



# WASHING OUT HUCK FINN'S MOUTH

Two weeks ago Steven Colbert tweeted, "It's great that they took the N-word out of 'Huckleberry Finn.' Now get to work on 'Moby D-Word."

The lesson for 21st-century audiences reading "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" is that "nigger" used to be the common vernacular, and black people were casually treated as livestock. Part of what we, as readers, are supposed to be is shocked and horrified when we read "Huckleberry Finn." Mark Twain chose his language carefully, using it on purpose to showcase the ignorance of his society at that time.

Alan Gribben, a Twain scholar and a professor at Auburn Montgomery University, along with NewSouth Books, doesn't seem to agree. They'll be releasing a new edition of Mark Twain's classic, Huckleberry Finn, in a single volume with Tom Sawyer. What makes this edition so special is that all 200-plus mentions of the word "nigger" have been removed from Huckleberry Finn, as well as changing "Injun Joe" in Tom Sawyer to "Indian Joe." News of this broke on Jan. 4, when "Huckleberry Finn" became a trending topic on Twitter.

Cue the firestorm of Internet outrage.

"Huckleberry Finn" trended on Twitter for five days, bringing a flood of comments like "somebody white prolly pushed the issue to censor 'nigger' in the Huckleberry Finn books ... don't blame us niggas!

#NotRacistJustHonest" from chakaramelcakes, or "Instead of taking 'nigger' out of 'Huckleberry Finn,' just change it to 'nigga' and slap a Parental Advisory sticker on front," from PartyNBullsh\*t.

Twitter users weren't the only ones who disapproved of the new edition. Elon James White of Salon.com said, "The book, which deals directly with racism, is not better served by erasing the racial slur. The only purpose is to ease the tension that is felt by parents and teachers of students who would read it." David Ulin, in the Books section of the LA Times, said, "Like professor Gribben, I've discussed 'Huckleberry Finn' in the classroom, and it is always difficult and awkward to work around that word. This, however, is precisely why it needs to remain part of our experience of 'Huckleberry Finn.'"

A little closer to home, Peter Jensen, one of Linn-Benton Community College's English instructors, said, "I am against changing old texts to clean up history. How can we teach the painful history of racism in America and judge our progress since Mark Twain if we change the past?"

Jensen's statement strikes the heart of the matter. Yes, the language in "Huckleberry Finn" is shocking to a modern sensibility, even hurtful, not just because of that word, but because of the way black people are treated in the book; the way they're belittled and dehumanized. The heart of "Huckleberry Finn" is Huck's realization that Jim is a human being, equal to Huck, despite what Huck's society might believe. Huck's decision to do the right thing and help Jim escape, in spite of the possible consequences, is the whole point of the book.

"I don't think the edited version of 'Huckleberry Finn' is a good idea," said Dr. Robert Harrison, an instructor in LBCC's American Studies program. "Using the word 'slave' instead of the 'N-word' just wouldn't convey what students need to know about race in America before the Civil War and in Mark Twain's time. It's a big change, and I can't see any legitimate historical or literary reason for it. If ... young people aren't reading "Huckleberry Finn" because it's still too offensive to people, the solution is to educate people, not to give in to their ignorance."

"Nigger" is a hateful, hurtful word. Though it has no place is today's lexicon, it should not be scrubbed from our history. It's awful, but necessary. As George Santayana said, "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it." This is a past we cannot afford to forget. As hurtful as it may be, our memory of it is what gives us the impetus to do better.

#### This day in history ...

#### Jan. 26, 1856: Desperate times ...

A large group of local Native Americans attack the small settlement of Seattle, in the Washington territory. The battle rages for seven hours before the attackers are driven off by Marines and artillery fire from the USS Decatur. Amazingly enough, only two settlers are killed. Germany is the best-selling country for Lego, (it is actually the single largest toy-company in Germany) followed closely by the U.S. The "Star Wars" line is the best-selling Lego theme in the U.S.

#### Jan. 29, 1886: A need for speed ...

Karl Benz patents the Benz Patent Motorwagen, the first commercially available automobile in history. The car also proves to be a success, with numerous improved models. On a side note, the car has a single cylinder, four-stroke engine, 958cc, 0.8 hp engine with a maximum speed of 8 mph. What a speed demon.

#### Jan. 30, 1703: Yikes ...

After two years of waiting and planning, 47 samurai avenge their dead master, Asano Naganori, by killing Kira Yoshinaka. 
# PAYING HOMAGE TO HISTORY'S HEROES

You don't need a spandex suit with underwear on the outside to be a hero. History is full of heroes, many famous, many more obscure. This article focuses on some of the grander figures from our past.

Martin Luther King Jr.
Born in 1929, this Baptist minister and great orator was greatly inspired by the actions and teachings of Gandhi, and decided that

More commonly known as Frederick the Great, he was born the crown prince for the kingdom of Prussia, a scattered, tiny, and backwater kingdom in modern day Germany and Poland. Frederick grew up in an age when Machiavelli's infamous book "The Prince" was considered to be a Bible for leaders. Frederick completely disagreed, and anonymously wrote a book arguing against Machiavelli and his ideals. Upon taking the crown, Frederick immediately established an impressive reputation. Using a military brilliance that was unheard of at the time (Napoleon said Frederick was the greatest tactician ever) united the scattered kingdoms and forged Prussia into a modernized and unified state. Simultaneously he battled against Austrian aggression and attempts to subjugate the German people. In addition to military genius, Frederick was also a fervent believer in the ideals of the French Enlightenment, and was a friend of Voltaire. He promoted religious tolerance, freedom of the press, freedom of speech, use of rationality, and was a huge patron of the arts and education. He died in 1786 sitting in an arm chair in his

study. He requested that he be buried "without pomp and at night" next to his beloved Italian Greyhound.

#### Liu Bei

If any of you have heard this name before, it is probably because you have played one of the "Dynast"



Warriors" video games. Well, Liu Bei is more than a game character, he was a hero. He was born in 161 in China, and was known as being a skilled general and legalist. He eventually became Emperor and established the Shu Han dynasty. He died in 223 and was succeeded by his son. Liu Bei is popular in China and known for being the closest thing to the ideal Confucian ruler. He was a just, loyal, compassionate, intelligent, and caring ruler who established an effective government. It's a little sad that in our modern culture he's largely been relegated to a character in a mediocre game series.

#### Zainab Salbi

Born in Baghdad, Iraq, Ms. Salbi is no stranger to violence, especially against women. She moved to the U.S. when she was 19, and was married in the early 1990's. However, she and her new husband spent their honeymoon traveling to Bosnia and Herzegovina, helping women who had lost their families and were sent to the notorious rape camps there. In 1993 she created the organization Women for Women International, which has since its inception raised over \$80 million in direct aid and helped almost a quarter of a million women in places like Bosnia, Herzegovina, Rwanda, Kosovo, Nigeria, Colombia, Afghanistan, Iraq,

Democratic Republic of Congo, and Sudan. In addition to direct aid, the organization has also helped raise money for loans, education programs, and also helped women start their own businesses. Salbi has been awarded eight awards since 1993.

People like these show that anybody can shape the world they live in. I hope we see more heroes like these magnificent people, and also that we realize how many heroes we have around us that we may not notice. Lastly, may we never forget the sacrifices these people have made to make our world a better place.

Last Wednesday night the LBCC men's basketball team played a great all around game and came out with an 88-80 victory over the visiting Southwestern Oregon Community College Lakers.

LB's leading scorers were sophomore Taylor Roos with 25 points, sophomore Mike Kruesi with 13 points and sophomore Michael Kirkwood who had 11 points. Kirkwood also lead the team with five assists and eight rebounds.

Freshman Josh Garlington had a team high of 10

a double-double.

"We played really well and we really came together as a team. We were really good at looking

for the open man," said freshman Chase Bansemer.

rebounds. He also added nine points, just missing

LB was down early in the game and then came back to shoot 57.1 percent in the first half. They did not shoot as well in the second half at 51.7 percent, but ended up with a 54.4 percent shooting average for the game, which is a great percentage.

"We were down early, then proved we could come back and used a good run to get back in it," said freshman Josh Yundt.

LB had three players in double-figure scoring and two more that had nine points. They were very balanced in the scoring and spread the points around, which helped LB come out on top. LB had a great defensive game; not only did they have eight steals, they also held SWOCC to only 37.7 percent shooting overall and 35.9 percent

"We had good defensive intensity and challenged shots, also we played well as a team and were unselfish," said Head Coach Randy Falk.

SWOCC got 24 points off of the 20 LB turnovers, a number that must go down as the season goes on. On the other hand, LB made 31 shots and had 18 assists on those shots which are a good percentage.

The team motto this year for LB men's basketball is "ICU" which means Intensity, Competitiveness and Urgency. This motto has

helped the team play tough basketball so far this season.

LBCC also won on Saturday night at Umpqua Community College by a score of 72-51. Sophomore Mike Kruesi lead the way for LB with 16 points. Again LB shared the scoring and they ended up having five players in double-figure scoring.

Once again the Roadrunner defense came on strong in the win, Umpqua ended the night shooting a miserable 25.7 percent overall and 16 percent from three point land. LB committed only 11 turnovers and outscored Umpqua 26-9 on bench points.

Overall this was a very successful week for the LBCC men's basketball program. With both win's this week LBCC now has a 8-7 overall record and sits in first place in the South Division with a perfect 5-0 record.

This week LB plays on the road on Friday at Clackamas Community College. On Saturday LB will host Chemeketa at 6 p.m.

Victory Gym is dedicated to the sports of boxing and mixed martial arts. They offer group and individual classes for training, competition and fitness. The coaches and staff are dedicated to helping every member achieve their goals

Brenda and Les Autry, both former LBCC students, co-manage Victory Gym. Brenda earned an associate's degree in business at LBCC and Les spent two terms at LBCC.

"We strive to be a community gym," said Brenda, a former boxer. "We have kids in our classes as young as age 8 all the way up to adults and families."

The Victory Gym is USA/ABF sanctioned. All members need a membership in USA Boxing before they can join, which costs \$45 annually. This membership includes insurance.

The training is intense. Beginners start at two days a week, from 5-6:30 p.m. The workout

# LBCC STUDENT RALLIES TO SAVE CHILD CARE

Next fall, some students may not be able to afford to work.

Employment-Related Day Care (ERDC) is a childcare subsidy plan that is set to be phased out of the state budget beginning in February. With new cuts, workers lose eligibility when they are unemployed for more than 30 days and will be removed from the program to be placed on a waiting list where applicants are awarded benefits in a random lottery system.

To Lisa Bauman, a student who also works two jobs at LBCC, this means when school is out of session over the summer, she will lose eligibility. In the fall when she returns to work and school, she will no longer have help paying for childcare. Hourly childcare expenses will be greater than her wages. She may not be able to work or finish her degree.

One of the biggest concerns is that working families won't be able to afford day care. Parents may have to stop working and go on Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), costing the state more than ERDC.

"As a tax payer, I can't help but to be outraged at the expense of taking this program away," Bauman said.

So Bauman decided to take action.
Bauman is organizing a rally. The
effort has garnered support across campus, the
community, and from child advocacy groups such
as Children First for Oregon and Family Forward
Oregon. Information and flyers are available on the
event blog, saveerdc.blogspot.com, and facebook
group page, Rally to Save ERDC.

On campus, Robert Harrison, advisor of the LBCC Democracy Club, immediately agreed

to help Bauman when she contacted him. Harrison admits he did not know about the issue until Bauman called him. "We are mostly focused on a trip to Egypt," Harrison said, "but we're going to try to help her out. It is a very worthwhile cause." The club sponsored an informational event on Tuesday, Jan. 25.

Bauman will be speaking again in the DAC on Tuesday, Feb. 1 at 12:30 p.m. Information will be updated at Bauman's website.

Children First For Oregon (CFFO), which is participating in the rally, campaigned for ERDC last year when the program faced cuts. The campaign resulted in extended funding through February 2011. CFFO reports "a survey of ERDC recipients done by OSU and UO found that nearly 100 percent of ERDC recipients would be unable to maintain employment without the help they receive from ERDC."

This year as the program is threatened again, Regan Gray, of CFFO, says that cuts to the program will affect entire communities. In addition to families who will lose this resource, day cares will lose business, and day care employees may lose their jobs. In fact, some Oregon Head Start programs have already suffered layoffs from the issue.

Bauman, who is close to earning her associates degree says, "Like many other single parents, my achievement could only have been possible through supplemental childcare assistance from ERDC."

## SCHOOL DAYS IMPACT PARENTS

This is Sarah Kruse's first term at LBCC. With enrollment at an all-time high, she took whatever classes she could get into. Her schedule includes day and evening classes on three of LBCC's campuses. Kruse also works and has two children in elementary school. Her schedule sometimes conflicts with the early release days the Greater Albany School District has implemented this year.

On Wednesday, when her two children get out of school at 1:25 p.m., Kruse will be in class. Fortunately her husband, a stay-at-home dad, will be there to pick up the kids. "We're lucky that way," says Kruse. "A lot of people don't have that option."

According to its website, the Greater Albany School
District has 11 no-school days,
14 early-release Wednesdays,
and three unpaid cut days this
year. LBCC is in session most
of these days, posing a problem
for students with children in the

Albany District.

To help alleviate timetable issues, the Albany School District has partnered with several community organizations. These choices may help parents solve childcare problems, but they can be costly.

The Community
Before & After School Child
Care Program (CAP) provides
supervised activities for \$10, after
a one-time \$35 registration fee.

Albany Parks & Recreation offers themed activities, but only at two of the 16 elementary schools, also for \$10 each day.

Themed events can be found at the YMCA each Wednesday for a one-time \$10 registration fee, which includes a T-shirt. The cost is \$5 for members and \$7 for non-members. One added bonus at this location is that kids can swim in an indoor heated pool.

The Boys & Girls
Club is the most affordable
option, however. Their annual
membership fee is only \$25. There
is no extra fee for care on early-

release days, though there is a \$6 fee on days when a child attends before 10 a.m.

As a last resort, LBCC students may have to choose between missing class or bringing their child(ren) to class with them.


While LBCC's policy prohibits bringing children into college classrooms, it does allow some wiggle room: "Under most circumstances, children are not allowed in classrooms. Faculty may make exceptions to this rule on a case-by-case basis."

While some instructors do allow children to sit in their classrooms on an occasional basis, others expressly state in their syllabi that children are not allowed. It is a good idea for parents to contact their instructors as soon as they realize there are conflicts with their class schedules and those of their children. Many instructors are parents, too, and understand. Oftentimes, tests, assignments and attendance arrangements can be worked out when instructors are aware of the students' needs.

# PRESIDENT ADDRESSES SCHOOL FINANCES AT BUDGET MEETING

Our country is in some serious financial trouble, and whether you know a lot or a little about the details of it, you still have most likely heard about or felt the effects of it in some way.

Since water rolls down hill, everyone is truly affected, from the very peaks of our government right down to our community, jobs, families and our schools.

That is what the first budget meeting here at LBCC on Friday, Jan. 21 was about. The meeting concerned our school and our upcoming school year budget for 2011-12.

The state builds budgets biannually. Currently, the biennium is in the 2009-11 year. The state of Oregon budget is at a \$3.6 billion shortfall.

LBCC builds theirs annually. The state has up to \$417 million in funds, set specifically for community colleges, which is a fund that is divided between 17 community colleges throughout Oregon including LBCC. That will be reduced by \$4 million, which is what our school will build its expected budget off of.

However, that money is not just freely given to our school in full. In fact, for every school year, the amount of money that is divided to each school from the community college fund is based off of the total attendance percentage for each of the previous three years.

When looked at in detail, this spreads the amount our school gets per student a little thinner. Because of this, and the current nationwide budget crisis downward trickle, LBCC has a greater budget shortfall.

As of recently this stands at \$2,317,448, which was a slightly larger amount before our board and administrators got together and figured ways to make up for some of this loss. They still have a ways to go, though they seem confident they can find resolution.

The school board is considering approving a \$7 increase in tuition, starting next summer term, and then another \$5 increase for the following year.

"We hope that by the time we get through this next biennium, we'll have stabilized economically as a state and we'll not have to rely so heavily on the backs of our students" said Greg Hamann, LBCC president.

The tuition increase, however, only makes up for 40 percent of the shortfall. The other 60 percent will be cut from expenditures, which could likely include cutting certain classes, but how many and which ones are unknown at this time.

We will know more in the coming months, as the school's budget outline is due to be completed sometime in Iune

# CHANGES IN LB FINANCIAL AID POLICIES

When you attend college on a limited budget, financial aid is often a major source of income. Students depend on aid to pay for tuition, books and living expenses, but what happens when the government or college departments make changes to your account that affect your financial aid?

After standing in long lines to get into the LBCC Bookstore and then standing in another line to check out at the register, the last thing anyone wants to hear is "you have no money in your account."

**How to Prevent Holds** 

Know applicable deadlines

Make satisfactory academic progress

Report required information

Check your status online

That is what happened to several students trying to purchase books, and they did not realize it until they arrived at the bookstore

checkout counter on Jan 5.

"I was told I had a negative balance when I should have had a positive balance," said Whitney Bruce, a student at LBCC.

For students depending on funds to be available on Jan 5, there were immediate feelings of panic. Would they have to withdraw from school? How would they be able to meet their financial obligations?

Lines rapidly shifted from the bookstore to financial aid.

For most of the students there was immediate relief, for others problems remained.

"We understood that students were frustrated," said bookstore manager Lawrence LaJoie. "We held the student's books for them and gave them a pass to bypass the lines once the problem was corrected." What happened?

"Financial Aid had added a software patch to the Banner operating system that caused the student account to show a zero balance," LaJoie said.

Banner is an operating system that integrates all student systems from Financial Aid, Admissions, Registration, Bookstore and the Business Office. In order for the system to function correctly, upgrades and patches are done routinely.

This patch had to be in place in order for students to get their actual disbursement of credit balances on the correct date. The problem was brought to the attention of financial aid that

morning and the assistant director and computer services Banner consultant were able to find a solution by 2 p.m.

"This problem was not limited to LBCC. It was a software problem that

affected all schools that use Banner software," said the director of financial aid, Bev Gerig. LBCC routinely installs software upgrades and patches. Any time a law is enacted related to federal student funding, it impacts financial aid. Multiple changes are done in software every year in order to process changes in the FAFSA and to be able to deliver federal financial aid dollars to students.

"It is sometimes challenging, but we spend many hours testing and analyzing upgrades and patches to make sure they work and will not impact students," said Gerig. "Unfortunately, there will always be times when we miss something or Banner misses something that can cause problems beyond our control."

Will it happen again? Maybe. As long as changes are mandated, there is the possibility that it will happen again.

#### "COMPANY MEN" REFLECTS ECONOMIC CRUNCH

The burden of the now dubbed "great recession" has not gone without notice by the film industry.

"The Company Men" chooses to follow suit, introducing us to Bobby Walker (Ben Affleck) and Gene McClary (Tommy Lee Jones) who have each fallen into the same hole as millions of Americans: unemployment.

Having spent the better part of his professional life employed by GTX, Bobby finds himself out of a job with nothing but a three month severance to show for his 12 years of loyal work. Bobby begins his journey to reenter the job market and quickly finds that the value he has placed on himself is not being recognized by his potential employers.

Meanwhile Gene, Bobby's mentor and ex-boss, watches helplessly as his friend and colleague Jim Salinger (Craig T. Nelson) panders to the shareholders in order to extract every last cent possible from the company they spent their whole lives building. Adamantly voicing his belief that the company owes its previous successes to the loyalty of its workers, Gene too is soon found to be the victim of the downsizing.

Writer and director John

Wells constructed each character to feel the effects of unemployment differently – Bobby, for instance, was left with feelings of inadequacy in the face of financial foreclosure, while Gene's perspective was considerably more existential. On the twilight of his professional life he looks back on the now dilapidated warehouse that once harbored employment for 6,000 "honest men making an honest wage" with nothing but disappointment.

This grim portrait of unemployment, while painted entirely unapologetically, is not without its own shortcomings. Nelson's character is more often depicted as a self serving bourgeois caricature than the supposed best friend we are told he is to Jones. In fact, most of the emotional impact between the two characters relies heavily on musical cues awkwardly struck in attempts to manipulate the audience's sense of compassion.

The ensemble cast did, however, help to instill the very prevalent undertones and stigmas attached to contemporary unemployment. Regardless of the occasional emotional misfire, it accomplished, with a fair share of cleverness, its ultimate goal of an honest depiction of the many facets surrounding our dependence on employment.

# MARQUETTE GUMBO SWINGS AT THE BENTON CENTER

On Friday, Jan. 21, the musical duo Marquette Gumbo did a set in the lounge of LBCC's Benton Center in Corvallis.

That's what is magical about the music of Marquette Gumbo. Everything about their tone, styling, and sound of their music makes one hearken back to a time where steam ships were the fastest form of transportation

Slick banjo tunes, dreamy clarinet interludes and the elegant twangs of Casproviak's steel guitar make the listener feel light and happy, and the conversational tone they capture puts you in a scene; a time and place, not just a chair in the Benton Center student lounge.

I applaud and admire these two troubadours for their dedication to a musical styling that has long since been tossed to the wind in the way Huckleberry Finn has; we only endure it when we are required to or when it is a family tradition. Beam and Casprowiak are attempting to bring back the good times as well as the feelings of enchantment through music and the art of conversation that existed in early 20th century. They make one reminisce of a time when music was for more than money and fame; a time when music existed to entertain and bring wandering souls together under one sound.



# "KING'S SPEECH" IS A ROYAL DELIGHT

"The King's Speech" is about so much more than what the title implies. It is about family relationships, friendships, and the dedication of a loving woman.

Starring Colin Firth as the unexpected King George VI and Helena Bonham Carter as Queen Elizabeth, "The King's Speech," follows the

section of London. It is in the office of Logue, peeled paint and shabby furniture

combined, where Bertie learns that he can indeed speak in public without stammering. It is because of the queen's determination to raise a stable family that the future king has

a loving relationship with the couple's young daughters, Margaret and the future Queen Elizabeth.

Thanks to the many historical figures (Winston

Churchill, King George V, Wallace Simpson, to name a few), the film takes audiences through the days leading up to World War II. Unlike some historical films, "The King's Speech" utilizes the times as background and not as a huge part of the plot. The real plot is the friendship between Bertie and Lionel and Queen Elizabeth's love of her husband that makes "The King's Speech" flow.

With masterful performances by Firth, Bonham Carter and Rush, the movie is filled with wonderful moments, with laughter and sorrow and with a story of friendship that lasted a lifetime. # DESCEND INTO A CRAZY GOOD GAME

"Amnesia: the Dark Descent" reduces the player to a small child huddled in the dark, praying the monsters will go away. Literally.

Well, almost. The player takes on the role of Daniel, a man who has purposely given himself amnesia:

"Don't forget. Some things mustn't be forgotten. The shadow hunting me... I must hurry. My name is Daniel. I live in London, at Mayfair. What have I done? This is crazy! Don't forget, don't forget! I must stop him! Focus!"


And with that, the screen goes dark, and the freshly amnesiac Daniel awakens in a seriously creepy old castle with a mysterious blood trail to follow. The game sets the tone at "deeply disquieting" right out of the gates, placing you in a dimly-lit ruin of a stone corridor. As you follow the blood trail, the amazing sound effects – the thunderstorm outside, the howling wind, the creaks and groans of the castle itself – add to the tension, dialing the fear factor up a notch or two. Mere moments later, as Daniel staggers, still reeling from the effects of the drug he's taken to wipe his memory, the castle shakes with the thunderous roar of some hidden beast. Yeah, I jumped when it happened. I ain't gonna lie.

"Amnesia: the Dark Descent" is a firstperson exploratory game, full of medium-difficulty
puzzles. The graphics aren't bad, the controls are
pretty solid, and the sound is fantastic. The story
is well-written, the plot is impressive, and the
mystery unravels at a more than satisfying pace.
Not one part of that matters though, because
where this game really shines is in the slow buildup
of raw fear and tension.

Doors creak slowly open on their own. Sudden winds blow out candles and torches, plunging the room into darkness. The castle echoes with what sounds like footsteps, and not your own. Five minutes into the game, you have a death grip on your mouse as you begin to realize that there's something out there, in the darkness, and you have nothing with which to defend yourself.

This is a motif which carries throughout the game. There is no way to fight the monsters. Your only option when confronted with the horrors is to run and hide as your sanity drips slowly away.

Oh, did I forget to mention that bit? My



bad – your character has a sanity meter. Every time you encounter a monster, it strips a little sanity away. The longer you hide quaking in the dark, hoping the creatures leave, the more sanity you lose. As you lose sanity, Daniel is afflicted with visual and auditory hallucinations. The walls bend and bow as if they're breathing. You hear voices, screams, pleas for help. Daniel begins to gibber and shake with terror.

If you've followed the game's advice, and you're playing in the dark with a good set of headphones on, at this point, you'll be shaking right along with him.

I've played more than a handful of horror games: "Resident Evil," "Silent Hill," and more. None of them can hold a candle to the helpless terror of Amnesia. We're not talking a few shocks, or a couple of gross scenes here. We're talking about real, hands-shaking, heart-pounding, adrenalin-rushing fear. This game is a horror masterwork. A profoundly unsettling setting combines with a magnificent music score and brilliant, subtle sound effects to invoke a slow, creeping horror that leaves you tense and trembling, and jumping whenever one of the game's seriously messed-up Lovecraftian critters makes an appearance.

If you're a fan of horror-themed games, then drop what you're doing and add "Amnesia: the Dark Descent" to your collection, immediately. You'll be screaming with glee and fright in no time!
