Course Description:

NUR 103 is the third nursing course. This course focuses on patients who are experiencing physical and psychological changes as they relate to mental health, neurology, pediatrics, perinatal and newborn nursery settings, cardiopulmonary disorders, oncology and immunological disorders. The nursing roles of provider of care, teacher, and member of a profession are explored. Prepares students to apply theory to NUR 103B Nursing Practice Throughout the Lifespan.

As a result of this course the student will achieve the following outcomes:

- 1. **Management of Care**: Demonstrates critical thinking and problem-solving skills as a framework for the nursing process.
- 2. **Safety and Infection Control**: Identifies proper methods to protect clients and healthcare personnel from health and environmental hazards.
- 3. **Health Promotion and Maintenance**: Identifies health promotion and disease prevention strategies throughout the lifespan.
- 4. **Psychosocial Integrity**: Engages in professional and therapeutics relationships with peers and colleagues, establishes rapport with clients and families.
- 5. **Basic Care and Comfort**: Integrate pathophysiological and behavioral science concepts with rationale for nursing care across the lifespan.

- 6. **Pharmacological and Parenteral Therapies**: Utilizes critical thinking skills when evaluating client conditions and related pharmacological therapies.
- 7. **Reduction of risk**: Reviews normal findings and identifies abnormal findings and changes in the client condition across the lifespan.
- 8. **Physiological Adaptation**: Prioritizes client problems and plans appropriate nursing interventions to meet client needs.
- 9. **Professional Engagement**:Utilize evidence-based research to develop a professional paper in APA format.
