**STUDENT CONDUCT**

- Late submissions are acceptable; however, there will be a 10% grade reduction for each day these assignments are late.

### *Religious Service Visit Presentations*

- You and a partner will visit a different religious tradition which you have never experienced before.
- Each group will present their findings to the class. Presentations should be roughly 10 minutes in length. Further details will be given in class.

### *Examinations and Quizzes*

- Final Examinations will be taken on the day scheduled, unless prior arrangements are made with the instructor.
- Quizzes must be taken on the date assigned and cannot be made up (except for school sports or possibly extreme medical emergencies).
- All tests and quizzes are "open note." You may bring any of your own original handwritten notes (no printed materials, photocopies of another student's notes, books, or electronic devices will be allowed).
- Tests and quizzes affect the successful completion of all learning outcomes.

## COLLEGE POLICIES

*Administrative Drop:* Students who do not attend class during the first week will be automatically dropped by the instructor from the course.
