DAVE MILLER FOUND THIS - a humorous letter to graduates based upon the automobile recall letters that some manufacturers have had to send out. Dave did some revisions to the original letter.

Dear Graduate:

According to our record you were graduated from this school this past June. Since that time it has been brought to our attention that certain insufficiencies are present in our graduates, so we are recalling all students for further education. We have learned that in the process of instruction provided, we forgot to install one or more of the following:

- a. At least one saleable skill
- b. A comprehensive and utilitarian set of values
- c. A readiness for an understanding of the responsibilities of citizenship

A recent consumer study consisting of followup of our graduates has revealed that many of them have been released with defective parts: Incompetencies and deficiencies are serious flaws, and we have discovered they are part of the make up of almost all of our products. These defects have been determined to be of such magnitude that the model produced in June is considered highly dangerous and should be removed from circulation as ahazard to the nation.

Some of the equipment which was classified as optional has been reclassified as standard and should be a part of every product of our school. Therefore, we plan to equip each graduate with (a) a desire to continue to learn, (b) a dedication to solving problems of local, national, and international concern, (c) several productive ways to use time, (d) a commitment to the democratic way of life, (e) extensive contact with the world outside the school, and (f) experience in making decisions.

In addition we found we had inadvertently removed from you such items as interest, enthusiasm, motivation, trust, and joy. We are sorry to report that these items have been mislaid and have not been turned in at the school's lost and found department. If you will inform us as to the value you placed on these qualities we will reimburse you promptly by cash or by check. As you can see it is in your best interest and vitally necessary for the safety and welfare of all that graduates be returned so that these errors and oversights can be corrected.

We admit that it would have been more effective and less costly in time and money to have produced the product correctly in the first place, but we hope you will forgive our error and continue to respect and support your public schools.
