#### **Course Description**

The third course in the lab series. Focuses on clinical application of both theory and skills in the lab, hospital, mental health, rehab, and other community settings. Builds on the identification of patient problems/nursing diagnosis, planning, and implementation of basic nursing care as it applies throughout the lifespan. Specified nursing skills, along with developing critical thinking skills and managing care abilities are demonstrated in the laboratory clinical application portion of the course.

# **Student Learning Outcomes**

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

Management of Care: Apply evidence-based research to plan care and develop a

nursing care plan with three diagnoses of increasing complexity.

Safety and Infection Control: Demonstrate safe client clinical decision-making/critical

thinking in the simulated care and clinical settings.

Health Promotion and Maintenance: Provide care and education for clients from birth through childbearing age in the simulated care and clinical perinatal settings.

Psychosocial Integrity: Identify and support client coping strategies.

Basic Care and Comfort: Implement measures such as comfort, education, basic care in preparation for client discharge or transfer.

Pharmacological and Parenteral Therapies: Demonstrate safe and effective administration of IV fluids and IV medications in the simulated care setting and independently and safely administer oral medications in the clinical setting.

Reduction of Risk Potential: Evaluate client responses to procedures and treatments, intervening as indicated.

Physiological Adaptation: Manage the care of the client with fluid and electrolyte imbalance, alterations in airway, or alterations in hemodynamic status.

Professional Engagement: Demonstrate improved time management in the care of two clients.

Participation for this coursework is dependent upon cooperation with LBCC Nursing Programs clinical partners. Within the clinical settings students will follow covid policies as indicated by the clinical facility where they are assigned. Should clinical partners deny cohort/group/individual participation within a facility, students may be required to participate in a variety of non-direct patient care activities which may require the use of technology.

## Grading

Evaluation of learning which results in a grade for the course will be determined by clinical performance which is a combination of performance and participation in clinical activities, Skill/Simulation and IPE. Clinical performance is on a PASS / NO PASS basis. Attendance and participation in all clinical experience is critical to student success. Components of determining the grade include all areas of the clinical evaluation tool. Students should be advised that this also includes participation in all skills/simulation curriculum and the completion of all assigned materials and exercises according to due dates. Of special note are the following areas which apply to all clinical settings:

A. Consistently practices within the parameters of skill competency and knowledge level in the setting.

- B. Evaluates personal clinical performance and modifies his/her nursing practice accordingly in the setting.
- C. Seeks feedback and assistance appropriately and incorporates feedback to improve performance in the setting.

Clinical performance is evaluated at the mid point and end of the term. Clinical instructors are permitted to evaluate student performance as frequently as necessary to determine achievement of course outcomes.

Students must pass NUR268C, NUR103A and NUR103B courses concurrently in order to progress to the next sequence of the program.

<u>Skills / Simulation Lab performance</u> is evaluated as part of the clinical experience. Participation in this learning environment is mandatory and may require preparatory activities above those assigned to the other members of the course on the assigned weeks. Absences will be tracked on the <u>LBCC Attendance and Participation Tool</u>, absences may require students to complete make-up clinical shifts. Students are to acquire new skills and have their individual performance validated as correct. Students may be mandated to make-up skills/simulation time prior to continuing on to the off-campus clinical experience. Student may also be mandated to remediation and/or a traditional "check-off" experience in order to determine progression. The lab areas are considered as clinical areas and students are to wear clinical attire when participating in assigned instructional time in those areas. Students should review the Uniform Policy.
