Women Ending Hunger One Sneaker at a Time

Pirates, fairies, princesses and more waited in line to receive their information packets and complimentary trick-or-treat bags; cases of water and bags of oranges were being stacked high on the back benches; children were running and jumping about; energy and excitement filled the air, and it was not even 9:00am yet!

Women Ending Hunger, an auxiliary of the Marion/Polk Food Share Organization, held its' first ever 5K Fun Run/Walk on Saturday October 22nd at the River Front Park in Salem Oregon, to raise awareness of hunger relief efforts.

Many people registered online. It was only a \$15 donation. Others just showed up with canned food or monetary donations and joined the run.

While the event was fun, the message is a serious one. Women Ending Hunger puts on several events and fundraisers every year in the efforts to end hunger. Over 5,200 families in Marion and Polk county receive a food box each month. The organization has a mission to end hunger in Marion and Polk counties... because no one should be hungry. They want

to turn 5,200 families in need to become zero families in need.

Kat Daniel is the program director for Women Ending Hunger. She has been with the organization for three years and said the run was a co-worker's idea. "Tawnya Russell came up with the idea. She is a runner. It seemed like it would be fun. With a turn out like this, and now that we know what we are doing, we will probably do it again."

Over 150 men, women and children showed up for the event. Rita Conrad showed up to support the cause and was pleased with the turn out. Conrad thinks next year will be even better, "It's like a garden, the first year it's small, second year it grows a little, and the third year it explodes."

Daniel's first inspiration to join the fight against hunger came when she was in high school. "I did a freedom from hunger hike in Denver. It was completely student run. We had over 10,000 people show up for the 30 mile hike. We raised over \$75,000. Ever since then I have had this passion to end hunger." Daniel came to Salem and started looking for work until Marion/Polk Food Share hired her. She enjoys the work that she does and said that Women Ending Hunger is especially dear to her heart. She believes that women are the major nurturers and if we can lift

up our women then we can lift everyone else.

There was a 1K for children 12 and under held at 8:30am and the 5K was held at 9:00 a.m. for the adults. Everyone was encouraged to wear costumes and a vast number of the participants did dress-up. Annee Goodrich brought her four children, dressed in costumes including, Super Mario, and the Toad. Alice Brawley brought her 7 year old daughter, dressed as a cheerleader, to participate in the fun as

The whole event was filled with smiling, happy faces. Who knew that raising awareness to end hunger could be so much fun? Hadley, a participant of the run and a Food Share worker said, "I just think it is a fun thing to do, exercise for a good cause." Jennifer Halfman, another enthusiastic participant of the 5K run, dressed up as a bottle of mustard. She cleverly used a play on her last name saying, "I'm half-man, half mustard." It was well worth it watching a bottle of mustard running down the street.

Hidden below LBCC's Industrial Building A is our very own Automotive Technology Program. Whether you are a student interested in the program or a student interested in having a car that runs, our auto shop is something you should know a little about.

In order to get this degree you must take 10-credit courses, which means five hours a day, four days a week. It typically begins with a lecture, followed by lots of handson learning in the garage.

The type of people that take this course usually fall into three categories, described by instructorial specialist J.O. Walker: "Farmboys, who came to learn to work on their equipment back home. Backyard Mechanics, who want to learn to be able to do a little handy work. Then there are those that came to get a career."

One thing to keep in mind is the training you receive in the shop is a little different than in the career itself. "This is an unreal world," said Walker. In the real world you have to work a lot faster, you have to know what you are doing, and you have to be good at it. There is constant schooling for this career because things are always changing. "The ones who are really dedicated are the ones who succeed," said Walker.

They do offer services to actual customers, but it also doesn't run on real time. Average time span

for a repair is anywhere between two days to two weeks, and the services offered depend on what the students are studying. Department Co-Chair Phil Krolick say they are covering the check engine light, clutches, driveshafts, etc. The cost of services is 10 percent over the cost of parts and a small service fee. "The thing to keep in mind is that the cars are here for student learning," adds Krolick.

Krolick describes hi

environment as being comfortable and friendly, but still professional. "I enjoy working with the students and being challenged by them," he said. If you are interested in pursuing automotive technology then you are encouraged to contact one of the instructors. There are few spots and they are hard to get into; the instructors will tell you what you need to participate.

Ridezap Shows Commuting Potential

Every day I drive to LBCC, setting my cruise control at 55 mph because the Internet told me that cars get the best mileage at that speed. Other cars zoom past me, and by the time I've driven the entire half hour commute to school, I can't help but wonder if my slow driving really saved me any money.

Linn-Benton tries hard to provide cheap transportation options for students. Most notable are the Albany Transit, the Linn-Benton Loop Bus, and the Linn County Shuttle, all of which a student can use for free if they possess a student ID card. Still, there are some of us who live further away, out of reach of these systems. Many of us end up driving ourselves to school because we can't find anyone to carpool with.

David Petersen, a former LBCC student, has had his transportation difficulties in the past. Now a student at OSU, his main problem lies in the fact that though he lives in Corvallis, his girlfriend lives in Eugene.

Petersen wanted to find someone to carpool with, but had trouble finding a website that offered suitable services. The ones he looked at had "issues," so he decided to launch his own ride-sharing website, www.ridezap.com.

Ridezap.com is a simple and easy-to-use website. The first thing you see when logging on is a box asking you to type in your origin city and destination city. As you type, a drop-down list gives suggestions for cities you might be looking for, which is very helpful for a bad speller like me.

I typed "Harrisburg OR" into the "origin city" box, and "Albany OR" into the "destination city" box. Then I clicked "search," but no options came up. Confused, I finally realized that on the whole website, there was only one ride listed, and it certainly wasn't from Harrisburg.

"Is it worth it?" I thought. "Is it worth it to try to use a website that has so few users?"

But I think it will be eventually be worth it. RideZap is new, but it is a well-made website. Each ride listing includes a map of the route from Google maps, a listing of the price the driver is asking, and a preference list, where the driver indicates whether or not he is open to things such as talking, pets, or smoking during the ride.

Similarly, there is a profile page for each user. Users are asked to rate their experiences riding with each other, in an attempt to screen out the bad drivers. After all, no one wants to catch a ride with someone if they are going to drive unsafely.

It all comes down to this: RideZap is a great website, exactly what many LBCC students need. The drawback, of course, is the fact that there are very few users at the moment. You can change that by joining and telling your friends about it. Go to www.ridezap.com and sign up today.

Defender of History Visits Campus

Ray Brown is a 57-year-old retired History teacher from Eugene, with an above-average passion for American history and liberties. His love and passion recently led him on a 3,200-mile journey like none other.

In 2010, from June to December, Brown walked "step for step" from Eugene to Atlantic City, NJ on a mission to fulfill a personal dream of walking across America, and to raise public awareness of the Constitution, the Bill of Rights, and support for American History. He called it his "son of liberty walk."

On Tuesday, Oct. 18, Brown, a claimed "civil libertarian," visited the Albany campus to share his story with around 40 students and teachers.

He set out on his journey armed with a specially-built cart, weighing close to 170 pounds, loaded with copies of the Bill of Rights and the Declaration of Independence to distribute, custom-made outfits from the revolutionary time frame he would wear time to time, food essentials, and bear spray (needed in Yellowstone and in "the ghettos of Philadelphia").

Brown said his message was clear from beginning to end and had nothing to do with your political background. "My message is the same to the Tea Party, Democrats, Republicans, and independents. I believe we as a nation need to look at our history

and remember our principles and ideals, which we were founded on. People's sovereignty and the idea that people rule in this country is important to remember."

He fought through weather conditions, construction sites, run-ins with the law, slept beside dumpsters in Idaho, and even watched his cart roll of a cliff in Wyoming one afternoon, all for his cause. He lost over thirty pounds during the trip and his longest day walking was 47 miles. His longest stretches between showers was eight days, and he even had to adjust his schedule to only walk at night through Iowa to avoid the agricultural vehicle onslaught brought by harvest season in October.

Brown was amazed at the help he received and the friends he made along the way. "People are hungry for conversation, and we have a lot more in common than we're lead to believe," Brown said.

Robert Harrison, History

instructor and Democracy Club advisor, invited Brown as part of a planned club event for the year.

Harrison said "his presentation fit perfectly with the Democracy Club's theme that we must take responsibility for our government, get involved and make a difference."

Brown handed out over 6,000 copies of the Bill of Rights during his journey, recited the Declaration of Independence by heart at Mount Rushmore, and touched several people throughout his journey across America. He gave roadside history lessons to a lady and her three grandsons in Idaho; he gave speeches in schools, and even received a police escort across the Mississippi river.

"History is not about dead people, it's about who we are," Brown said.

Brown has been invited to come back to LBCC and give more speeches and demonstrations. Stay tuned to The Commuter for future events.



Jesse Huxman replied with, "Now as a college student I just think it's cool to just dress up as something with friends and just have fun."



paper due, money is really tight because of not getting the aid yet, and I had a stupid fight with my girlfriend, and we never fight. All of a sudden I wonder if I'm doing the right thing? What should I do?

Answer: Get some help. Do some reaching out.

But let me be a bit more specific. Mid-terms are starting up in the next week or so and, probably because you've been out of school for a few years, you're out of the rhythm of things. Mid-terms are one of the most, if not the most, stressful times in any term. The work builds up and the tests tend to all hit at once. Most students are working harder, but perhaps what affects them the most is the added pressure. With added pressure, everything feels even harder than it really is.

How can you relieve the pressure? There's two things that will help. One is to get some kind of emotional release. The other is to make sure that you are in good shape academically.

Every faculty member at LBCC has office hours. They can talk to you about both the personal stress and review

your work and tell you where you are doing well and where you need help.

LB also has a counseling department to help if you are feeling stressed out. And we have a learning center where you can get help with your work – tutoring, writing help, math help, whatever you need.

But my advice really is to make some one-on-one contact with any staff member at the college. Especially if it's someone you know and trust. Folks here are good about directing students to the help they need, and that alone will relieve some pressure.

Just before the school year started, I was talking to a group of faculty and asked them, "what's the most important message you would send to all students, if you could?" One long-time teacher said, "Tell them 'we're on your side." And that's what's true. LBCC does provide a lot of special services and advising, and you should take advantage of those. But you can speak to just about anyone and get some direction, because we are on your side. So reach out. You can get the help you need.

Smith's Thriller Is a Winner


Depending on who you ask, Red State is either the best film Kevin Smith ever made, or the worst trash ever committed to celluloid. There doesn't seem to be any middle ground for this film. For the record, I'm firmly in the "best film Kevin Smith ever made" camp.

This trailer is rated R for language and violence, folks. It's Kevin Smith. What did you expect?

Red State tells the story of the Five Points Church in three distinct acts. Five Points is a teeny little fundamentalist church colored in shades of Westboro Baptist right from the start. In the very first scene, they're holding a vocal anti-gay protest complete with hateful signs, chants, and attending media circus.

The protagonists of the first act are three high school boys (Michael Angarano, Nicholas Braun, Ronnie Connell) who only want what every teen boy since the beginning of history has wanted: to get laid. To that end, they use the internet to arrange a hook-up with an older woman — a hook-up that makes every other bad hook-up you've ever heard about (or taken part in – tsk, tsk) look like a Disney fairy tale in comparison. The older woman turns out to be the daughter of Five Points' preacher (Melissa Leo), and she's there to lure the boys into a trap.

The protagonist of the second act is the ATF agent, Joseph Keenan, (John Goodman) sent to deal with the Five Points Church. If you're old enough to remember Waco, Texas, the feelings of dread are cranked up a few tense notches the split second ATF agents arrive on the scene. A bad situation devolves rapidly into a horrifying situation, and it unfolds on the screen with an eerie, relentless inevitability.



The protagonist of the third act is... no one. The grand finale of Red State brings a sharp twist, leading into an ending that will leave you hating or pitying pretty much everyone involved in the story.

Red State is not without its faults. An early scene in the first act has Abin Cooper, Five Points' preacher (Michael Parks), sermonizing for some time. While the scene does a lot of heavy lifting in terms of introducing us to Cooper's flock and Cooper himself, the sermon does get tiresome. Later in the movie, the actual plot of the film begins to feel scattered, but it could be argued that this is a point in the movie's favor.


Almost from the beginning, you can see this situation is going to turn into an utter screw-up. If the plot feels scattered its because the situation has gone so far south that coherency has become impossible. It makes following the whys and wherefores tricky, but it lends a compelling realism.

Where Red State really succeeds, though, is in humanizing its characters. Loving amounts of time are spent turning Abin Cooper and Joseph Keenan into flawed, full characters, neither strictly good nor evil. The three teen boys we meet at the beginning of the film could be easily dismissed as vulgar bit players, but their dialogue and mannerisms are so real, so quintessentially that of teen boys everywhere, that you practically recognize these kids. Cooper's flock, too, seem flat in the beginning, but it only takes a few inspired scenes to change that. In particular, a scene in the second act, where a married couple, members of the church, embrace each other before marching out to the horror is striking, turning these two characters whose names we don't even know from cardboard cutouts into real people.

The actors in this film take some great dialogue and make it amazing. John Goodman and Michael Parks brought their characters to life with their stunning performances. Angarano, Braun, and Ronnie Connell do a fantastic job as the three teen boys, as well.

Deft writing and talented acting all around make Red State an excellent horror film. Red State feels real. It brings on a growing, unavoidable dread, the sensation that what you're watching could be something unfolding on the news some day. There are no occult monsters that can be driven off with crosses or killed with silver bullets. There are no good guys that you just know will win. There are no bad guys that you just know are going to lose. Red State is the gritty telling of a tragedy, grabbing us by the back of the head and rubbing our noses in all the blood, misguided motivations, terrible decisions, and rotten luck of real people.





"Dragon Age: Redemption" - It's a brand new Day!

The goddess of geekdom has done it again! "Dragon Age: Redemption" is another solid web series created by and starring Felicia Day. This time by the grace of Bioware.

Welcome to the world of Thedas. Think classic fantasy with a darker edge. Our story follows the elven assassin Tallis (Day) as she tracks down a villainous qunari mage, Saarebus (Doug Jones).

Day has done justice to the mature ambiance of Dragon Age. Wasting no time, the series opens with scenes of torture and battle. Despite Day's reputation of being adorably kind and awkward, even Tallis shows a real penchant for brutality.

For those of you new to Dragon Age, they were looking out for you too. Each episode begins with a seamless introduction explaining what you need to know to follow the story. These



are quick and written well.

Overall, the script shines brightest. Dialogue is witty, and the pace is fast. At ten minutes an episode, there's only a short time to win over the audience and move the story along. They managed this without making it feel rushed or shal-

You can tell a lot of care went into the whole production. "Redemption" is probably higher quality than "Hercules" from the '90s, but it's around that level. I mean this by way of acting, as well as apparent production values. The blades look great, the costumes are perfectly adequate, and spell effects are pretty enough without being too distracting.







Jackson's Dr. Stands Trial

Attorneys and prosecutors have been debating in a Los Angeles courtroom for the past few weeks whether to charge Dr. Conrad Murray for alleged involuntary manslaughter.

Murray was Michael Jackson's personal physician. What we know is that Michael Jackson died of cardiac arrest associated with an overdose of the heavy surgical drug Propofol. Jackson was also administered Lorazepam and Midazolam, anti-anxiety medications.


The original story given by the defense of Jackson's death was an overdose, but Murray had administered safe and non-lethal amounts to Jackson. The defense believes that when Murray went out of the room to take a phone call, Jackson gave himself more Propofol, creating an unsafe amount his body could not handle.

Propofol is a safe anesthetic, used often in hospitals for the purpose of putting you under

before surgery. However, mixed with the antianxiety drugs Jackson had taken and the lack of medical supervision to monitor Jackson, the prosecutors are claiming them to be responsible for Jackson's death.

The trial opened with statements from both viewpoints and both included disturbing material. Recorded from Murray's phone was audio of Jackson, slurring his speech massively. Also featured was a picture of the deceased Jackson lying on a gurney. Both pieces conveyed strong messages. The audio of Jackson recorded from Murray's phone could be used to protect Murray to prove Jackson was addicted to the drug before Murray became his physician.

The trial itself is almost over and if convicted of involuntary manslaughter, Murray could spend four years in prison and have his medical license revoked. If he is acquitted of charges, Jackson's family will not receive life insurance benefits due to Jackson having a hand in his own

Salem, Ore. - The Department of Consumer and Business Services (DCBS) have discovered a security flaw in their online system that they use to issue licenses to workers in the construction field. They are notifying all of their customers and are working to fix the problem. One of their customers discovered that anyone could access personal information, such as addresses, phone numbers, and social security numbers. The DCBS currently uses the 'MyLicense' software and have provided a patch to fix the security issue.

Newport, Ore. - Police have identified the body of a woman found on a beach near Beverly Beach State park. Police have confirmed that the woman identified is Kayoko Umenishi from Neotsu, Ore. So far, the authorities have not found any evidence at the location of Umenishi's body. The Lincoln County Sheriff and the Lincoln County Examiner are still investigating.

Portland, Ore. - Gabriel Gabreski, a chef at A Cena Italian restaurant in Sellwood, Ore., has been accused of stealing a \$12,000 acrylic canvas paiting from an art gallery. Gabreski has been accused of taking the painting on Oct. 7, during a private art show on Southeast 34th Ave. Officials have reports from two individuals who saw Gabreski walk up to the painting and take it off the wall and walk out. When he was asked what he was doing, Gabreski simply said that the owner of the art gallery told him he could have it. The owner of the art gallery is Meg Hanson. "I'm upset. I'm angry. I feel violated. All of those things at once, but mostly it's a big loss," Hanson said.

Authorities have enough evidence and witness statements to charge Gabreski with one account of theft.

Nation:

Phoenix - Jason Alistair Lowery, a deportation officer with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, has been arrested for smuggling pot and has been booked at Pima County Jail on allegations of smuggling and felony flight. Lowery led DPS and Federal Agents on a 45-minute chase out in the desert, where Lowery reportly threw 10 of the 14 marijuna loads out of his ICE truck. DPS believes Lowery was taking the marijuana to a man working for a drug cartel, whose house served as the nexus of the drug distribution. The chase ended after Lowey rolled his truck and soon afterwards gave himself up. After arresting Lowery, the sheriff also arrested Joshua Duane Powell, the alleged marijuna distributer.

New York - Social Security recipients will receive a cost of living increase of 3.6 percent starting in January. Since inflation has been so low the past couple of years, beneficiaries have not recieved an increase since 2009. Unfortunately, most of the seniors will not receive the full COLA increase amount due to Medicare Part B increase. In the past, 70 percent of seniors were protected from Medicare increases because of a "hold harmless" provision. These 70 percent of seniors would not see their monthly social security checks decrease due to a Medicare hike. However, high-income beneficiaries and new enrollees did see their benefits reduced because they are not covered under the provision. This COLA increase is welcoming to the seniors that have seen their costs go up, while their social security remains flat. There are nearly 55 million people on social security and the average monthly check for seniors will increase \$43, to \$1,229, with it raising \$39 for the disabled, to \$1,111.

New York - Alec Baldwin is headed to the 'Occupy Wall Street Movement'. Baldwin's support comes the same night as feminist author and activist Naomi Wolf. Wolf was taken into custody during protests outside Skylight Studio in Manhattan. Wolf was arrested on charges of blocking pedistrion traffic. Baldwin and Wolf aren't the first stars to let their voices be heard. In the past, actress Susan Saradon visited the Manhattan site, singer Russell Simmons has tweeted about it, and filmmaker Michael Moore has met with several protesters. While each person participating is protesting something different, the overall theme of the protest is against the out-of-touch corporate, financial and political elite. Demonstrators have ralied against what they are describing as corporate greed, arrogant, and powerful people repeatedly asserting their positions over the nation. The nation's wealthiest 1 percent holds inordinate sway over the remaining 99 percent of the population. The movement hit its 40-day mark on Wednesday, Oct. 26.

Green Sauce Enchiladas

Hello again! Welcome to another fun week of good eats at affordable costs. I hope you like Mexican food, because this week I made green sauce enchiladas. I did all of my shopping at Safeway this time. Walmart sometimes offers even better pricing, but I personally feel that Safeway has better product.

Grocery list:	
1 yellow onion	\$.35
1 green bell pepper	\$.89
1 can green enchilada sauce	\$1.19
12 corn tortillas	\$1.49
4 cups cheese	\$4.99
1 can refried beans	\$1.00
GRAND TOTAL:	\$9.91

Directions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 335 degrees.
- Chop the onion and bell pepper into a small dice.
- Heat a saute pan on medium-high heat. Once the pan is warmed up, add enough oil to coat the pan.
- Toss in your chopped onion and pepper. While peppers heat, grate your cheese.
- Once the cheese is grated, add your can of refried beans to the onion/ pepper mix. I like to add salt, pepper and garlic powder here, however this is optional based on preference. Also, if you like it spicy you can cut jalapeno peppers and/or serrano peppers and add them to the onion/ pepper mix from step 2.
- Once the peppers and onion are cooked al dente (about 10 mins) remove from heat. Set aside a baking dish.
- Warm your corn tortillas in the oven for about 30 seconds. This makes them easier to handle.
- Open your can of enchilada sauce. Pour some on the bottom of your baking dish and some on a separate plate.
- Remove the tortillas. I prefer corn and flour tortillas. You can use whatever suits your taste. Take one and dip it in the sauce. Turn it and dip the other side in the sauce.
- 10. Fill your tortillas with some of the bean and onion/pepper mix and a handful of cheese. Place them in the baking dish. Repeat this step until all 12 tortillas are filled.
- 11. Pour excess sauce over tortillas, followed by excess cheese over the top of the enchiladas.
- 12. Bake for 15 minutes.

This is a great meal for a small family. You can get the kids involved and have some messy fun in the kitchen together. Have fun and enjoy!



"Musketeers" Isn't One For All

As the summer's blockbuster season quickly becomes a distant memory, director Paul Anderson brings a bit of summer action back with his latest version of Alexandre Dumas' original story "The Three Musketeers." This modern version still keeps a bit of Dumas' honor and epic sword fighting scenes, with added twists straight out of "Sherlock Holmes," "Pirates of the Caribbean", and "Mission Impossible."

Anderson, who also produced the "Resident Evil" franchise, the "Death Race" series, and is currently working on "Pompeii" set to release in 2013, offers up the film in 3-D or 2-D. His wife, Mila Jovovich, plays a super spy (Milady) out to sabotage the relationship between King Louis XIII and his rival, the Duke of Buckingham. Jovovich starred in the "Resident Evil" series and is no stranger to the action-packed role her character plays in the film.

But where there is a villain there must be a hero, or in this case four. "All for one and one for all" leads the young and feisty D'Artagnan (Logan

Lerman) away from his home with dreams of becoming the next Musketeer, like his father, but his road to Paris quickly becomes an adventure of a lifetime.

His arrogance or ignorance quickly pits him up against three down-andout Musketeers: Athos (Matthew Macfadyen), Aramis (Luke Evans), and Porthos (Ray Stevenson), as well as Rochefort (Mads Mikkelsen), the Cardinal's captain of the guard and enemy of the Musketeers.

D'Artagnan challenges each Musketeer to a duel to the death, but, when the four meet, they realize they have a common enemy in Rochefort, who also has plans of his own.

From here the alliances are set and the team is ready to defend and honor thy nation. The foursome discover the backstabbing Miladay and the Cardinal's plot and the one-time "warriors with no war to fight" quickly become engaged into a "fight worth fighting."

The film is set in 17th century France, with each scene offering breathtaking views and amazing scenery. The radiant colors attached to the scenery are epic in 3-D and really bring to life the Da-Vinci-inspired era

and architectural beauty the film pro-

There is no shortage of action from start to finish. The action comes and goes from the canals of Venice, to the streets of Paris, and even an "airship" battle in the sky. Yes, the "airship" battle is worth the price of the 3-D upgrade on its own.

All in all, the film does not blow you away with any great dialogue or great humor, but, like most Anderson films, the action keeps you entertained and the cast makes the film work. It's tough when a story has been done several times before, yet even with the rumored \$50 million budget, Anderson does a remarkable job with his use of cinematography and action sequences to spice up the film.

The last few weeks have been kind of a drag at the box office, however if you're in the need for some mindless 3-D action, then I suggest you get out of the brisk fall weather and go see the
