- 4. Focus a main point and develop this main point clearly and logically using examples and illustrations in a well-organized essay.
- 5. Revise writing using standard college editing and proofreading conventions (grammar, syntax, spelling, and punctuation).

Attendance / Participation and Time Management: Attendance is essential for many reasons. In this class, we expect you to be a team player in reading responses and writing processes. Material is often covered in class that you won't always find online. Also, Research shows that consistent attendance results in higher passing rates and higher GPAs. - Your final revised paragraphs and essays should be typed using MLA guidelines presented in class.
- Turn in rough drafts and peer comments (workshop notes) with your polished, revised essay assignments.
- Do your work on time. Our class is organized around extensive revision: therefore, your rough drafts and final papers need to be on time. Work more than a week overdue will not earn credit unless there are mitigating circumstances.
- **Do your own work.** Simply put: Don't plagiarize (using someone else's work as your own without proper in-text citations and documentation).
- Cell phones should be silenced and out of sight unless you have instructor permission to leave it out but silenced. If instructor permission is granted, please step out of the classroom quietly to take your call or respond to a text message.
