Course Description:

Builds on the knowledge acquired in NUR 268B and continues to focus on nursing management, critical thinking, and safety with regard to medication therapy. Includes the topics of: pharmacokinetics, pharmacodynamics, specific drug therapies, interactions of the drug groups which are applicable to the content provided in NUR 103A. Uses drug lists for each major category of drugs to direct learning for drug action, safe dosage, side effects, drug interactions, adverse reactions and nursing implications.

Within this course **2 hours is dedicated to pain theory** to assist in complying with OSBN educational requirements.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

Management of Care: Perform procedures necessary to safely admit, discharge, or transfer a client related to medication management.

Safety and Infection Control: Identify safety concerns in medication management across the lifespan.

Health Promotion and Maintenance: Understand and begin to educate clients on immunization schedules.

Psychosocial Integrity: Assess family dynamics and the implication of medication management across the lifespan.

Basic Care and Comfort: Assess the client's ability to swallow and chew and how this affects medication management.

Pharmacological and Parenteral Therapies: Perform calculations needed for medication administration.

Reduction of Risk Potential: Develop an appropriate client teaching plan surrounding the signs and symptoms of bleeding, including interventions.

Physiological Adaptation: Apply knowledge of pathophysiology to clients with fluid and electrolyte imbalances.

Professional Engagement: Participate in reflective practice.

To achieve the course outcomes, student will achieve the following goals:

This class has no clinical component, however, contents within this course are directly applicable within the core nursing courses (NUR101 – NUR203) and clinical goals within those courses will require knowledge obtained within this course. Students will be expected to demonstrate knowledge and understanding of medications. The student will best be able to demonstrate this by the following:

- Justify the appropriateness for medication(s) within a specific patient care situation.
- Prepare or withhold medications based on evidence and judgment.
- Calculate accurate dosages, times, measures and volumes of medications as well as accurate weights of patients.
- Select non-drug complementary measures/nursing interventions to promote therapeutic effects of medications.
- Identify nursing interventions/actions appropriate to situations based on early recognition of adverse drug effects.

- Identify appropriate administration methods for medications using established safety protocols, minimizing adverse interactions, and incorporating patient education.
- Evaluates the effectiveness of medications and compares therapeutic results compared with baseline data.
- Uses drug lists for each major category of drugs to direct learning for drug action, safe dosage, side effects, drug interactions, adverse reactions and nursing implications.

5. Math Competency Test:

Students are required to achieve a score of 100% on a nursing math competency test in Nursing 268C and Nursing 202A. Each student will be given two opportunities within the first three weeks of NUR 268C and NUR 202A to meet the math competency. If a student fails to meet the standard for the competency demonstration (100% accuracy), on the second attempt, the student will need to arrange with the team coordinator for times and dates to demonstrate competency. If a student fails to meet the standard for the competency demonstration (100% accuracy), on the third attempt, the student will be placed on a guide to success with recommendations for remediation of math concepts not yet mastered. If the student cannot demonstrate competency prior to the end of week seven, the student may withdraw from the course or receive a grade of "F".

6. Drug Cards: Points for drug cards will be determined in two ways. The first drug card evaluation will be an evaluation of a single drug card of the instructor's choosing. The second drug card evaluation will be for all drug cards completed in NUR268 C. Students who have all drug cards for NUR268 C completed will receive the total points (see drug card rubric for how this will be evaluated for points). A drop box will be provided for every week of class to submit drug cards.

Nursing faculty will be the proctor for the face to face midterm exam or Proctorio will be the proctor for the midterm exam, in the event that the LBCC nursing program has to pivot to the virtual environment.

Final Exam: Multiple choice, short answer, fill in the blank, matching, case study and select all that apply questions may be used, as well as alternate item format questions (questions that pertain to pictures, graphs, documents and/or NCLEX Next Gen questions). The final will consist of 50 questions. The final exam will be taken face to face at the HOC computer lab or via Proctorio. Per LBCC Nursing Student Policy, late acceptances after 5 minutes of when the exam is scheduled to begin and without prior notification, will not be granted access and will result in a recorded grade of zero (0).
