



Ruth Krueger is a student at Linn-Benton. She carries a full load of classes, works part time, studies hard and is working toward a degree. She differs from many other students in two special ways. Ruth is a non traditional student and is the current student poet laureate.

"I returned to school after a bit of an 'ahaa' moment," she said. Standing amid a pile of dishes at her food management job, she suddenly realized she was not doing what she wanted to do with her life. "My kids were all old enough for me to spend more time pursuing my goals."

Following in the footsteps of two of her children, both recent OSU graduates, Krueger returned to school. "This is my first college experience." She graduated from Mar Vista High School in San Diego in 1984. She is majoring in elementary education and is working toward meeting the requirements for a teaching certificate through OSU's double degree program. "My second major is language arts."

Krueger, who has been married for 26 years, lives in Lebanon. One of her daughters teaches English in China, while the other is an instructional assistant at Linn-Benton. Her third daughter is a freshman in high school.

Krueger is not her family's first poet laureate at Linn-Benton. "My daughter, Amy Earls, was student poet laureate for the 2009-10 school year," she said, adding that she was very proud of her daughter's accomplishment. "She is a remark-

Jackson's Doctor Convicted of Manslaughter

After a long two-year battle, the death of Michael Jackson has officially been ruled as involuntary manslaughter. Dr. Conrad Murray was found guilty of involuntary manslaughter of the king of pop, Michael Jackson, and will be facing a four-year sentence. His sentencing will begin on November

Defense attorney Ed Chernoff said the defense's main priority now is to prepare for sentencing and to limit the amount of time Murray will spend in

"What matters most right now is trying to keep Dr. Murray from taking up a prison cell in this community," Chernoff said. "That's what we're focusing on right now and we'll deal with an appeal after that."

Once the verdict was read, Murray was immediately handcuffed and taken away by deputies after Los Angeles County Superior Court Judge Michael Pastor denied bail. Murray didn't seem to show any kind of emotion once his sentence was read. La Toya Jackson on the other hand, let out a loud, but short, scream and was quickly silenced geles County Courthouse. 
The verdict came from around nine hours of jury deliberation, which began Friday morning in the downtown Los Angeles County courthouse.

Local:

Portland, Ore. - Portland's Small Business Advisory Council has passed a motion to end Occupy Portland's encampment of two downtown parks. The advisory group plans to draft a letter to the City Council to encourage evicting campers from Lownsdale and Chapman squares. Three nearby business owners are so frustrated that they are considering moving their storefronts away from downtown. The council advises city commissioners on issues related to small businesses and includes representation from several area business groups.

Portland, Ore. - Police said that a Molotov cocktail was set off in an exterior stairwell at Portland's World Trade Center Tuesday night by one of the Occupy Portland protesters. Police have been investigating reports since Oct. 31 that a person, or group of people, at the downtown Occupy Portland encampment have been making or storing Molotov cocktails.

Nation:

Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Washington - Calvin Gibbs, a sergeant in the U.S. Army, has been sentenced to life in a military prison with eligibility for parole in ten years. Gibbs was found guilty on Thursday of murdering three Afghan Civilians, illegally cutting off pieces of their corpses to keep them as "souvenirs", and planting weapons to appear as if they were Taliban fighters killed in legimate firefights. Gibbs' rank was reduced to a private and was ordered to forfeit all pay and benefits.

Washington D.C. - On Tuesday, Ben Cohen and Jerry GreenField of Ben & Jerry Ice Cream, showed their support to the protestors at McPherson Square by handing out free ice cream. Cohen and Greenfield are touring the country in support of the protestors and released a statement.

"I think that there's a lot of people in the 1 percent that believe that the laws in our country have been rigged to support the wealthy," Cohen said. "It shouldn't be surprising that people are advocating for things that don't necessarily help them, but help the community in general," he said, adding that a constitutional amendment could "solve the problem" of corporate personhood in politics.

World:

Tokyo, Japan - Toyota has recalled around 550,000- cars worldwide, mostly in the U.S., due to issues that could make it harder to steer. Toyota has received a total of 79 reports about this defect, dating back to 2007. The latest recall is due to the outer ring of the engine's crankshaft pulley may bemisaligning with the inner ring, causing noise or a warning signal to light up. If the problem isn't corrected, the belt for the power steering pump may become detached from the pulley, making it suddenly more difficult to turn the steering wheel. Toyota will mail owners a notification to make an appointment with an authorized dealer to have their car inspected. If needed, parts will be replaced for no charge. Notifications will be mailed starting January.

Paris, France - 153 bodies from the 2009 crash of Air France Flight 447 have been identified. Of the remaining 75 bodies, 74 are still in the ocean. The remains of the last of the recovered bodies are at the Medical Institute in Paris, where tests are ongoing to determine their identities. It took four searches over the course of nearly two years to locate the bulk of the wreckage and the majority of the bodies.

Okuma, Japan - More than 30 members of the press, wearing protective masks, anti-radiation suits, and confined to buses, were allowed inside the Fukushima Daiichi building. The bases of the buildings were filled with crumpled trucks, twisted metal fences, and large buckled water tanks. While the journalists were around the reactors, the reading rose to 300 microsieverts (0.3 millisieverts). The Japanese government-set threshold for evacuation from a normal area is accumulated radiation of 20 millisieverts per year.

England - The makers of a stain removal product showed their support for breast cancer by making the world's largest bra. When it was finally unveiled on Oct. 28, at the Southbank Tower, the pink bra, which is a size 1,222B cup, measured nearly 102 feet around the chest. If shrunk down to human proportions, the bra would fit a woman with a 34B cup. The bra took four weeks to make and was made by M Putt Sailmakers.



Penn State Riots for Wrong Reasons

▼ ormer Penn State assistant coach Jerry Sandusky was charged earlier this month with 40 counts of sexually abusing eight young boys from 1994 to 2009. He has since denied such claims.

According to John Remiro at USA Today, "The report details claims of alleged sexual encounters with boys in Sandusky's home, hotels and Penn State locker

Sandusky has said that there was some "horsing around" with young boys, as well as showering, though claims none of it was sexual.

However, Penn State assistant Mike McQueary testified that in 2002 he witnessed Sandusky conducting sexual acts with a 10-year-old boy in the university showers. McQueary reported the scene to his supervisor, Head Coach Joe Paterno. The scene eventually reached university President Graham Spanier, who did not report it to the police.

A potential rape went unreported, but Paterno banned Sandusky's privilege to a Penn State shower key. As Jon Stewart said, "They run a tight ship..."

According to ABC News, "[Paterno and Spanier's] firings came after two other top school officials were charged with perjury and failure to report sex abuse, allegedly committed by Sandusky."

One would think that something as serious as an unreported rape would justify not only firing the alleged offender, but also those who did not act. This doesn't appear to be the case with Penn State students, who are rioting against Paterno's firing. Why are they rioting? Because Paterno has managed the most wins in the history of major college football.

Dan Harris of ABC News, who found himself in the riot, reported that thousands of "students learned that Joe Paterno had been fired ... [and] the response was

Police had to use tear gas to control the crowd. Apparently, students were "overturning a TV news truck, knocking over light poles, and throwing rocks at police," reported CNN News.

Students are outraged by the firing of a professional who failed to act upon a potential rape of a child.

How is this even possible? How can the rage of losing a game-winning-record coach outweigh the rage of his failure to put a stop to someone who has potentially abused children? Any person, especially one of authority, is responsible for reporting a potential rape. And as human beings, we should never put a score card above the well-being of a child.

GOP Debate Heats Up

ast week a GOP debate aired on CNBC is receiving a lot of attention. Texas governor Rick Perry attempted to determine which three government agencies he would cut as president.

He started off strong in the discussion stating he would cut the Department of Commerce, Department of Education, and when it came to the third on his list of "cut" agencies, he seized up and forgot. Trying to downplay the situation, Perry took the suggestion of one of his opponents saying he would cut the EPA. CNBC moderator, John Harwood, then asked Perry if that seriously was the third department, to which Perry said no. 

uestion: The whole Penn State child abuse scandal is so weird. How can a coach get fired for a crime he didn't commit, and even told his superiors about? Nothing like that could happen here, could it?

nswer: Well, I'm no expert on the laws in Pennsylvania, but in Oregon, Acoach Paterno could have been charged with a crime, as well as fired. Oregon has a "Mandatory reporting law," where child abuse is concerned. Anyone working at a school, or working with the public in any way, is required to report child abuse if they observe it, or are told about it. Anyone who doesn't report can be legally charged. Medical doctors are about the only folks in a "people helping profession," that are not mandatory reporters, in Oregon.

So LBCC's teachers, coaches, counselors, administrators, and classified staff are all required to report to either the Police, or the Department of Human Services, if they are aware that a child is being hurt.

About 30 years ago, research showed that child abuse was much more common than previously believed. There was a sense of moral outrage that swept the country over the next few years, and many states adopted strong laws for the protection of children. Oregon among them.

After dealing with an up and down season last year, finishing at 6-18, the team is poised for a successful season this year. With the addition of some key players and the experience of the returning players, fourth-year coach Teresa Guerra believes this year's team has the potential to do great things.

Leading the outside shooting attack will be incoming freshman and shooting guard Michelle Bromagen. "She's always a threat to score from the outside and is always hustling out there," her coach says.

The team had two pre-season games over the past week against Clark and Umpqua. Even though stats and scores were not officially kept against, the team scored its first 21 points off three-pointers and played tremendous team defense, forcing many turnovers. The bench play was also a factor in both games, stepping right in and keeping up the overall intensity of the

After the hot start, Coach Guerrra was excited with the team's unselfish team play, saying, "this is the best start we have had since I have been here."

The team has been out and about in

the community, trying to spread the word about the LBCC women's basketball team. The girls have been volunteering in basketball camps and in grade schools around the area, helping out with kids and hopefully earning some fans along the way to come and cheer them on throughout the season.

The team officially kicks off the season this weekend at the Everett Basketball Classic in Everett, Wash., followed by a tough pre-season schedule that should help the team prepare for league play coming up in January. Coach Guerra has high hopes of getting this year's team into the NWAACC tournament at the end of the season and be in the top four of the league.







Winter Registration Tips

As fall term nears to an end and winter registration lurks around the corner, plotting your plans now for next term is recommended. Open registration is December 10. Before you register consider the following:

- Ask yourself, how well did you do this term? If you will
 have to redo a class, this should be first on your list of
 classes to register for.
- If you are planning on graduating this year, you need to complete any required classes.
- If you are transferring, contact the college you will be entering to assure you are completing any required classes, as well as if there are other classes you could take now to save yourself time (and possibly money) later
- Also consider speaking with an LBCC counselor to make sure you are on track and aware of any additional requirements you will have to complete to transfer or graduate in the near future.
- Ask yourself how you learn best and what you need to succeed in classes. For example, if you know that classes at 8 a.m. are difficult for you to concentrate in, consider taking the class at a later time. It is better to be realistic with your expectations. If you have doubts about a class time, use your better judgment.
- Consider the workload and time you will have to devote

- to studying. Typically full time is equal to three or four classes, which may not seem difficult, but the amount of homework, testing and other assignments should not be overlooked. Becoming overwhelmed or getting behind in classes is a danger you'd do well to avoid.
- Check to see if the class you are interested in requires out of class attendance, prerequisites or additional requirements that could pose a problem with your schedule.
- Those who want to save money and ride on public transportation, should consider departures times. It is recommended to give yourself at least ten minutes after your class ends and before your transportation arrives to ensure you can make it to the pick-up point in time.
- Volunteering or participating in sports or clubs are great ways to develop experiences and incorporate yourself into the college experience. However, understand what you will need to give yourself, such as extra time, in order to juggle multiple responsibilities successfully.

It is important to know yourself. Everyone's pace is different. Remember, when it comes to being successful in college, it's not about how long it takes you to finish, but how well you did along the way.

Interview with a Sexpert: OSU's Kathy Greaves

Given the nickname Dr. Sex by her students, Kathy Greaves is the all-knowing information source for sexual health. Greaves, a professor at Oregon State University, holds a Ph.D in Human Development and Family Sciences and writes the "Dear Abby" style sex column for the OSU newspaper. The issues that she discusses are "any and all aspects of sexuality."

Greaves says her "philosophy comes from over 10 years of education in the field of sexology and seven years of experience as an educator on [the Oregon State] campus." Amanda Antell, who also writes for the Barometer with Greaves and former student says "She is an amazing person."

Most students are familiar with Greaves as the Human Sexuality teacher. This class can be selected to fulfill graduation requirements, and students are in for an eventful class. "Her lectures are never boring" says Kelly Hall who took Human Sexuality from Greaves.

Her biggest impact on students, however, is her Sexpert column. Greaves writes short blurbs on sexuality a few times a month in hopes that she can better educate college stu-

This column allows students to ask questions they may be afraid to ask out loud. Brenden Hesse, a current student, explains that Greaves is perfect for this topic because there's "no sugar-coating." She addresses "issues that require that kind of frank talk." And on topics of sexual health, Greaves can help "break the ice," allowing students to open up and be honest.

How do you like writing the Sexpert column?

KG: Oh I love it, I actually wish I had more time. Every once in a while

I just feel completely rushed. Two weeks ago my column was really short, and they don't like that either. I really like it, and part of the reason I like it, I guess I would say, is that I don't necessary love writing it. I don't see myself as a writer, but students love it.

And students can write in?

KG: Yes. They don't do that very often, oddly enough I hardly get email questions. And so, in my human sexuality class I have a question box. When I'm not getting email questions directed specifically to Dr. Sex then I just pull from my question box.

How do you like teaching?

KG: I LOVE teaching. Teaching is the best part, emailing is the worst part. Without a doubt email is the worst part of my job. Well, over 200 a day. My favorite part of the job is when I'm in the classroom.

What is the one number one piece of advice you'd give if you could tell every college student one thing?

KG: Take advantage of what's being offered to you. Many college students, not all of them, but many college students just want to come here and get away from home and do as least as possible to skirt by. And the resources that are available here, you and your parents are paying for in your fees regardless of whether you use it you're paying for it anyway, so you might as well use it. Open your mind. This is your opportunity to learn stuff that you don't know, and so many students come here and they think they know everything. People do have to take in information from different places, and then decide for yourself.

What are your passions outside of

KG: I wish I could say I had them, I work like 60 hours a week. I have a dog, I love her. I do like to travel. ...I was in San Francisco this summer, I love that city.

Average day of work?

KG: I'm a slow mover in the morning, so I usually get up about three hours before I have to teach. I'm not a morning person. Then I usually teach, have a break, teach, have a break, then I go home and have dinner and check



Director Tarsem Singh ("The Cell," "The Fall") manages to create some fantastic visuals




and some truly entertaining action scenes. Sadly, it would appear that anything resembling a story or characters have taken a back seat. While
