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

The SLC office, which is located on the first floor of the Forum facing the quad, buzzed with the energy of sunshine and activity.

In the SLC office, a primary topic of discussion is food security for LBCC students. Food security is

The SLC helps with student food security with both the LB lunchbox program and Thanksgiving boxes as well as advocating for Oregon students in the legislative priorities they vote on as members of the Oregon Student Association.

SLC Volunteer Coordinator Middleton said that the SLC will be "revamping" their questionnaire for students who come in to pick up an "LB lunchbox," which is a box of nonperishable food. The new questionnaire will help assess what other needs LBCC students may have.

On Wednesday November 20 from 2-5:30 pm the student government reps will be traveling to Salem for a tour of the capitol and legislative briefing from an Oregon legislator. This replaces their weekly Wednesday meeting, which on other Wednesdays is held 3-5 pm in

For students interested in politics and local issues, the SLC offers opportunities for involvement. The SLC is accepting applications for a second Legislative Affairs Coordinator, which allows the selected student to earn 3 credits of tuition per term in exchange for their work as an SLC rep.

Sugar Skulls and Sweet Bread on LBCC's Day of the Dead

A reunion of a loved one is always a refreshing release. In Mexican culture, Dia de Los Muertos welcomes back the spirits of lost loved ones with personal gifts while also celebrating their life here on Earth from October 31st to November 2nd.

From sugar skulls to traditional pan de Muertos (dead bread) LBCC carried out Dia de Los Muertos right here on LBCC's main campus last Thursday and Friday from noon to 2:00 pm. Put on by the students in Forum 220 (previously known as the Diversity Achievement Center), the festivities began with hot chocolate and a Mexican bread traditionally eaten during the Day of the Dead celebration. Also known as pan de muerto or "bread of the dead", the toasted exterior represents the bones of the human body while the center represents the heart. Using marigold flower petals as a pathway for our ancestors to guide them to the altar that is filled with offerings for them, LBCC welcomed students to put photos of their own lost relatives on the altar designed by LBCC students.

"You get together with the family to paint sugar skulls, and put it on the offering table," Brayan Zavala said as he went into detail about how his family celebrates Dia de los Muertos. "The altar has a lot of significance. You put stacks of bread, oranges, food, anything the dead like. We also put drinks on the altar like soda, beer, and tequila. Then we set up a lot of candles and sugar

skulls."

Flooded with colors and candles, people also added hand-painted sugar skulls to the altar. The sugar skulls are traditionally used to decorate a person's grave to welcome the return of a deceased friend or family member. This year at LBCC, these sugar skulls were molded by Korina Rayburn and Catherine Stevens using powdered granulated sugar, meringue powder, and water.

After the fifth successful year of LBCC putting on Dia De Los Muertos, Forum 220 pushes students to recognize other cultures by also putting on events that are tributed to black history month and gay pride month. By hosting these events that highlight diversity,


Forum 220 hopes to spread compassion to create an open environment for everyone.







ROGUE ROUGHS UP LBCC

LBCC Volleyball Goes 1-1 on the Week, Keeps Eyes Focused on Finishing Out Strong

Roadrunner volleyball's streak of winning was once again halted, and by the same foe, the Rogue Community College Ospreys. After another 3-0 set sweep against the SW Oregon Lakers, the Roadrunners ran into the same wall they did before in Rogue and fell 3-1 overall, dropping their record to 24-10 on the season with a 10-3 record overall in conference. The loss to Rouge hurts due to it being a division loss, but the Ospreys are one of the best teams in the NWAC and were fuming after a huge loss to the Lane Titans, who sit right behind them in the division standings. After the loss, LBCC still holds a strong lead in third and has a three game advantage over the fourth Mt. Hood St. Bernards, clinching the playoffs. With the playoffs clinched and the season winding down, LBCC looks to hone in on their final three games and find success.

Linn-Benton started the month on a strong note, facing the SW Oregon Lakers (18-17 overall, 4-10 division) and dismantling them three sets to none. The set scores at the end of the three-set match were 25-18, 25-19, and finally 25-15. While the defense wasn't as strong as they showed against Umpqua, they undoubtedly performed at a high level and shut down the Lakers from even scratching the twenties in kills. Leaders on offense included Ally Tow, who is ending her sophomore regular season at the same pace she started, finishing with 16 kills on a .414 kill percentage. Taylor Tedrow led the team in kills with 18, at a percentage of .593. Sydnie Johnson continued carrying the load of assists with 38 total, but Lauren Whitty also contributed to the totals with 11. The strong win increased the Roadrunners set sweep streak to five games, but was cut short just one day later in Coos Bay at Rogue Community College.


The Roadrunners traveled to Rogue and played the Ospreys in a strong battle of the top teams in the south, yet

the result remained the same. Rest assured, LBCC did not go down easy, falling in four sets but staying competitive with final set scores of 35-33, 25-23, 25-18, and finally 25-15. While Linn-Benton remained in the game at the start, Rouge steadily broke them down set by set. Some players that had a great game we're Ally Tow and Mitra Alfatooni. The two continue to attack on offense all season, and put up 20 and 14 kills respectively. The loss stings for LBCC, but with playoffs clinched, its merely for playoff seeding and bragging rights.

With only three games left against Clackamas, Mt. Hood, and Lane, the Roadrunners have a very good chance to round off the season 2-1, with wins against the eighth and fourth teams in the division. Lane will be a tough task to face, especially after they thwarted the Ospreys, but LBCC is 1-1 against them on the season and could easily boost that record. No matter what, the Roadrunners have clinched their birth in the playoffs, and can begin formulating their shot at redemption from last years early exit.



OSU Holds Their Own Against International Champs









"Terminator: Dark Fate" is the latest film in the "Terminator" franchise, and the sixth film overall. While not the best entry in the series, it is a marked improvement over some of the previous installments and the closest in style and tone to the original 1984 entry and the smash hit 1991 sequel "Terminator 2: Judgment Day."

Twenty-three years have passed since the prevention of Judgment Day in 1997. Now, in the near future of 2020; an aged Sarah Connor (Linda Hamilton) must form a reluctant alliance with an cybernetically-enhanced soldier named Grace (Mackenzie Davis) and an older T101 under the alias "Carl" (Arnold Schwarzenegger) to prevent a young woman named Dani (Natalia Reyes) from being killed by an experimental Terminator prototype known as a REV-9 (Gabriel Luna). Over the course of 128 minutes, director Tim Miller ("Deadpool") returns

the series to its darker roots with the help of producer James Cameron, who also co-wrote the script alongside David S. Goyer ("The Dark Knight Saga," "Man of Steel") and Billy Ray (TV's "Earth 2").

On a massive budget of \$185 million, Miller shows off a flurry of creative action scenes while putting a unique spin on the franchise's most memorable moments. Without spoiling anything, the film opens on a shocking swerve from the original timeline and doesn't let up from there. While 2009's "Terminator Salvation" and 2015's "Terminator Genesis" were often criticized for nullifying the impact of the story by keeping the content at a PG-13 rating, this film is gloriously hard-R in the vein of the first two films. From an opening clash with the REV-9 in a Mexico City factory to a climactic final battle in a hydroelectric dam; the series has ended up with some of its best moments in years.

That said, the film definitely isn't perfect. Not every moment in the film has the same impact as its seniors, even when it's rife with references and Easter eggs from the series' 35-year history. Though the film's special effects are largely fantastic throughout, the

opening prologue has obvious CGI to de-age the lead actors to their 1998 selves; giving off an "uncanny valley" effect that's quite jarring when the film also intercuts the opening vanity plates with archival footage from Sarah's interview "T2."

Still, the film is easily the best entry in the series since the first two films. By only making the first two entries canon and writing off other followups as taking place in alternate timelines; the film is able to offer a new perspective that was sorely lacking from many previous installments. Tom "Junkie XL" Holkenborg also has a great soundtrack to help back the film's most dramatic moments.

Though not quite reaching the heights of its groundbreaking seniors, "Terminator: Dark Fate" is a vast improvement over previous "Terminator" sequels. While it remains to be seen what lies ahead, the film further proves the central theme first spoken in the original 1984 film: "the future is not written, there is no fate but what we make for ourselves."
