Course Description

PSY202 - General Psychology discusses the social and personality aspects of psychology, including intelligence, motivation and emotion, health and stress, personality development, classification and treatment of psychological disorders, and the social context of human behavior and attitudes.

Course Learning Outcomes

As a result of successfully completing this course, you should be able to:

- Demonstrate knowledge of scientific methodology.
- Demonstrate knowledge of basic nervous system anatomy and function.
- Explain the role of heredity, evolution, culture and environment in human behavior and development.
- Explain the process of physical, cognitive and social change over the human lifespan.
- Explain the role of biology, culture and environment on perception, learning, memory, reasoning, problem-solving and language.

Course Requirements

There will be 5 learning units completed during this class (one every two weeks). There will be 1 activity, 1 response paper, and 1 quiz for each learning unit. See <u>Deadlines for Assignments</u> for a detailed list of deadlines for each learning unit. Your final grade in this class will be determined by the total points you earn as a percentage of the total points possible (350): 90% = A, 80% = B, 70% = C, 60% = D, 59% and below = F. The specifics of each assignment are discussed below:

Quizzes: There will be 5 guizzes worth 30 points each at the end of each learning unit. The guizzes will consist of 30 multiple-choice and true-false questions and you will have 30 minutes to complete them. The quizzes are forced completion and timed, so once you start a quiz, you have to finish it. You cannot save the quiz, exit and come back later to complete it. Once you have submitted your quiz, your score will immediately be shown. Feedback on wrong answers will not be available until after the deadline for the guiz has passed. Quizzes will be available **no later** than Thursday of the second week of the learning unit and **must** be completed by 11:55 p.m. on the Sunday of the 2nd week of the unit. If by some unforeseen circumstance, I am unable to post a guiz by Thursday, the deadline will be extended. There are no late guizzes allowed, so do not wait until right before the deadline. The only exception to this rule is if something happens to your computer or connection during the quiz. If this happens, notify me via e-mail immediately. In most cases, I can reset your guiz before the deadline, but in the rare instance in which I cannot get to a computer myself, you will be allowed extended time to take the guiz. There will be one opportunity at the end of the term for those students who missed a quiz to complete a makeup quiz. The makeup quiz can also be used to replace a low quiz score. It will be comprehensive and be of similar format as the regular guizzes. The makeup guiz will be available during the last week of learning unit #5 and will be due by 11:55 p.m. on the Wednesday of finals week.

<u>Activities</u>: There will be one activity for each learning unit (20 points each) over the course of the term. The purpose of the activities is for you to learn how to analyze and apply the concepts discussed in the reading (including supplements). Activities will be completed at the LaunchPad website for the textbook (access code is needed; see <u>LaunchPad Access Instructions</u> for further information on how to purchase and/or register an access code). Activities must be completed by 11:55 p.m. on the **first** Sunday of the applicable learning unit. **No late activities will be accepted** (you can makeup for a missed activity by completing the extra credit opportunities provided that are discussed below). Essay Papers: There will be one essay paper due for each learning unit (20 points each). Essay papers will be written in response to one essay question I pose regarding reading, supplements, webpages I request you visit, etc. Papers should be in essay format, typed and double-spaced. There will be a separate link for each paper assignment located in the applicable learning unit on Moodle, and specific directions regarding length or other formatting will be contained within the instructions. In order to get full credit, students' answers to guestions posed must be complete, detailed and thoughtful. See Essay Paper Grading Criteria for more information about the papers and how I evaluate them. Papers need to be submitted to the Moodle site and are due no later than 11:55 p.m. on the **Saturday** of the second week of the applicable learning unit (see Submitting Assignments to Turn-it-In for Moodle for directions on how to submit your papers). You are allowed to turn one and only one essay paper in late and you will also have one opportunity to re-write either Essay Paper #1 OR #2 for a better grade. Late and Re-written essay papers are due by **11:55 p.m.** two weeks from the original due date. The last 3 essay papers CANNOT be rewritten as you should be well aware of what I expect in a paper by Essay Paper #3. If you are using Essay #5 as your one late paper, it must be received by the date and time the makeup quiz is due (11:55 p.m. on Wednesday of finals week).

<u>Extra Credit Discussion Forums</u>: There will be a maximum of 3 points of extra credit available through the discussion forums for each learning unit, which means you will have the opportunity to earn 15 points total extra credit. The **main purpose** of the extra credit is to replace a missing activity, not to boost your grade. Making sure you earn all the extra credit possible will ensure that you will not be penalized more than 5 points for a missing assignment. There will be 5 discussion topics assigned (one for each learning unit) as extra credit throughout the term. Discussion for each topic will begin during the beginning of the 2nd week of the learning unit. Postings must be thoughtful and detailed in order for the student to receive the extra credit points. **A student will be able to earn their full 3 points of extra credit for each learning unit by participating in the discussion forum.** Further instructions on how to post to discussion forums and scoring of postings are available at <u>How to Post in Discussion Forums</u>.
