Course Description and Learning Outcomes

Interpersonal Communication 218-*Introduces communication in person-to person interactions, emphasizing theoretical principles and their practical application. Concentrates on development of communication skills in interpersonal contexts. Recommended: Placement into WR121; or WR115 with a grade of C or better. F, W, Sp, Su 4 Credits. After completing this course, students will be able to do the following :*

Demonstrate ethical and competent oral communication in English.

- Students will understand how to be more aware of the interpersonal communication context and thus be able to adapt to that context.
- Students will build an elementary skill set useful towards functioning as a more appropriate, effective, and credible communicator.

Articulate theories of communication and/or rhetoric.

- Students will build a new vocabulary regarding interpersonal communication, replacing their personal ideas or understandings about communication with research/evidence based constructs.
- Students will connect theoretical/research-based constructs to their own interpersonal communication practices and habits.

Apply critical thinking to communication and/or rhetoric.

- Students will develop critical means for understanding and evaluating their responsibilities with their interpersonal communication practices.
- Students will increase their ability to engage in perspective-taking in the midst of interpersonal communication.

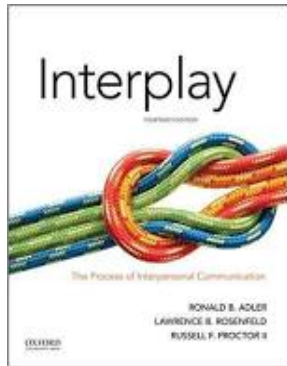
