

Twain Marks Return to Stage Life



Mark Twain returns to the stage in the person of Bill Moeller, Friday, Oct. 13, at Linn-Benton Community College.

"An Evening with Mark Twain" will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Main Forum on the college campus, 6500 SW Pacific Blvd. Admission is \$2.00 for adults, and \$1.00 for students, children under 12 and Golden Age card holders. Tickets will be available at Campus and Community Services Office and at the door.

Moeller, a radio station director in Centralia, Washington, performs a oneman show based on the writings, notes, and speeches of Samuel Clemens, one of America's most beloved humorists and philosophers.

He has been perfecting his performance since 1974, earning enthusiastic reviews throughout the Northwest. His impersonation of Twain ranges from whimsical reminiscences of the author's youth through hilarious discussions of the benefits of smoking, profanity and other pleasurable pastimes, to thunderous blasts at hypocrisy, or even — on occasion — poetical recountings of the tragedies of his later life.

The performance is sponsored by LBCC's Office of Campus and Community Services.
