
Art 115 Basic Design I: Composition

Course Description:

Basic Design I offers an introduction to theory and studio practice in using the principles and elements of design to articulate visual ideas. Focus will be on concepts relating to 2-D design structure. Students will be exposed to art history references as they relate to concepts as well as being encouraged to write and think critically about art and design. Emphasis will be on instilling sound foundational information in the traditional aspects of design as well as encouraging thoughtful exploration of contemporary design potential.

Student Learning Objectives:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Articulate verbally, visually, and in writing an understanding of the Elements and Principles of Design.

- 2. Articulate visually, verbally, and in writing, creative problem solving through guided completion of assignments relative to understanding visual design concepts.
- 3. Articulate verbally, visually and in writing appropriate vocabulary.

Attendance & Late Work:

This course will be offered asynchronously on Moodle allowing you to have complete control over your studies. Each week on Wednesday from 10:00-11:30, I will give a live lecture on zoom https://linnbenton.zoom.us/j/93399417594. If at all possible, I highly encourage you to attend. I really want to meet everyone in the class, get to know you, and help you accomplish your artistic/academic goals. All sessions will be recorded for those who cannot make it.

Due to the experiential nature of this course, your contribution of artworks, discussions, and critiques will not only enrich your learning but that of the entire class. Missing an assignment will often mean missing a critique opportunity for your own work. Even if your assignment is not complete you are encouraged to share your feedback with others about their art. Please communicate with me in advance if you know you need an extension or realize that you need to miss an activity or due date. Make up work will not be accepted without an excused absence. Late work will be marked down one letter grade. Even if it is late please turn it in! It will greatly help your grade.

Classroom Culture:

- Be engaged, be kind, be curious! If you have extenuating circumstances talk with me about them during office hours on zoom.

- 2. Some of the most powerful learning takes place between peers (artist to artist, designer to designer). We are all responsible for creating an inclusive classroom across a digital divide; please make extra effort to connect with other artists and treat them with respect and compassion.
- 3. Due to the studio component of this course we will be getting messy. Please wear clothes that can withstand creative mistakes. Plan to spend the last 5 min of your work time cleaning your space and making your home studio an environment you want to return to.

Academic Integrity: Work made before the start of this course or for other art courses will not be accepted for credit. Students at LBCC are responsible for pursuing their studies with honesty and fairness, and in a manner that respects the rights and dignity of others. *Recycling, referencing, appropriation, and outsourcing play important roles in contemporary art. If you use these tools be sure you can clearly state the conceptual significance of your choices and be transparent about them during critique/reflection.

Grading:

A = 90-100% Excellent Work, B = 80-89% Good Work, C = 70-79% Average Work, D = 60-69% Incomplete or Poor Work, F = 0-59% Incomplete or Failing Work Homework, studio time, and research are required. Plan to spend at least 6 hours per week on completion of assignments and research.

Assignments: As designers and artists we learn through creating. I have five key assignments intended to help strengthen your technical and conceptual skills. If you ever have an idea about how to augment an assignment to enhance your learning please let me know.

Lectures: Each week I will provide a live lecture on zoom and explain the current assignments. This is a perfect time to ask questions. If you cannot attend you will receive a slide lecture about visual culture that explains projects and their requirements.

Quizzes: The lectures and slideshows will give you valuable information about concepts that will strengthen your art and contain everything you need to know for our weekly quiz. Your weekly quizzes are untimed and can be repeated to earn a higher grade. It should be a low stress way to review important concepts from the course.

Forums: Each week you will be asked to participate in discussion forums and provide your fellow classmates with feedback. You must take photos of your work to be uploaded to moodle. Please email me if you do not have access to a camera. Photos must be cropped/ edited to best represent your work.

Final Project: Announced during week 8, your final project will allow you to utilize skills gained throughout the term.

Due dates & times: In an effort to reduce stress and create clarity, due dates will be on Wednesday and Sunday at 10pm. Often I will ask you to contribute content to forums on Wednesday and reply to the posts of others by Sunday. If you see a date or time that looks odd- please reach out to me via email or zoom. While I strive to provide you with the best online experience possible, I am used to teaching in the studio and sometimes make mistakes.

Extra Credit is available until week 9. Extra credit can be earned through weekly challenges on moodle. Alternatively independent extra credit opportunities can be planned with me during office hours or email. Examples include, listening to an artist lecture on youtube, going on a virtual tour of a museum, submitting work to a show or watching an approved documentary. Creating extra artwork, designs, or a written reflection can also serve as extra credit material.

Project 5 Visual Memorial	Evaluated on creative problem solving and visual communication of remembrance.	30pt.
Quizzes	Untimed and unlimited attempts before the due date. Quizzes are intended to help you review important vocabulary & concepts from the course.	6 quizzes total 6 x 10pt= 60pt
Forum Discussions & Critiques	2 per week, evaluated on posting and responding to the posts of others. Use of visual art vocabulary, formulating and receiving constructive criticism), holistic engagement of technical, conceptual, and social significance	18 forums total 18 x 5pt= 90pt
