United States violates U.N. charters

Nation breaks rules, unlikely to face international punishment

Many people believe the U.S. is threatened by Iran. hese same people aren't aware that Iran hasn't attacked nother nation for 250 years; meanwhile the U.S. has cted however it pleases in the name of spreading denocracy. How can it be demonstrated that there may e something fundamentally wrong with our nation's overnment?

Introducing them to the charters of the United Naons, which can be found at www.un.org, is a good tart. The second article states that no member of the J.N. will use violence, nor even the threat of violence, gainst another sovereign nation. The actions taken gainst Iraq by the U.S. are in clear opposition to this asic obligation, and further support the belief (held by nany peoples and nations) that the U.S. will continue ignore international law in favor of its own political nd economic gains.

In the last few years alone, the Bush administration has threatened (directly and indirectly) many of our own U.N. "allies": Iran for the last few years, Sudan this year over the Darfur conflict, Pakistan in 2007, and North Korea as early as 2003.

Beyond threats, the U.S.-led

invasion of Iraq five years ago was in defiance of the U.N. charters, which the U.S. helped to establish; yet nothing was done to stop it. The reason is simple: The U.S. is not concerned with international peace and stability, but rather its own interests, opposition be damned.

Early in 2003, the U.S. attempted to convince the U.N. to set deadlines for Iraqi compliance with various demands from previous resolutions, and this would have been the framework for an internationally approved military strike. It failed to pass, in large part due to heavy opposition by NATO members Germany, France and Canada. Despite this, the U.S. invaded Iraq in March of

The U.S. has not, and likely will not be reprimanded by the U.N. for its actions. Coincidentally, one of the very first resolutions adopted by the U.N. (number four in April of 1946) concerned Iran. Going through the proper diplomatic channels, the Iranian government complained about the presence of Soviet troops in their country, and the U.N. voted to set a timetable of USSR withdrawal to within a few weeks from the passing of the resolution. It is unlikely, in regard to an unwanted foreign presence, that Iran would enjoy the international support and protection today that it received 60 years ago.

All this begs further inquiry, but for now we're left with a question: Who can be blamed for maintaining a hostile and threatening world environment?



"Get involved; it helps keep life interesting, and keeps you from getting burnt out," says Boldt. "Just keep living life and working toward your goal."




Following the student speakers was the improv class, which provided entertainment for the afternoon. All of the skits were politically themed and worked to "make light of all of the candidates," said class member Tim Frink, a freshman studying psychology.

Student audience member Amanda Hilburnsaid, "They were hilarious! Entertaining and energetic."

History teacher Robert Harrison, who formed the group Democracy in Action, was happy with how the event turned out.

"The students who spoke were great examples of individuals speaking about what they believe in," he said.

He wants to make this an annual event and next year, he hopes to "line the courtyard with tables."



Baguette restaurant boast big flavor for small cost

Whoever thought a sandwich could be so exciting?

Baguette is a gem of a restaurant, tucked away near the Second Street condominiums and Elements building in downtown Corvallis. The plain façade belies the taste sensations awaiting visitors. Vietnamese sandwiches are the specialty.

Thanh Hoang and wife Huong own and operate Baguette. They opened their doors in April 2007. Mr. Hoang's sister owns and operates Magenta and was instrumental in the opening of Baguette. His wife's family operated a restaurant in Vietnam.

As soon as I entered the tiny restaurant, I was greeted with a friendly smile. The smell of freshly baked bread filled the air. The décor is minimal but inviting. Fresh bamboo is displayed on the counter, and three small tables are available for people who want to eat in.

Nothing on the menu is more than \$3.95. The menu fills one page and features eight sandwiches, as well as salad rolls, steamed buns, and four beverage choices. Prices are affordable and portion sizes are generous.

The sandwich bread is baked on-site and is available in white or wheat eight-inch baguettes.

Although all the sandwich options looked inviting, I chose the chicken baguette on wheat. With the first bite I knew I'd found my new favorite sandwich shop. The garlic and

ginger chicken with the cobination of the crisp carrocucumber and cilantro is unlanything I've tasted before mild garlic pepper sauce with distribution over the filling. It sandwich was spicy enough me, but for the more advent ous palate, fresh jalapenos

available.

An explosion of fresh flav captivated my taste buds a bit into the vegetarian sa roll. The crunchiness of carrot strips, lettuce and cumber are a perfect match the vermicelli noodles. 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


"I want it to go on every year," said Tim

Death Cab lands a darker album

Death Cab For Cutie continues their indie pop compositions with their new album, "Narrow Stairs." It's decent and musically simple as usual. The lyrics are a bit bleaker, even if many of the cords sound upbeat. For inquiring music fans, it's the singing of front man, Ben Gibbard, that usually makes or breaks people's appreciation of the band.

Gibbard sings softly with a stark clarity, and happens to sound like he's 14. Death Cab's music and lyrics are readily accessible, and I enjoy them, but Gibbard's voice is slightly lacking in emotion and is kind of matter-of-fact testimonial. Fortunately, the music carries the emotion. Gibbard sings almost exclusively about failing

romances on the album.

Gibbard's falsetto is annoying in the opening track, "No Bixby Canyon," but the grinding guitars move along beautifully with a marching drum beat. Death Cab creates a textured tapestry of music through repetition marked by subtle changes.

On the track "I Will Possess Your Heart," the band plays a long atmospheric intro and then Gibbard chants with persistence, intent on wooing a girl who's not interested. "You got to spend some time with me, I know that you'll find love, I will possess your heart." It's pretty stalker-

There's an abundance of ridiculous lyrics on "Narrow Stairs," and it's fun. Gibbard's lyrics are reminiscent of Morrissey during his time with the Smiths-both are quite laughable. For example, on "You Can Do Better Than Me," Gibbard sings, "I think a leaving but it's something I'll never do cause you can do better than me but I can't do better than you." The song is appropriately lighthearted.

"Narrow Stairs" is filled with delightful melodies, like on "Your New Twin Sized Bed" and the rocking "Long Division." The driving bass has room to breathe on most of the album. The simple bass lines are foundational and the guitars and keys built upon and around

Although the band is newwave, they still sound like the Smiths, with their layered guitars and drum snare rolls, and the Beatles with their pop romance obsession. They also

Griffey entered the season just seven homeruns y but has yet to hit his 600th this year. The man pected to break Hank Aarons record during his ory days as a Seattle Mariner has slowly been proaching 600 for the last few years of his career Cincinnati.

Growing up as a child who loved baseball and e Seattle Mariners it's been hard to watch over e past seven years as Juniors career has slowly egan to dull. Fans may have forgotten about The Kid" but not me. After hitting 40 homers nd driving in 118 runs in 2000, his first year with e Reds, Griffey missed 252 games over the next ree seasons due to injury. Considering Griffey ad averaged 49.8 homers per year for each of the

five seasons prior to the 2001 season, the loss of games is not an insignificant consideration. From 2001 through 2003 Griffey totaled only 43 nomers. Had he been healthy and maintained his previous pace he would have hit 149 during that span, making him worthy of a shot at Aarons record had he stayed healthy.



Swanson: An ambitious grad

After he suffered a small stroke in July 2001 while working on a construction site, Merlan Swanson's life took a new direction.

"I had one of those life-changing epiphany-type moments," Swanson said.

Swanson, 48, relocated to Oregon from Ventura, Calif., with his wife on June 17, 1991, and worked as a building contractor. He remembers the exact date of the move because it's their wedding anniversary. This year they will celebrate 30 years of marriage.

After his stroke in 2001, Swanson and his wife Cecelia looked at this time as an opportunity to plan to do something together.

Swanson's wife graduated from LBCC 10 years ago with a nursing degree, and is a critical care nurse at Albany General Hospital. She proved to be the inspiration he needed to return

"I really look at her as a role model, even though we're the same age. Her pushing through as an older student to get her degree in a whole new area allowed me to come back and pursue the same thing."

Swanson's original plan was to follow in his wife's footsteps and get a nursing degree. He began the pre-nursing program in 2003, and worked at the hospital as a certified nurses assistant for three years. As Swanson took the required coursework, he was tutored by a pre-med student. He found this so helpful that he decided he wanted to help other students and became a tutor.

Swanson has tutored at the Learning Center since November 2005. He tutors for anatomy and physiology, as well as biological

"I like his rapport with students. He's a kind man and an excellent employee. He really knowshis stuff," said Barb Horn, tutor coordinator at the Learning

Through the tutoring center he pursued a national certification for tutoring. Currently at level one, he's about to reach level two, which will allow him to tutor tu-

Swanson's favorite and most challenging subject has been anatomy and physiology.

"Being a person coming from a construction and remodeling background, I had to apply that same psychology of building something to the human body."

Swanson also tutors at the TRIO center on campus, which assists first-generation college students, low-income students and students with disabilities. Some students are also displaced workers or non-traditional stu-

Swanson was in the first group of students to join the program when it began at LBCC three years ago. He learned about the need for TRIO tutors and has worked as a tutor there for the last year. In addition to science, he tutors reading and writing.

"Merlan is a natural teacher.

He relates well to the students and is very patient," said Sandra Shinkle, director of TRIO Student Support Services.

Swanson's advice to students, "Stick to your plan and if you find your way to TRIO take advantage of all the services they have. The advisers here are superb."

In addition to being a full-time student and tutor, Swanson is an associate chaplain at Albany

General Hospital. He and his wife attend East Side Christian Church.

Swanson will graduate this term with a 4.00 GPA. He plans to transfer to OSU this summer or fall term. His ultimate goal is to get a master's degree in college student services administration and return to LBCC to help stu-

National radio host wows Corvallis

"This just in: President Bush and Vice President Dick Cheney were arrested today in a small town in northern Oregon on charges of conspiracy, international war crimes and crimes against humanity for their role in the ongoing conflict in

With a deadpan man-on-theradio voice, David Barsamian (pronounced bar-sahm-YAWN) lent authenticity to a fictional event, providing a colorful opening to his lecture May 18 at Oddfellows Hall in Corvallis. The talk, titled "Stopping War in Iran and Iraq," covered many topics related to the United States and its involvement with the Middle East.

Barsamian held the audience captive. They laughed at times, while moments later they were visibly shaken with his poignant criticisms of US policies and their implications. The crowd was always engaged and thinking critically about what he was presenting.

Barsamian's weekly radio show, "Alternative Radio", has much the same tone as did his Corvallis lecture, shedding light on viewpoints of popular issues (such as the U.S. led invasion of

Iraq) that are sometimes passed over by major media outlets. A.R. was founded in 1986 and is offered free to any public radio station, serving as "a forum for controversy and debate."

He is probably best known for his published interviews of some of the greatest progressive minds of our generation, including Howard Zinn, Tariq Ali and, most notably, the linguist and political activist Noam Chomsky. Having interviewed hundreds of brilliant minds, Barsamian holds the distinction of being an accurate distiller of their very complex and sometimes difficult to understand concepts, and being able to speak about them with ease to those who may not have previous knowledge of those

Speaking in Corvallis, he stayed relevant to what many would call the "important" issues, most notably the upcoming presidential elections. One point he stressed is that two of the three candidates have spoken openly of attacking Iran, a move that would be both appalling and disastrous for repairing damaged foreign relations, he said.

While media in the states have denounced Iran's insistence upon maintaining its fledgling nuclear program (which began in 2006), Barsamian countered by noting that Iran's yearly military budget, at \$6 billion, is less than what the U.S. spends on it's own military budget (\$583 billion) in about four days. He also said that Iran has not attacked another nation in more than 250 years.

Compared with operations the U.S. has carried out over the years, Barsamian insisted, Iran is not a threat to any world

He was energetic and fleet of. phrase, engaging his audience at Oddfellows Hall despite 90-degree weather and poor ventilation in a third story building. His public speaking voice runs miles a minute faster than that of his calculated on-air

Listening over the radio, one gets the feeling that he may not be as emotionally invested as he really is. He lets his subjects speak, and he gets the best out of them by prompting them along without taking over. In this way, he lets the content come to light more than his personality, which, as his talk in Corvallis proved, is itself worthy of attention.





You can surf in Oregon? a local shaper profile

In 1996 Robert Rube graduated from LBCC with an associate of science transfer degree. Two years later, Rube convinced his wife to let him take \$1,200 to start shaping surfboards in Corvallis; 695 surfboards later Roberts NW Surfboards and Pura Vida Surf Shop became a staple in the Willamette Valley.

"Out of the first four boards I made only one really turned out. surfed it for a while and then sold it for like \$150, just barley covering the cost," Rube said.

Rube currently makes special order surfboards and stock boards

at the Pura Vida Surf Shop in Philomath and is the only professional surfboard shaper In the Willamette Valley. Some think that the Willamette Valley is a strange place for a surfboard manufacturer and surf shop, but Rube disagrees.

"Philomath is on the direct thoroughfare to the central Oregon coast, why not have a shop here where you can gear at cheaper than the coastal price?" and added, "some of the locals here in Philomath still don't get it but they're catching

Rube grew up with his dad in the military and learned to surf while his family was stationed in Hawaii.

"And then my dad retired from the military and moved to Iowa, and guess what you can't do in Iowa? Surf." After high school Rube got a job working for a restaurant chain that soon opened up franchises in Oregon, so he moved out to Bend where he would take the time off to drive to the beach and surf. He later moved to the Corvallis area where he still resides.

"I like living in a college town; I love the vibe



that you find there," Rube said.

Nation-wide surfing has been becomi increasingly popular. And the effect can ev be seen here in Oregon. With the combinati of better wet suit technology and the ability rent gear and get lessons, the amount of surf in Oregon has been on the increase. One of greatest boosts to Rube's shaping is not norn to most surfboard shapers; it is his connect with a Mexican restaurant chain that has may his shaping business and surf shop possible. Ta Del Mar has a contract with Rube that whene they open a new chain they buy a surfboard fr him to be used as decoration in the restauran

"I've shipped boards to everywhere, from Carolinas to Alaska... Each board is the same w the Taco Del Mar logo in the middle and mine the nose. It's made all of this possible."
