Linn-Benton Community College has selected Dale Stowell as the next executive director to lead the college's office of Institutional Advancement.

Stowell comes to LBCC from Tacoma Community College, where he has served as the director of marketing, communication and outreach since 2007. Previous to TCC, Stowell served as director of college relations at Pierce College from 1998 to 2007, and as assistant director from 1994 to 1998.

In addition, Stowell was employed as a regional physician communication manager with Franciscan Health System, and as a publications and media relations manager for St. Joseph Medical Center, both in Washington state. Stowell also worked for several years as an editor and reporter for the Woodburn Independent newspaper and as a reporter for the Lebanon Express.



Dale Stowell succeeds Marlene Propst, who has served at executive director since 2003. Propst recently retired after serving 35 years at the college.






There were five fatalities over New Years holiday weekend this year, which is the state 10-year average for annual New Years driving fatalities. That statistic, along with winter weather conditions, is a reminder that it is important to review how to be a safe driver.

Here are some ideas to think about how you might improve your driving habits, and not become a statistic yourself.

From a driving safety website:

- * Look over your shoulder when merging (check the blind spot).
- * Use your signal when turning or changing lanes.
- * Measure tire pressure before getting on the road.
- * Drive the speed limit (and suggested speed, at cor-
- * Watch for other traffic.
- * Go with the flow.

From OSHA:

* Use a seatbelt at all times.

- * Be well-rested, and avoid impairing medications, alcohol, or drugs
- * Do not attempt to drive when overly tired, and take breaks as needed.
- * Avoid distractions, such as radio, food, and phone.
- * Be alert to road conditions.
- * Do not drive aggressively, remember to use patience
- * Do not take personally the actions of other drivers.
- * If possible, reduce the stress of a trip by planning your route to avoid busy roads and driving times.

Some other ideas:

- * Keep a small first aid kit, water, and emergency food supply in your vehicle at all times.
- * Make sure all external lights are in working order.
- * If necessary to pull over on the side of the road, use hazard lights and get as far off the driving surface as possible, to avoid being rear-ended.
- * Keep a safe distance from other traveling vehicles.

New Laws of 2012

Whether it's talking on your cell phone, driving drunk, or getting paid more, there are dozens of new laws that took effect in Oregon when the calendar flipped to 2012. Some, such as a higher minimum wage affects us all in one way or another. Others, such as making the possession of shark fins illegal, will affect fewer Oregonians. Here's a brief run down of some of those laws.

The excuse, "It's work related," won't hold water any more if you're pulled over for talking on your cell phone. The loop hole that allowed some drivers to continue using their cell phones while on the road is gone. From now on, only emergency responders and roadside assistance employees, such as tow truck drivers will be allowed to use their phones while driving. And, don't forget, it's illegal to text while driving-period. The fine is \$110.

Drunk drivers beware! The new law meant to force drunk drivers from the road started on New Year's Day. Even first time offenders will be required to have an ignition interlock device installed in their cars. Before the car will start, the driver will need to perform a breathalyzer test. The system is set up to even require a test while driving in order to keep the vehicle running.

Those gift cards you got for Christmas can now become cold, hard cash. Gift cards used at least once and with less than \$5 remaining on them can now be redeemed for cash.

For those working in minimum wage jobs, you got a 30 cent pay raise! The new minimum wage is \$8.80 an hour. Of course, one thing to remember, while the wage goes up, the cost to purchase certain products can also rise. This will be a wait and see if the cause and effect rule comes into play.

Gas prices are on the rise- again. The new six cent a gallon gas tax increase started at the first of the year, causing the cost of gas, which had been experiencing a slight decrease, is once again on the rise. Gas prices as of the first week of January were \$3.13 a gallon at some of the less expensive stations.

Other transportation related laws include allowing children over 40 pounds to use a 5-point passenger safety seat system instead of a booster seat, ODOT approved training for all motorcycle drivers aged 40 and under, and how bicyclists should respond to bicycle signals.

Just be thankful you don't have to worry about every new law across the United States. Over 40,000 new laws took effect on New Year's Day throughout America. Happy New Year everyone ... and remember, be safe, make more money, spend more money and redeem those gift cards!

In the News:

Local:

Eugene, Ore.: It has been 95 years since the University of Oregon Ducks have won at the Rose Bowl. Since 1917, the Ducks have been to the Rose Bowl five times and every time they went, they lost. But on January 2, they finally won, with the final score being 45-38 against the Wisconsin badgers. There is still no word yet, on whether or not there will be a celebration.

Portland, Ore.: Mayor Sam Adams hopes that Republicans won't come to their scheduled debate in Portland on March 19 because there isn't any money for police protection. OPB and state Republican Party leaders were surprised to get a call from Adams last month, asking them not to hold the debate in Portland. According to Adams, the local law enforcement has already exceeded their overtime budget, due to the Occupy Portland protestors. Adams has asked the debate sponsors to consider moving to a new location, preferably closer to the airport. OPB and Oregon Republican Party spokesmen say they've not yet agreed to any changes in the debate, unless a suddenly strong candidate emerges to make a March debate unnecessary.

Yamhill County, Ore.: Yamhill County police officials have raided four stores in McMinnville and Newberg, and have arrested three people accused of selling synthetic marijuana known as "K2" or "spice." Police seized hundreds of containers that contained more than 1,000 pieces of the drug paraphernalia. It has only been a year since "spice" was banned in Oregon. However, the "spice" manufacturers have altered their recipes just enough to skirt the bans, and are again openly marketing in stores and on the web. Some of the users are saying that the new recipe is more potent than the original. "Spice" is commonly sold in colorful packets as an "herbal incense" and is smoked to get high.

Nation:

Los Angeles, California: Harry Burkhart, a native of Germany, has been arrested on Monday after a string of 52 fires, mostly parked cars, and has been charged with 37 counts of arson. Along with the 37 counts of arson that he has in America, he is also under investigation in his native country for fraud and arson. The fires started on December 30 and lasted until January 2. While in court, Burkhart appeared unable to stand on his own, and was held up by three deputies. He was also seen wearing a "suicide gown," which prevented him from harming himself. Once he was seated in the audience, Burkhart began shouting at the crowd and tried to communicate with his mother, who is also in custody. According to his defense attorneys, it is believed that the

reason he started the fires was because he hates Americans, and once the fires were set, he intended to harm and terrorize as many residents of the city and county of Los Angeles as possible. Once convicted here, he will go back to Germany. German officials are still working on the transfer paperwork.

Texas: a 15-year-old boy was shot and killed by police officials after he brandished a weapon in his school hallway. An ambulance was called, rushing the student to a local hospital, where he was pronounced dead, according to Israel Tapia, a spokesman for Cameron County Justice of the Peace Kip V. Johnson Hodge. No other students or employees were injured. School officials and students have been sent to a nearby high school gymnasium while authorities investigate.

Coronado, California: The killings of four people, two of which were Navy pilots, on New Year's Day has been ruled as a murder-suicide. Lt. J.G. John R. Reeves, 25, put a gun to his own head and killed himself after shooting Lt. J.G. David A. Reis, 25; Karen Reis, 24; and Matthew Saturley, 25, according to the San Diego County Sheriff's Department. The shootings were ruled as a murder-suicide based on the medical examiner's autopsy report. The Coronado Police Department got a call around 2:20 a.m. Sunday about shots being fired inside a condominium. Responding officers found a man's body in the doorway, and the other bodies inside the residence, according to a press release from Lt. Larry Nesbit of the San Diego County Sheriff's Department. Homicide detectives will not provide any more information about Reeve's motives until they do further investigation.

World:

Pyongyang, North Korea: Thousands of North Koreans pumped their fists and chanted their loyalties to Kim Jong Un in the main square of the capital on Tuesday. Since the death of his father, Kim Jong Il, Jong Un has been seen out in public interacting with soldiers and carrying out inspections. In 2010, Jong Un was named successor to Jong Il, which also was his emergence into North Korea, as no one knew that he even existed. Being only in his 20s, he has been named a four-star general and vice-chairman of the Central Military Commission of the Workers' Campaign. Jong Un has been highlighted as an "identical" extension to his father.

Iran: Iran's military has given the United States a blunt warning, the U.S. Navy aircraft carrier John C. Stennis is not to return to the Persian Gulf. This warning is the latest, and most aggressive, babble between the United States and Iran. According to

the Islamic Republic of Iran, the warning will not be repeated. There has been no word on what will happen if the aircraft carrier decides to venture back into the Persian Gulf. Iran has just finished their naval exercises and has threatened to close the passage through which roughly one-fifth of all the crude oil traded worldwide passes, if Western powers move forward with new sanctions on Iran's petroleum exports.

Asia: Thailand and Cambodia have agreed to withdraw their troops that are surrounding a disputed border temple. The two countries have reached a deal to implement an order by the International Court of Justice to put in place a "provisional demilitarized zone" around the Preah Vihear temple. Thai and Cambodian troops clashed over the temple in early 2011 and had displaced thousands of troops on both sides, causing at least 20 deaths. The 11th century temple sits atop a cliff on Cambodian soil, but has its most accessible entrance on the Thai side. The two countries differ on whether some territory around the temple forms part of Thailand or Cambodia.

As many Chinese people gathered to blow off steam, they were given pillows as they walked through the door. During the event they listened to rock music and waved their pillows in the air, but once the music stopped they all engaged in the ultimate pillow fight. The pillows were supposed to be their frustrations and had someone's name written on it. This epic pillow fight has been an annual event for the last five years, and has gotten so big that they decided to do it twice in one week.

Officials had to advise people to stop setting fireworks off because it was causing the birds to crash into things and into each other.

The list of kind gestures goes on and on! Sometimes, the best parts of life come from making life better for others! This will guarantee a great start to the New Year!





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


After an up and down start to the season the Linn-Benton men's basketball team is focused and ready for league play to get started.

The team opened league play on Saturday with a big win against Portland Community College crushing the Panthers 73-43.

The RoadRunners put together a strong defensive effort holding the Panthers to just 34% shooting, while forcing 18 turnovers. Two major stats that LB dominated PCC was second chance points and free throw points. LB outscored PCC 9-0 in second chance points and 11-1 in free throw points.

LB had three players score in double figures, including freshman Adam Hastings with 14, sophomore Brady Brent with 14, and freshman Colton

The team also got a big boost from sophomore Seth Brent, who has been recovering from ankle surgery and has missed the entire pre-season. Brent, a starting post player saw his first minutes of the season knocking in nine points and seven rebounds in just 12 minutes of play.

Tech Review: New Kindle is on Fire

The Kindle Fire is Amazon.com's hot new tablet computer. It's the size of a paperback and light enough to stuff in a pocket or purse for easy carrying. It's slick-looking and incredibly affordable at \$200. When the Fire's release was announced back in September, the Internet's techblogging community screeched to a halt, stared agog, and then did an appreciative slow clap.

They billed the Kindle Fire as an "iPadkiller." So... is it?

The Pros

OMG, people, the video on this thing is spectacular. It's the first thing I checked out when I opened my shiny new Kindle Fire Christmas morning, and I was not dis-

appointed. Seriously, I've had TVs that didn't have a picture this nice.

The sound is pretty good, too. You'll pick up earbuds for the Fire regardless of the quality of the onboard sound because you'll be using this in cafes and out in public and whatnot, but it's good to know that if you're chilling out at home, the sound is decent. You can hear it, it's clear, and it's not tinny or scratchy. You won't be using the Kindle Fire to throw a dance party anytime soon, but it'll get you by for your own tunes and some TV.

Obviously, you can read books on the Kindle Fire. That's kind of the point, and it does this well. You're reading on an LCD screen, so it's going to wash out if you're trying to read out in the sun, and you may face some eye strain if you're sensitive to reading on computer screens, but so far, I haven't had this problem. Color looks crisp and clean, making for easy reading when it comes to magazines and comics.

Surfing the Internet is quick and easy. It's about 50/50 if you get the mobile or full version of a website, but either way, the website loads fast, it's

easy to read and use. The Kindle Fire also runs apps, just like any other tablet computer. You load apps out of the Amazon App Store, which has a pretty decent selection for most everything, except the Fire.

Which brings us to...

The Cons


Unlike other tabs, the Fire relies solely on wifi, with no 3G, 4G, carrier pigeons, or whatever else they're using these days. That means that if you don't have a wifi connection and you forgot to download something to your Fire before you left the house, you're carrying a brick, not a book.

Of course, wifi is everywhere these days, so it's debatable how much of a "con" this actually is. But compared to the previous versions of the Kindle, with their semimagical 3G tablet computers to watch video, read a book,

listen to a few tunes, and Facebook, and the Kindle does all that very well. Amazon got that bit right.

It's also pretty obvious that the Fire is a first-generation device, and that it's got some room for improvement. The touch screen could be a little more sensitive, and the app selection could certainly be better. It could use something beyond wifi for connection abilities. But over-all, for a first generation device, the Kindle Fire is in very good shape.

Back in October I wrote about SOPA and PIPA, and I'm sad to report the problem didn't go away over winter break. In fact, if anything, it's gotten worse.

For those of you who just got here, SOPA and PIPA (AKA, PROTECT-IP Act) claim to address the issue of Internet piracy by instituting new laws and regulations that will supposedly allow the government to stop "piracy" sites hosted in foreign countries. I use phrases like "claim to" and "supposedly" because these bills were written, sponsored, and supported by big media corporations and are so broadly and badly written that A) they'll actually break how the Internet works on a technical level, B) they'll bring any sort of new creative innovation on the Internet to a screeching halt, and C) will result in the suppression of free speech online right here in America.

Mythbuster Adam Savage said of SOPA and PIPA,

Make no mistake: These bills aren't simply unconstitutional, they are anticonstitutional. They would allow for the wholesale elimination of entire websites, domain names, and chunks of the DNS (the underlying structure of the whole Internet), based on nothing more than the "good faith" assertion by a single party that the website is infringing on a copyright of the complainant. The accused doesn't even have to be aware that the complaint has been made.

These bills are so bad that companies like Google, Twitter, Facebook, Wiki-

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pedia, YouTube, FourSquare, PayPal, Mozilla, AOL Time-Warner and Reddit – just for starters – are up in arms over it. In fact, they're so up in arms they're talking about shutting their sites down to protest.

Wikipedia founder Jimmy Wales is leading the charge. Quoted from that article, Wales said, "My own view is

that a community strike was very powerful and successful in Italy and could be even more powerful in this case."

At the moment, this is just talk. The aforementioned companies are floating the idea of going dark on Jan. 23, the day before the Senate debates SOPA. It may seem like a drastic step to take, but these may be desperate times. Senate Majority Leader Henry Reid said of SOPA just last month, "This is a bipartisan piece of legislation which is extremely important. I repeat, it is bipartisan. I hope we can have a productive couple of days, pass this bill, and move on to other matters."

That's a mighty flippant statement over a bill that is ripe with potential for abuse, folks. It's that flippancy and stunning ignorance of what SOPA could mean for the Internet that makes a "nuclear option" like shutting down some of the most-used areas of the Internet start looking like a good plan.




The acting is top-notch here. Clooney is dependable and makes good choices when choosing his scripts (he makes you almost

Director David Fincher (Fight Club, The

The cinematography is incredible as it is in all of Fincher's films. The score by Trent Reznor and Atticus Ross is impressive and is not your traditional score by any means. The standout performance among the exceptional cast has to be Rooney Mara.



The movie, based on a book with the same name, tells the true story of Colin Clark (Eddie Redmayne), a young twenty-something who dreams of a career in the movie business. I can not say enough wonderful things about this film, which is rare for me. There's no real plot to speak of, it's just one English boy's account of meeting his American movie star crush. The film relies solely on the actors and their ability to embody the icons they're portraying. If you buy them, you buy the film. And every single one of them is brilliant.

Besides Monroe and Olivier, the film is filled with other notable names such as Miss Scarlett O'Hara herself Vivian Leigh (Julia Ormond) and "Death of a Salesman" playwright Arthur Miller (Dougray Scott). Judi Dench also gives an outstanding supporting performance as British acting legend Sybil

Other supporting actors include: Toby Jones, as Monroe's publicist, who is crass and foul-mouthed, but knows how to get the right kind of press for his client; Dominic Cooper, Monroe's manager, who wants to protect Monroe while he tries to smooth the waters between her and Olivier; and a post-Potter Emma Watson, as a wardrobe assistant who can't keep Clark's attention.

The entire supporting cast play their parts perfectly, but what is a movie about Marilyn Monroe without Marilyn Monroe?

The part had to be cast just right and Williams is a perfect fit. She not only captured the look, but also the essence of the blonde beauty. Roger Ebert describes her performance best in his review on rogerebert.com, "She evokes so many Marilyns, public and private, real and make-believe. We didn't know Monroe, but we believe she must have been something like his [Monroe]."

I've only seen a handful of Marilyn movies, but there were times when I forgot I wasn't watching the actual actress. Williams is completely lost into the character. She is Monroe, in her mannerisms, delivery, and spirit.

"My Week with Marilyn" captures a moment in movie-making history. It transports the audience back to a different era. No one may know who Marilyn really was, but this film offers a short glimpse into the life of a smart, yet troubled, young woman, whose legend will never die.

Feeling low? Seasonal Affective Disorder

There is not a holiday in sight, outside of Valentine's Day. While grocery stores may already be selling Easter candy, that is three months away.

For some people, this is emotionally their worst time of year. The holidays are behind us, along with all the celebration and long-awaited favorite seasonal foods. Because of the chilly weather and great comfort food, we may have put on a few extra pounds, been more lax on our exercise routines, or even lost sight of the summer clothes hanging in the back of the closet.

This is when people start signing up for marathons, gym memberships, and buying fruit juicing machines. On the flip side of the positive goals, there is a dark side to this time of year.

A more serious topic is Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD), otherwise known as seasonal depression. It is an annually-anticipated mood disorder for those affected, which is typically worst in the winter months.

This is likely due to reduced amounts of sunlight, which causes less natural serotonin production in the brain. SAD may cause general depression symptoms, loss of energy, and drastic weight/appetite changes.

One option would be to move within 30 degrees of the equator, where sun exposure is great enough to avoid this condition in nearly everyone. Another, less tropical solution includes discussing concerns with a doctor to see if using antidepressants or light therapy seasonally could be just the

For the longest time, Sonic the Hedgehog has been one of the foremost favorite video game characters of not only myself, but of the gaming community as a whole. Originally created in 1991 to take on Ma-

This leads into gameplay containing modern remixes of classic Sonic levels and vice versa. The control takes some getting used to, but once you master it, you can easily get through most of the game without dying. The graphics are the most beautiful I have ever seen in a Sonic game, including the aforementioned "Sonic Colors".

The environments are full of color and great details (most notably Sky Sanctu-

ary collapsing around as you go through it), and the framerate is consistently without slowdown. The music is full of remixes of classic Sonic themes (the Modern Chemical Plant Zone is my favorite tune).

While the side characters are in the game, you only play as Classic Sonic or Modern Sonic, thus addressing one of the main complaints that people give about newer Sonic games. Boss fights are full of wonderful homages to past

The game also includes the full original "Sonic the Hedgehog" game as an unlockable feature, so longtime fans can have a piece of nostalgia in their grasp, and new ones can see where it all began.

Overall, "Sonic Generations" is by far the best Sonic game that has been released in the modern era of Sonic games. I heartily recommend it to everyone.
