FILMS:

Archaeology and anthropology have many visual aspects. Thus, there will be multiple films for you to view. The films will serve as the starting point for a few of the weekly discussion questions.

POWER POINT LECTURES:

Most weeks I will upload a narrated PowerPoint lecture. These will be what I have used to develop your biweekly quizzes along with the films and readings.

Course Requirements

INTRODUCTORY ACTIVITIES: You have one introductory form worth 25 points of potential extra credit where you introduce yourself and then say hello to two others. Initial post is worth 15 points and your two responses are worth 5 points each. In general, this forum will be closed after week one. I will leave it open. If you post after week 1, you will only be able to earn the initial 15 points, so take advantage!

FORUM: Every week you will have a short forum worth 20 points. Your initial post worth 10 points will be due the Thursday of the week assigned by 11:59. Your response to two other classmates is worth 5 points per response and will be due the Monday of the following week by 11:59. In general we will have cool archaeology films we will watch and discuss. Occasionally, we will also have an article or a lecture.

You will see questions to answer in each forum. This exercise is worth 180 points total as we do not have a forum finals week which is week 10.

EXAMS AND QUIZZES: There is a total of one final exam worth 70 points and four quizzes worth a total of 100 points. The final will be multiple choice and true/false with one essay question worth 25 points. The quizzes will be worth 25 points per quiz and will have one essay question along with multiple choice and true and false. These biweekly quizzes are to help you study for the exam and most questions on your final are taken *directly* from the quizzes. You will have two chances on the quizzes to get the best grade possible. You have only one chance at the final unless you have technical difficulties. It will be open two weeks. These exercises are worth 170 points total.

FINAL PROJECT: In addition to the test, quizzes and four forums, you will have a final project. This project topic must be about the discovery of an important archaeological site you get to pick. You will discuss the site, how it was found and dated, what was discovered about the culture and history as well as what archaeological methods were used in learning about the culture. This paper should be 2 ½ to 3 pages double spaced with 12 point font and one inch margins. Lastly, you need at least three peer reviewed journal articles about your site. I will post more about what this means on Moodle. This project is worth 75 points total and is due at the end of Week 9.

All together there are 425 points possible and 25 extra credit points. I do allow for greater than perfect grades and all of you start out with an A.
