Syllabus: Introduction to Abnormal Psychology (PSY219 - Hybrid) Winter 2020

Course Description

An introduction to the study of psychological disorders, including issues of diagnosis and treatment. Topics include: models of abnormality; overview of major disorders, including diagnostic considerations; current research on treatment effectiveness; the effects of stress on our psychological wellbeing, and the impact of psychological disorders on society and its legal system.

How Does this Hybrid Class Work? We meet once each week on Tuesdays. This means that you need to do your weekly text reading, read the class presentation and prepare for the in-class assignment (have your 'deep thinking' question ready and anything needed for the in-class assignment) <u>before</u> you come to class each Tuesday Weeks 2-10. This way, we spend or time in class doing interactive activities and discussions to promote learning of the material.

Important Note: All students who are on the class roster will be enrolled in the Moodle site for this course during the 1st week of classes. Much of your course work will be completed via Moodle. You must be able to upload assignments and take exams on moodle. It is an expectation for this course that you will use moodle independently and seek help from the eLearning center if you have questions related to using moodle. For information on how to use moodle check out this site. If you are not prepared to work independently with moodle, drop this course immediately.

Instructor Responsibilities

The current week's content and assignments will be posted on moodle by noon each Wednesday morning. I will be available to support your learning when requested. I will hold you accountable by following through with course objectives and syllabus content. My aim is to facilitate a classroom environment that encourages active, effective and respectful activities, discussion and learning.

- Effectively participate in class assignments, activities, quizzes, and evaluations.

Course Requirements

Note: Weekly quizzes, Discussion Forum Activity, and Exams will *all take place on moodle outside of class time.*

Your final grade in this class will be determined by your performance on the following:

Quizzes: Due by 9 am on Monday. There will be 9 open book online quizzes on your text only at the Moodle site for this course. Item types include true/false, multiple choice, and matching. T/F = 1 point; multiple choice with 1 answer = 1 point; multiple choice with more than one 1 answer = 2 points; matching = 3 points. You will have 15 minutes to take each quiz. Quizzes are available by 9 am on Monday and are open until 9 am the following Monday.

Class Question: Due in class on Tuesdays (except Week 1). You will complete the week's reading and slide presentation <u>before</u> you come to class. When you come to class each Tuesday, you will bring in a question (designed to promote deep thinking) from the reading/slides. You will receive a set of index cards at the beginning of the term for this purpose. Write your question (and note question type) on your card with your full printed name. Turn your question in next to the sign in sheet. Questions are graded on quality so it is important to follow the 'Questions for Deep Thinking' handout in writing your question. It is not possible to write a question after they are collected (at the beginning of class). You must be present to get credit for the question.

Two online exams assess your understanding of the course material. Exam 1 covers lecture material and text (chapters 1-7 and 14 (pages 436-443). Exam 2 covers lecture material and text from weeks (chapters 8-15). Items consist of multiple-choice, true/false and matching items. The exams are on Moodle and are taken on your own time.

Class Activity Participation: Learning is more effective when you are actively engaged in the process. On 5 randomly chosen days, you will receive credit for your participation during in-class activities. Your lowest participation grade will be dropped at the end of the term.

In-Class Assignments: Done in class each Tuesday. Weekly in-class assignments based on the week's reading and slide presentation will be given. You must be present to complete this assignment. Your lowest assignment grade will be dropped at the end of the term.

Final Group Project: In order to apply the case study skills and knowledge about psychological disorders that you have accumulated during the term, you will work as part of your group to communicate a case about a famous figure in history. See information on Moodle.

Discussion Forum Activity: Due by 9 am on Mondays. You will participate in forums about topics related to the course. You will be instructed to watch a brief video, listen to a podcast or do a reading and then post your reaction. Your post should reflect an integration of course lecture content and/or your reading with your perspective. You will also respond to at least 1 other classmates' post. Forum activities are posted by noon on Monday and are open until 9am the following Monday. I will only include your 9 highest scores in the determination of your final grade.

Treat these discussion topics and your classmates with respect. We all have unique values and beliefs relating to the subject matter. It is important that you bring your unique perspective to share in a way that is non-dogmatic so that others can "listen" and understand you. I encourage you to ask questions, agree, and disagree with others as much as possible, as long as you do so respectfully. In order to receive full credit, your forum posts should reflect an integration of the podcast, video or reading assigned for the activity and/or the ideas covered in the weekly text readings. I will enter the Forums to "observe" your progress and sometimes join the discussion. Make good use of it! CONFIDENTIALITY. In your online discussions you may choose to share personal anecdotes about people you know. Remember to speak from your own perspective. In addition, please protect the confidentiality of others in your life. Refer to them by first initial only (e.g. "T" rather than Thomas). You may also refer to "my sister", "my uncle", "my neighbor" or "my friend".

Attendance: This is a lecture, and student small group and participation class. We only meet once each week, so attendance is important. Participation activity points are given for in-class activities. Which activity earns participation points is randomly chosen at the beginning of the term and is not announced until the day of the activity.

Policy Regarding Assigned Work: I do not accept late work except in the case of a medical emergency with documentation from your health care provider. Unless you have had a medical emergency, please do not create an uncomfortable situation by asking to turn in late work. Most coursework is submitted/conducted online via moodle. Do not send any course work by email. Quizzes and the discussion forum will be posted before **noon** on Monday and must be completed/submitted on moodle before 9am on the following Monday.

Bibliographies <u>and</u> in text citations are required whenever you use outside sources, including internet sources (unless otherwise indicated by me).
