Course Description

An introduction to the study of psychological disorders, including issues of diagnosis and treatment. Topics include: models of abnormality; overview of major disorders, including diagnostic considerations; current research on treatment effectiveness; the effects of stress on our psychological wellbeing, and the impact of psychological disorders on society and its legal system.

Course Learning Outcomes

As a result of successfully completing this course, I expect you will be able to:

- Understand and describe basic research methods in psychology
- Understand basic statistics & apply knowledge of statistics to information presented in the media
- Define abnormality from the perspectives of deviance, distress, dysfunction, & danger
- Distinguish the relative merits of models for understanding psychological abnormality
- Identify key approaches to accurate diagnosis
- Explain the structure and content of the DSM-V
- Describe each of the major anxiety disorders and effective treatments for each
- Identify symptoms of depression and mania and discuss genetic factors in each
- Know the central features of eating disorders
- Describe the diagnostic criteria and etiology of schizophrenia
- Describe, discuss, and apply the diathesis-stress paradigm for serious mental illnesses
- Discuss criteria and etiology of depression & bipolar disorder
- Identify developmental factors in personality disorders

Instructor Responsibilities

The current week's content and assignments will be posted on moodle by noon each Monday. I will be available to support your learning when requested. I will hold you accountable by following through with course objectives and

syllabus content. My aim is to facilitate a classroom environment that encourages active, effective and respectful activities, discussion and learning.

Course Requirements

Note: Weekly guizzes, Discussion Forum Activity, and Exams will all take place on moodle outside of class time.

Your final grade in this class will be determined by your performance on the following:

Quizzes: There will be 9 open book online quizzes at the Moodle site for this course (see Table 1 for more information). Item types include true/false, multiple choice, and matching. T/F = 1 point; multiple choice with 1 answer = 1 point; multiple choice with more than one 1 answer = 2 points; matching = 3 points. You will have 20 minutes to take each quiz. Quizzes are available by noon on Monday and are open until 9am the following Monday.

Exams: Two exams will assess your understanding of the course material. Exam 1 covers lecture material and text (chapters 1-7 and 14 pp. 469-473). Exam 2 covers lecture material and text from weeks (chapters 8-15). Items consist of multiple-choice, true/false and matching items.

Class Activity Participation: You will receive credit for participation during in-class activities. Activities designated as earning participation points will be randomly assigned at the beginning of the term and announced before the activity.

Conceptual Learning Assignments: Three assignments will be due during the term. These assignments are designed to assess your overall comprehension of a selected topic.

Discussion Forum Activity: In addition to readings, quizzes and exams, you will participate in forums about topics related to the course. You will be instructed to watch a brief video, listen to a podcast or do a reading and then post your reaction. Your post should reflect an integration of course lecture content and/or your reading with your perspective. You will also respond to at least 1 other classmates' post. Forum activities are posted by noon on Monday and are open until 9am the following Monday. I will only include your 9 highest scores in the determination of your final grade.

Treat these discussion topics and your classmates with respect. We all have unique values and beliefs relating to the subject matter. It is important that you bring your unique perspective to share in a way that is non-dogmatic so that others can "listen" and understand you. I encourage you to ask questions, agree, and disagree with others as much as possible, as long as you do so respectfully. Participating in this class gives you an opportunity to learn the course content, but also to develop your personal understanding about human relations. In order to receive full credit, your forum posts should reflect an integration of the podcast, video or reading assigned for the activity and/or the ideas covered in the weekly text readings. I will enter the Forums to "observe" your progress and sometimes join the discussion. The forum is a good way for you to interact with others in the class and share your perspective and questions and learn about class members. This kind of sharing has the potential to move your experience and thinking to a higher level. Make good use of it! CONFIDENTIALITY In your online discussions you may choose to share personal anecdotes about people you know. Remember to speak from your own perspective. In addition, please protect the confidentiality of others in your life. Refer to them by first initial only (e.g. "T" rather than Thomas). You may also refer to "my sister", "my uncle", "my neighbor" or "my friend".

Attendance: This is a lecture, and student small group and participation class, so attendance is important. Participation activity points are given for in-class activities. Which activity earns participation points is randomly chosen at the beginning of the term and is not announced until the day of the activity.
