Accepted submissions will be shared under a <u>Creative Commons Attribution 4.0 license</u> (Learn more about OER and Creative Commons licenses). One of the goals of this project is to give the community a chance to collectively reflect on the past year together, and give future Roadrunners a window into our experiences.

What

- Submissions must be your original work (they may contain openly licensed content--contact willihm@linnbenton.edu to learn more about this). If there are images of people, we may request additional permissions because of privacy laws.
- There is no format limitation (as long as it can be submitted digitally). Poetry, prose, art, cartoons, dance videos, blueprints, assignment prompts and more are all accepted
- In general, we ask that your contributions respond to some of the following questions:
 - What did you learn this year?
 - What changed about your teaching or learning this year?
 - When did you lose it this year?
 - When did you win at something, or figure something out, this year?




Study Time


