COURSE DESCRIPTION

A comprehensive introduction to the art, history and workings of the theater. Students will be given a broad and general background in theater including production elements (lights, sound, sets, costumes, make-up, etc...) of acting, theater history and criticism. Students will attend live performances, view videos of plays and write reviews of live and filmed theater.

Develop a working definition of theatre

Understand the basic history of the development of modern theater

Identify the roles of theatre practitioner

Identify the basic structure of a plot

Apply the basic criteria for theatre criticism

Identify the various theatre genres

Identify and describe the functions of different lighting and sound equipment.
