## COMM 218: Interpersonal Communication - Benton Center (CRN 41203)

Welcome to COMM218: Interpersonal Communication. I hope that you can benefit from this course related to your own interpersonal relationships, regardless be they face-to-face or online. Below you will find the syllabus for the course. Please read through it CAREFULLY, paying special attention to assignment deadlines. A calendar with *ALL* assignments due dates for the ENTIRE TERM is included, so late assignments are not accepted.

We will focus on the development of interpersonal communication knowledge and the improvement of interpersonal communication skills, both in the context of face-to-face and online relationships. We will move toward these goals by exploring various aspects of theory and practical skill development in the interpersonal communication process. The various aspects of interpersonal communication which we will explore include self-concept, perception, emotions, language, nonverbal communication, listening, relationship development, communication climates and conflict resolution. Exploration of these topics will involve readings, in-class discussions, small group activities, video clips, written assignments, presentations, quizzes, and exams.

Success in this course is largely dependent upon your willingness to be an active participant. Additionally, students who successfully complete this course are willing and able to use the technology necessary to access web information, submit assignments, and communicate. You must also be a self-disciplined, independent learner with college level reading and writing skills. Completion of WR121 AND RD90 is STRONGLY recommended. Further you should be able to recognize the value, application and ethical responsibilities of the communication process, engage in ethical communication that allow people to accomplish goals, construct clear messages, interact with increased self-confidence, respond to the needs of diverse individuals, build and maintain relationships, and recognize the value of listening and empathy within your life. Success in this course is directly linked to reading your textbook, taking quizzes and exams, watching video clips, giving presentations, in-class discussions and activities.

**ATTENDANCE:** Your attendance is based on both your presence in class as well as your participation in discussions and small group activities. Additionally, you must arrive to class on time and stay for the full class period in order to be counted as present for the day. You are allowed one (1) unexcused absence for the term. For every additional unexcused absence over one (1), your *FINAL COURSE GRADE* will be lowered by 1/3. If you are going to be gone for a college sanctioned event, documentation from a coach, counselor, or academic advisor needs to be submitted PRIOR to being gone in order for the absence to be excused. Documentation after the fact will not be accepted. Lastly, missing my class for another class, for any reason, is unacceptable.

**IN-CLASS ACTITIVES:** Each week there will be a variety of in-class activities, that you will earn points for. You must be present in class to complete these assignments. Make up activities are not offered for unexcused absences.

**QUIZZES:** Every other week there will be a brief ten-question quiz worth 20 points that is over the material covered in class since the previous quiz and is designed to check your reading of the text. The questions will be multiple choice, you will have 30 minutes to complete the quiz, and you may use your book or notes. These quizzes are due before midnight on the Sunday of weeks 1, 3, 5, 7, and 9. All due dates are listed on the course calendar for the term, which means late quizzes will not be accepted. Be sure to give yourself enough time to complete each quiz.

**FILM GROUP PRESENTATION:** During week 7 of the term you will be assigned the Film Group Presentation. Throughout the term we watch clips from TV shows and films that demonstrate examples of course concepts. The group presentation will require you to work in a group of students, select a chapter from the text, a film from a designated list, watch the film, and identify the concepts from the chosen chapter used in the chosen film. As a group you will present this information the last week of the term. More information and specific assignment requirements will be handed out during week 7.

**DEADLINES:** Assignments that are due in class, are due in the first 10 minutes of the class period. After that time assignment are late and are not accepted. Assignments due outside of class are due on Sundays by 11:59PM. If you miss a deadline, it is NOT acceptable to simply email me an assignment.

**24 HOUR POLICY:** Once graded work is handed back, you must wait 24 hours before asking questions, with the exception of deciphering hand writing. I take the time to write comments on all graded work, so please take the time to read through those comments before asking questions as many times the questions that arise are answered there.

WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS: For all written assignments that you turn in they must be typed, double-spaced, stapled, and proofread. Use of conventional spelling, complete sentences and an appropriately formal approach to assignments is required, meaning "text" language, emotions, or abbreviations are not appropriate. This is a college course with scholarly standards and as such to meet these standards you need to do your best work.
