening concerts per term in the Forum or Alsea/Calapooia Room.

Lectures and Symposiums—An offering of lectures and symposiums on a variety of current interest topics will be held throughout the academic year in the Alsea/Calapooia Room and the Forum.

Films and Video Tapes—Several films are shown each term. Usually they are shown in the Alseal Calapooia Room on Thursdays. In addition, video tapes are shown in the Fireside Room at various times during the year.

Special Events—This area includes dances (approximately two per term), the Children's Christmas Party, Dinner Theatres, etc.

Exact schedules of all of the above happenings can be found in the Student Organizations Office and College Center Office at the beginning of each term. Most importantly, your input is needed to assist in providing programs that will be of interest to you. It is also possible to gain valuable experience and academic credit for assisting with Student Activities programming. For further information about your involvement in programming, contact the Coordinator of Student Development (CC213).

CLUBS AND ORGANIZATIONS: CC213 (x226)

There is a wide variety of LBCC student clubs and organizations from skiing, to rodeo, to nursing, to management, etc. If you'd like to be a member of one of these, contact the Coordinator of Student Development and he/she will put you in touch with the right people.

It's also relatively simple to form your very own club. Once again, contact the Coordinator of Student Development for instructions on how this is done.

Many faculty and staff are interested in assisting and interacting with student groups. Names of these people are available in the Student Organizations Office. If you're planning on forming your own club, these people can help you out.





STUDENT ASSOCIATION: CC213 (x226)

Every student that takes credit courses at this school is a member of the Associated Students of Linn-Benton Community College (ASLBCC). Student Association representatives act as liasons between LBCC students and the faculty, administration and LBCC Board of Directors. The Student Association can exercise substantial influence on institutional policy formulation and implementation.

If you would like to have more input into how your school is run, develop leadership skills, meet new people and become involved in interesting projects; then get involved in the student association. Your involvement will be both interesting and educational.

If you would like more detailed information on how the student association is run, stop by CC213 and talk to the Coordinator of Student Development.

You can also become involved with the student association without being an officer. Getting yourself appointed to a college committee is simple and gives you the opportunity to voice your concerns on various college policy decisions.

Whether you want to be a student association officer or a committee member or you just want information about your school or have a complaint or suggestion, go to CC213 and talk to your student representatives or the Coordinator of Student Development.



COLLEGE COMMITTEES: CC213 (x226)

Would you like more input into the decision making process of LBCC? If so, contact the Coordinator of Student Development and he/she will assist you in being appointed to one of the seven college committees. These committees serve a variety of purposes and provide students an opportunity to participate in institutional decisions.

Listed below are the committees and a very brief description of their respective functions:

Admissions and Grade Standards: review special admission cases, scholarship problems, and can initiate modifications in admissions and grade standards.

Publications: advisory to all college student publications.



COLLEGE CENTER SERVICES: CC214 (x283)

The College Center provides a large variety of services for the convenience of students, staff and the community. These services include such things as food sales, game room, housing referral, ticket sales, lost and found, and a number of special events provided for the LBCC students and the surrounding community. For general information and referral, come to the College Center window.

Student of the Month: assists in selection of outstanding LBCC student each month.

Bookstore: recommends policy regarding the college bookstore.

Vice-President's Advisory: advises the Vice-President in matters relating to functions of that area.

Learning Resources Center: advises in the development of the library and media to best meet the needs of students and staff.

Dean of Instruction's Advisory: advises the Dean on matters pertaining to the instructional unit of the College.

FOOD: CC214 (x283)

Food is a topic which interests most everybody. The College Center Food Service offers a wide variety from which to choose. The Commons has a large self-service area with a variety of food and drinks. It's open from 7:30 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. and a hot dish area is open from 11:15 a.m. to 1:15 p.m. for lunch. The Santiam Room (restaurant style) is open for breakfast from 8:30 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. and for lunch from 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Of course, these hours will vary during finals week, vacations and summer term. If all else fails, there's always the vending machines in the southeast corner of the Commons.

LOST AND FOUND: CC214 (x283)

Lose something? Find something? Go to the College Center window to find it or turn it in. A file is kept on all lost and found items that are brought to this office.

HOUSING: CC214 (x283)

Looking for a place to crash or maybe you've got a house or a room to rent? If either of these is the case, contact the College Center Office. There is a file where housing possibilities are listed and you can either find housing or rent housing through this service.

TICKET SALES: CC214 (x283)

Tickets for plays, concerts, lectures, etc. both at LBCC and in Corvallis, Lebanon, Sweet Home, and Albany can be purchased at the College Center window. The College Center is also an outlet for *Lipman's Ticket Place* so it is possible to purchase tickets to a variety of Portland events.

BULLETIN BOARDS: CC214 (x283)

Do you have something you want posted (dance, speaker, sell a car, etc.)? Bring your posters to the College Center and have them stamped. The College Center Office will take the responsibility of posting them on the 20 available campus bulletin boards.

SCHEDULING MEETINGS AND EVENTS: CC214 (x283)

If your group needs a room to hold a meeting or a facility to put on a show, you may be able to reserve it through the College Center. The College Center is responsible for room and facility reservations in both the College Center building and the Forum. Of course, you must be an official LBCC organization or a small fee will be charged for the use of the facility.

LOCKERS: CC214 (x283)

There are a limited number of on-campus lockers available to handicapped students. Depending on usage, there are sometimes lockers available to non-handicapped students also. Contact the College Center Office at the beginning of each term for further information.

CHANGE: CC214 (x283)

Got a dollar bill or a five or maybe you're lucky enough to have a ten, but you'd really like a few ones and some quarters and dimes? If so, the staff at the College Center window will see that you get the change you need.

RECREATION: CC212 (x283)

Ping-Pong, Billiards, Video Games, and Chess—all of these are available in the Recreation Room. You can check out the billiards, ping-pong and chess equipment at the Student Organizations Office and the College Center window. All equipment can be used for a small fee. This is a good way to spend your between class hours if your study load is small.

Every year the Association of College Unions International (ACU-I) sponsors campus tournaments in ping pong, billiards and chess. The campus tournament winners are sent on to regional contests. These tournaments are normally held during the fall and winter. For additional information, contact the Student Organizations Office.

For you bowling enthusiasts, the College sponsors the LBCC Bowling Team which also bowls in the ACU-I regional tournaments.



COMMUTER: CC210 (x314)

Every week during fall, winter, and spring terms (except for exam week and vacations) the Commuter, a student-managed newspaper, is available with all the news that's fit to print about LBCC. Pick up the paper and read it or write a letter to the editor or, better yet, join the Commuter staff as a reporter. photographer, ad salesperson, graphic artist, or editor.





DRAMA F108 (x287)

Want to try your hand at acting, directing or working backstage on a theatre production? Currently, the LBCC drama department produces one show per term. In addition students also have an opportunity to plan and produce shows. Anyone can participate as long as they are full or part-time students at LBCC. If you're not in the play, at least come join the audience: you're in for a treat.

MUSIC: H213 (x410 or 411)

If you sing or play a musical instrument, check out the Music Department. There is a LBCC Jazz Band, Swing Choir, and Concert Choir which perform each term for the College and community. These concerts are always entertaining and usually free.

GUIDANCE SERVICES: CC110 (x351)

Here's a good place to go with all kinds of problems you might have whether they're academic, vocational, personal, or health.



ACADEMIC ADVISING: CC110 (x351)

Your academic success may very well be dependent on a good advising program. LBCC's goal is to provide current, accurate information and qualified advisors for all students who need assistance. This includes part-time as well as full-time students.

If you're a new student, see a counselor the first time you register and have your test results interpreted to see that you get started on the right track.

If you have a declared major, you will be assigned an advisor from the instructional staff. It's your responsibility to také the appropriate courses for your specific major, so find your advisor when you're unsure of which classes to take. If you have not declared a major, see a counselor when you need assistance.

COUNSELING: CC110 (x351)

Academic, vocational, or personal problems? Go talk with one of LBCC's friendly, helpful counselors. They're available between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. weekdays and from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. during the first week of classes.

CAREER INFORMATION: CC110 (x351)

Here you can obtain information on the various programs offered through LBCC as well as receive help in making a career decision. A Career Information System computer terminal is available for your use in selecting a career or learning more about the one you have selected.

HANDICAPPED SERVICES: CC110 (x351)

The staff at the Guidance Center is ready to assist physically disabled people with any problems they may encounter while attending LBCC. Please feel free to come to CC-110 with problems and suggestions.

The Greater Albany Shuttle will pick up on call any handicapped person who resides within five blocks of their established route. They also have one bus which can accommodate persons confined to a wheel chair.

HEALTH SERVICES: CC109 (x357)

How to stay well is the emphasis here. Some available services are health information, first aid, pregnancy tests and health counseling. It is staffed by a registered nurse and a first aid attendant. It is open 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. weekdays.



HEALTH INSURANCE: CC109 (x357)

The LBCC student health insurance plan might seem expensive to you but it's probably the cheapest insurance you'll ever buy. If you're not covered at work or by your parents or spouse, it's worthwhile. Information and insurance forms are available in CC109. Please purchase insurance at the registration window.



FINANCIAL AIDS: CC107 (x375)

If you're having difficulty paying the bills and tuition at the same time or maybe you're not a student because you don't feel you can afford it, well then the Financial Aids Office may be able to help you. LBCC does not want you to be prevented from furthering your education because of financial difficulties. Types of financial assistance include:

National Direct Student Loans (NDSL)

Emergency Loans

College Work Study

There are also other special loan, grant, scholarship, and work programs available. For specific information on the above plus other programs, go to the Financial Aids Office.

JOB PLACEMENT: CC119 (x297)

If you need a part-time job to keep beans on the table while you attend LBCC, talk to the Placement Office staff. Or if you run short the last week before payday, pick up a temporary job to put some shekels in your pocket. Summer employment? The Placement Office has information on this too.

Then when you're finally graduated, the Job Placement Office is there to help you locate a full-time job.

Need help in resume writing or setting up a job search plan? Placement staff is standing by.

Remember, too, as a former student at LBCC you can continue to use the Placement Office for as long as you wish.

ADMISSIONS AND VETERANS INFORMATION OFFICE: CC112 (x346)

The "front door" of Linn-Benton Community College—that is the Admissions and Veterans Information Office. For general information on admissions procedures, incoming veterans admissions, course offerings and graduation requirements, the Admissions and Veterans Information Office can assist you.

A plastic I.D. card is issued to every student registering for ten or more credits. Students who register for less than ten credits may also have an I.D. card by requesting from the Registration Office. This card shows the student's name, social security number, and birthdate, and can be used to cash checks, gain admission to special events, check-out recreation room equipment, etc.



The Registrar's Office can assist you with information in many areas such as registration procedures, tuition and fees, adding and dropping classes, transcript requests, withdrawal from school and grade problems.

As you can see, all of the above items are extremely important and you can find help with any of them in CC108 or CC112.

Information on the above is also contained in the Linn-Benton Community College catalog.

VETERANS OFFICE: CC121 (x266)

If you are a currently enrolled veteran with questions about Veterans' benefits, this is the office to come to.

We can assist you with course schedules, regulations, eligibility or unanticipated pay problems.


We have a veterans representative here to aid you with any problems or questions you might have.

DO YOU:

Need to improve your skills in reading, writing, spelling or math?

Take classes or just drop in. They have both regular classes and individualized labs.

Just need to brush up where you've gotten rusty?

Drop in, talk to a friendly staff member, and see how to remember what you've forgotten.

Have just one question you need answered about reading, writing, or math?

Stop in and ask—you'll be surprised how quickly you'll get results.

Need help from the expert sitting next to you in class?

Apply for a tutor—it's free and friendly.

Have trouble keeping up with hitting the books?
Study skills and other helpful hints may help you juggle them.

Need help cutting through red tape?

Someone can sharpen the scissors and point out the yellow brick road.

Find that tests get you down?

Learn secrets of test taking that your teachers never told.

Want to know your abilities in reading and writing? Take diagnostic tests—no strings attached.

Need help with writing?

Try the Writing Lab—no credit but no tests. Just help with anything from research papers to punctuation.

Need a high school diploma? GED tests will certify you.

Want college credit for what you know—without a class?

Take CLEP tests. They cost, but they're cheaper than the class in time and money.

Want to change your career or find one?

Counselors may recommend various interest tests available at the Developmental Center.

Try the Developmental Center for whatever ails your study habits. You'll find the Study Skills Center, Math Lab, and Testing Center may be just what the doctor ordered.

SPORTS ACTIVITIES OFFICE: AC102 (x311)

Intercollegiate Athletics

The Intercollegiate Athletic Program at Linn-Benton Community College enables Linn-Benton students to participate against other community colleges or collegiate schools in the State of Oregon and the Northwest. Linn-Benton possesses a comprehensive program meeting needs for both men and women. The activities anticipated for the 1978-79 school year include the following: Men's and Women's Cross Country, Women's Volleyball, Men's and Women's Basketball, Men's and Women's Track, Co-educational Golf, Men's and Women's Tennis, and Men's Baseball. There is a possibility that wrestling might be initiated during the 1978-79 school year. Anyone interested in participating in intercollegiate athletics should contact the Athletic Department in the Activities Center. Students competing in intercollegiate athletics must abide by structured eligibility rules so it will be important for any interested student to understand early enough in the school year exactly what is expected of them regarding eligilibity. It is hoped that students who do not meet eligibility rules can meet their competitive needs in the area of intramurals.

Intramural Sports

A variety of intramural sports are provided for men and women in both team and individual activities. Team and individual activities are provided on campus with team play usually taking place in the Activity Center Building during the lunch hour. Individual activities are also available at this time as well as during the open gym hours during the day, in the evenings and on Saturdays.

Sports club teams such as volleyball, basketball, soccer, and softball are sponsored through the intramural program. The teams participate in the Albany and Corvallis League Recreation programs throughout the year.

Swimming and racketball are available through the YMCA with a small charge being assessed for each visit.


Current activities and additional information are available through the Activities Center Office.




PARKING: CC125 (x338)

Specific questions concerning parking should be directed to Campus Security. However, some general rules to remember are parking is available in lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 with the exception of handicapped spaces. Also keep your speed under 20 m.p.h.

CAMPUS SECURITY: CC125 (x338)

Any question about parking rules and regulations? Questions concerning security of yourself and your property? Better contact campus security before they have to contact you.



MEDIA SERVICES: LRC109 (x390)

All projectors, recorders, and various and sundry electronic instructional media equipment are circulated and serviced through the Media Services Department. Television facilities include a small studio, cameras, and assorted gear. If you have a presentation or a class project which requires display materials or AV equipment, you can get assistance from Media.

GRAPHIC SERVICES: LRC105 (x246)

Graphics provides LBCC with most of its printing, including many instructional workbooks and manuals which are sold through the Bookstore. The graphic artists, photographer, and typesetter also help provide public relations materials for the school.



CHECK CASHING: CC130 (x334)

So you need some pocket change and all you've got is a couple of checks. Well, if the checks are from a local bank and you've got some identification such as a LBCC I.D. and/or a drivers license then you can cash a check up to about \$10.00 at the Business Office Window (CC130).

STUDENT RIGHTS, FREEDOMS, RESPONSIBILITIES, AND DUE PROCESS: CC105 (x420)

Every LBCC student has certain rights and freedoms. These rights and freedoms are very similar to those you have as a citizen of the United States. Of course, along with those rights and freedoms go a certain number of responsibilities that can't be overlooked. If you do overlook your responsibilities as an LBCC student and get yourself in hot water, there is a system of due process which has also been outlined by the College and LBCC students. This same system of due process can be used when you feel you have been wronged by an LBCC faculty member or administrator. As mentioned previously, the Dean of Students is the LBCC grievance (due process) specialist. If you have a grievance and feel you have exhausted all other methods of solving the problem, then you should ask the Dean of Students for assistance.

There is a small book available in the Student Organizations Office or the Dean of Students Office which outlines all your rights, freedoms, responsibilities and due process as an LBCC student. If you want a detailed description of the above, go pick one up.



BOOKSTORE: CC111 (x277)

Books, paper, pencils, magazines, manuals, birthday cards, etc. are all available at the LBCC Bookstore. If an instructor requires a textbook, you should be able to locate it in the bookstore.

Books returned in new condition accompanied by the cash register receipt will receive full refund within the first two weeks of each term. After the first two weeks they are considered used books. You may sell used books from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. every Friday or any day of finals week.

Bookstore hours the first two weeks of each term are 8:00 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. Regular hours are 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday with the store closing at 4:30 p.m. on Friday. It's also open from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. on Tuesday and Wednesday.

HOW TO LIVE CHEAPLY

If you want to cut down on your living expenses, there are several things you can do. One of them is to use common sense.

FOOD TIPS:

There are many supermarkets wanting your business. Watch the newspaper for their special sales; they're normally held toward the end of the week. If you can buy in bulk quantities, it's usually cheaper. Buy food that comes in reusable containers. It's normally a lot cheaper, and you'll be doing Mother Nature a favor. Making a list and sticking to it is a sure cure for over-spending.

HOUSEHOLD GOODS AND CLOTHING:

When you have to purchase things like clothing, appliances, and furniture; try shopping at thrift shops, bargain barns, swap meets, and other similar places. In most cases, you'll find that whatever you wanted new is much less expensive used. Some other places you can try are army surplus stores, garage sales, school-church-laundromat bulletin boards, and damaged freight stores. The classified section of the newspaper is another valuable resource.

LODGING:

The more roommates you can put up with, the less rent you'll have to pay each month. Of course, when you get six people in a two bedroom apartment that sometimes can get to be a little tedious. Make sure you look carefully and check with all your resources (students, College Center Office, classified ads) before you rent.

BOOKS:

Don't go out and buy new books if you can get away with buying used ones. Make sure that when the latest edition is required for a class that it is different from a less expensive, used older edition.

Usually a couple of weeks before classes start, people begin putting up signs advertising their used books. You can buy books this way or buy the used texts at the Bookstore. However, the number of used books in the campus bookstore is usually limited.

Another angle is to share a book with someone else, borrow the book from someone who has taken the class, use the library's books, or sometimes you can check the book out of the public library.

As you can see, saving dollars just takes a little ingenuity and sometimes a little luck.




