PHL 202 ELEMENTARY ETHICS (3)

Winter 2022 LINN BENTON COMMUNITY CENTER Wednesdays: 1-2.20 On ZOOM

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is a general introduction to ethical theories and topics. It uses reflective and critical reading, thinking, writing skills and discussion to explore the methods and ideas of ancient and modern Ethics such as relativism, egoism, social contract theory, Utilitarianism or Kantianism. The course will raise important questions such as: are there any objective moral standards, what makes the right acts right and the wrong ones wrong and how do we know it, what is evil? The course includes explanations and illustrations of the central theories of Ethics as well as close scrutiny of standard arguments supporting and critiquing these theories. Applies ethical theories to contemporary moral problems and personal dilemmas.

PERFORMANCE BASED LEARNER OUTCOMES:

- 1. Upon successful completion of the course, student should be able to:
- 2. Explain the most important ancient and modern theories of Ethics and the standards arguments used to support them.
- 3. Assess the strengths and weaknesses of ethical theories in light of how they address actual moral dilemmas.
- 4. Articulate a personal ethical perspective on how one should live well.
- 5. Use Ethics to better understand and resolve personal, social, and political problems.
- 6. Use various forms of written and verbal discussion to articulate understanding and practical application of various aspects of Ethics.
- 7. Write coherent essays using textual support, documentation (where applicable) and standard grammar/mechanics.
- 8. Thoughtfully and respectfully engage those who hold different ethical views.

PARTICIPATION AND ATTENDANCE

- * Students must participate to receive credit for each day's class ("arrive" on time, complete in-class assignments, follow instructions, etc.).
- * Please do not email me if you can't come to class from any other reasons then the medical ones (e.g. you can't start your car, you need to take your grandma shopping etc.)
- * You are responsible for your learning process as much as for your work. Keep copies of assignments and "back up" your computer files. If absent, make sure to obtain notes from another student.
- * Check LBCC email regularly as it is the instructor's first point of contact. You may also want to check Instructor's website since there may be some updated information during the term.

ATTENDENCE and PARTICIPATION:

This class is based on the in class dialogue and guided discussions that will allow you to break down the assigned reading into more understandable pieces. Because your input into the class discussions and in class group projects is essential you will be required to fully participate in our ZOOM calls i.e. "arrive" on time, complete in-class assignments, follow instructions, etc.. Points will be deducted of your grade if you are missing a class. If you intend to leave ZOOM early make sure to notify the instructor.

REFLECTION PIECES:

Every other day you will be asked to submit your brief reflection pieces (1-2 pages long) in which you will be asked to evaluate one of the prompts shared with you in class. I will ask you to explore your thoughts about the assigned topic and express your questions and ideas concerning the issue. <u>QUIZZES:</u>

Every other week you will be asked to take a quiz which will consist of 10 questions pertaining to the preceding weeks.

FINAL EXAM:

Your final exam will consists of 40 questions from our biweekly quizzes.
