COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course exposes students to theory and practice in the creation, adaptation and delivery of original speeches before an audience. It also provides the opportunity to understand the nature of public speaking and discourse in both ancient and modern society.

COURSE POLICIES

<u>ATTENDANCE</u>: Because of this pandemic era we are living in, setting an attendance policy in stone is foolhardy and possibly even unfair. This does not mean attendance for class is optional. Your success will be largely correlated to your presence in class. You cannot and will not pass by simply showing up on your scheduled speech days, but at no other point in the term. Fair warning.

If you are feeling ill, you should not come to class. If you are going to miss a significant portion of class (ex: you test positive for COVID-19) please communicate your situation with me so we can work together to come up with possible alternative arrangements during your absence.

I will do my best to be understanding, compassionate, and flexible. But just know: no matter what, you cannot pass COMM 111 without delivering public speeches.

- 2. It is your responsibility to complete assignments prior to the start of class. This includes homework, papers, and speech preparation. This allows us to engage in productive class discussions and is the time to ask relevant questions.
- 3. Please don't let tardiness become a problem. If you are late on more than one occasion, I will discuss this issue with you outside of class time. If the problem persists, further instances of tardiness will count as unexcused absences.

- 2. All speeches must be given on the day they are assigned. If you are unable to attend class on your scheduled speech day, I must be notified as soon as possible prior to the assigned presentation day/time. I understand that special circumstances can occur, but it is your responsibility to inform me of any. Make-up opportunities will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis. Student athletes and others who miss class due to College activities must complete assignments prior to an absence.
- 3. Proper dress/apparel is required for students on presentation days. Failure to comply with our understood dress guidelines (think business casual) may result in loss of points. Professional attire is encouraged, but not mandatory. More information on this will be made available as presentation days approach.
